Of course, our own youngsters (the little darlings) occasionally need to be batted around a little, but not really beaten. In contrast, we seem to have frequent visitors whose brats we would like to drop-kick over the backyard fence.

## 1935 Study Club Has Program

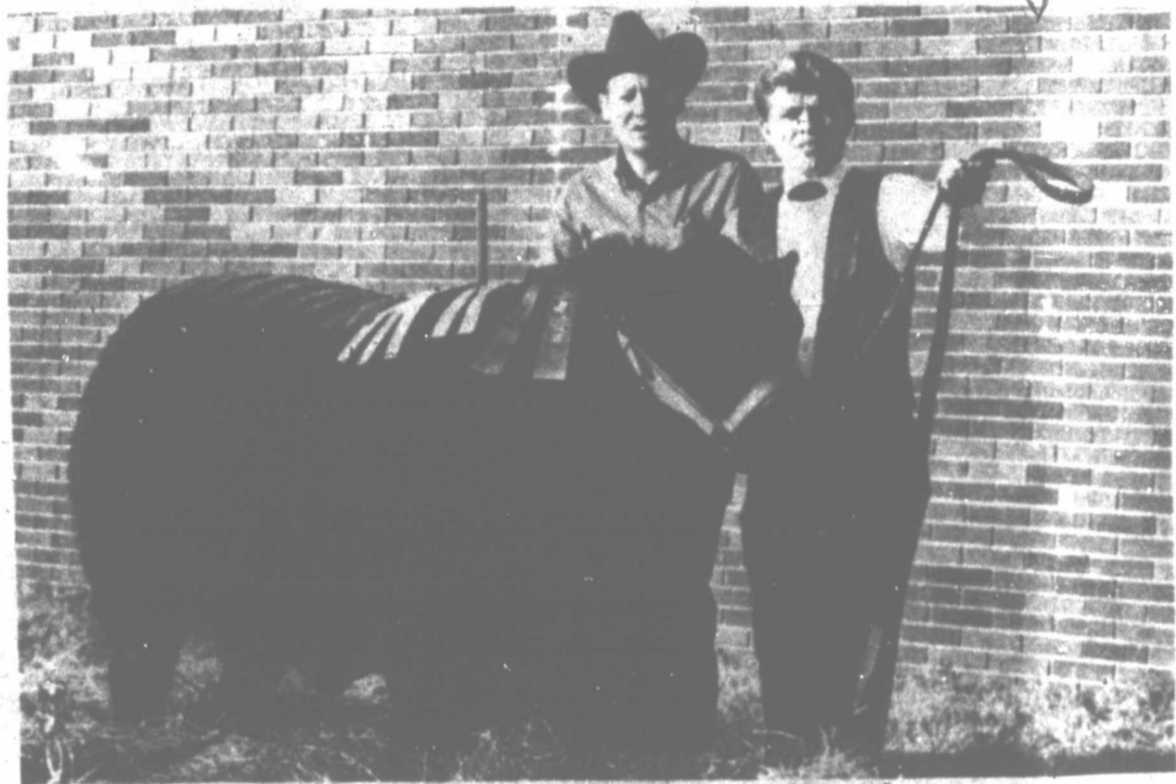

## ABSENTEE VOTING BEGINS IN SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION

School superintendent W. E. Hancock announced that absentee voting is now being conducted for the school board election to be held April 1.

Persons who will not be able to vote in the regular election have until March 28 to cast an absentee ballot. You may vote anytime during school hours at

the school office. Candidates for the vacancies are Byron R. Lynn, Lee Roy Fisher, Bill Boyles, Gene Duvall, Marvin A. Bowling, Billy Chester, and Waymon T. Bellar.

The board met in regular session Monday night when the hiring of teachers was conducted. A list of faculty members was

not available at press time and will be released at a later date.

The school is in the process of purchasing a tract of land just south of the present school including a 30 foot strip of land from Commerce Street to south of the Dean addition, one block just south of the elementary playground and one block south of the Dean addition.

The school received \$4500 from the insurance on the burned fieldhouse and a portion of this was used to purchase this tract of land which will be used for expansion programs in the future.

The debris of the fieldhouse cannot be moved until the State Marshall completes his investigation due to the fact that possible arson was involved.

Hancock also announced that a safety program will be conducted in connection with the installation of a crosswalk. Several new safety rules will be put into effect concerning parking, crossing the streets and speed limits.

## Devotional

HAVE YOU  
HEARD THE WORD?

Scripture: St. Luke 19: 35-40  
22: 39-46, St. John 12.

Sunday is Palm Sunday, and as we approach "Holy Week," I think of Jesus with His face set toward Jerusalem, knowing He was going there to die on a cross. Six days before the passover

(Saturday night) Jesus had supper with His friends in Bethany, at which time Mary anointed the feet of Jesus and wiped his feet with her hair. How comforting and precious this understanding and faith of Mary must have been to Jesus. For Mary came

recognizing Him as Lord of lords even before His crucifixion and Resurrection. She came not to have her desires or needs met, but just to adore and worship Him as the Lord God. It seems that only she understood that Jesus was to be crucified, and resurrected from the dead—as the "Lamb of God" sent to become the "offering" on the cross for the sins of the world.

On that first Palm Sunday, Jesus entered Jerusalem, fulfilling the Scriptural prophecy in every detail. He rode into Jerusalem on a colt, as it is written "Fear not, daughter of Zion: Behold thy King cometh sitting on an ass's colt." And the crowd, who was so soon to cry out "crucify Him", waved Palm branches and cried "Hosanna!"

The crowd only knew of Jesus, about His miracle of raising Lazarus from the dead, and in the temptation time this was not enough to keep them from saying "crucify Him!"

Instead of seeking to know Jesus personally, and confessing Him as Lord before the Pharisees and others, they deserted Jesus and followed along with the "in power" crowd. They loved the praise of men.

Then Jesus talked to His disciples, saying: "If any man serves me, let him follow me and (great and precious promise) where I am, there shall also my servant be: if any man serve me,

him, will my Father honor.... And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto me... Walk while ye have the light, lest darkness come upon you... he that seeth me seeth Him that sent me... for I came not to judge the world, but to save the world... He that rejecteth me, and receiveth not my words, hath one that judgeth him: the word that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last day..."

So, what will you do with Jesus? He loves you, He died for your sins, and He continues to seek you. He has made eternal life available unto you—He came down to earth from Heaven to give you (and me) eternal life. He said so.

The word has been spoken. Will you accept and confess before men that Jesus is your Savior and Lord? Do it now!!!!
