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For a guy who got into the basketball coaching business by "accident," James Anglin has run up a pretty fair country record for himself.

Anglin last week announced his resignation as head boys basketball coach at Friona High School, to accept the position as head football coach and track coach at Miami (Tex.) High School, a class B school in the Panhandle.

In two years at Friona, Anglin has helped drag boys basketball from the doledrums of defeat to a respectable position in the athletic program.

The two years prior to when Anglin took over the sport at Friona, the boys teams had won only 13 games while losing 37. The last two years, Anglin's teams have won 41 and losing just 13, for a 75.9 per cent winning margin.

The season immediately prior to his coming to Friona, the Chieftains had a lack-lustre 4-20 record. Anglin helped reverse that to 22-5, coaching the team to its first district championship in two decades.

The past season found the team finishing well in the thick of the District 3-AA race, winding up third with a season record of 19-8.

But Anglin, who started out as a football coach, had been "itching" to get back into the pigskin sport full time, and even the good record he has achieved couldn't give him a change of heart.

"Football kinda comes natural, but I really had to work at basketball," Anglin says.

He says that a couple of close games which the Chiefs lost the past year convinced him that he had to get back to full-time football work, for his own wellbeing.

"There's sure nothing against Friona in this decision. The kids I've had in basketball here have been among the best I've ever worked with, and the parents have been swell. We of the vocational training pro-

The summer before beginning his job at Dalhart, Anglin visited with Hank Iba, successful Oklahoma State University cage coach, and then began to adopt the Iba philosophy. The Wolves won 20 games that season, and tied for third in district play.

After his success at Dalhart, Anglin went to Canadian in a similar dual coaching capacity. He can't quote his exact won - lost record, but in two years his teams finished second and third in district, and his winning percentage was around 74 per cent when he accepted the Friona job two years ago.

"I'm not saying I'll never coach basketball again, 1 might if I get to where I feel I'm 'ready' for it," Anglin said. "But right now I want to get back as a football coach. That's my first love," he said.

Anglin learned the Iba basketball philosophy well. The year prior to his coming here the Chieftain defense had allowed an average of 62 points per game. Anglin's first team gave up only 4414 points per game. The past year's team allowed 45.9 points per contest.

. . . . Although Anglin hasn't stressed high - scoring, the Chiefs piled up 110 points in a game against Olton the past season, for a one-game school scoring record. The 22 wins during the 1964-65 season are also believed to be a season high.

So, Anglin leaves a lot of good accomplishments behind him in the form of basketball achievements, even though he didn't intende to go into that coaching field.

AN EDITORIAL

Conservation Is **Price Of Plenty**

However unevenly it may be distributed, no other nation in history has been blessed with such abundance as our own. No other nation has a greater problem of "surplus" crop production. For better or worse, we live in an "affluent society". As a nation, we are better than well-fed. More Americans worry about being overweight and about dieting than about hunger.

The evidence of present plenty in the bulging supermarkets and shopping centers of the country dulls the sharp edge of urgency in the call for soil stewardship for the conservation, wise use, multiple use, and orderly development of vital soil and water resources. The land is the source of our ample food supply and since there is anything but a shortage of food, why worry about the land?

It is a frequent human failing to live for the day alone, and insofar as the land is concerned millions of Americans find it easy to indulge in this delusion. The hard facts of a sharply rising population and a mammoth economic growth, with the clear and imminent prospect of unlimited demands on limited resources, are conveniently brushed aside.

The supermarkets are still full.

We choose to misread and misinterpret government statements that we have 40 to 50 million acres that are not needed at this time for the production of certain crops already in surplus. The headlines report "excess" acres. We forget the condition is temporary. We delay the time-consuming, exacting work of soil stewardship, of watershed protection, of land-use planning. What's the rush?

The supermarkets are still full.

Widespread public indifference toward resource management is a price we pay for present plenty. It is also a root cause of the manual con the impending resource crisis in the countryside.

But it is a major error in this half of the careful allocation of lands to multiple uses, century to assign all the resource problems in a range including timber production and water storage, housing and highways, grazing and nature trails, crop production and wildlife. Still, the attitude persists in many circles of government and among millions of Americans that conservation work in the countryside is a costly and excessive adjunct to "the farm problem," and that resource development undertaken on farm and ranch lands is wholly an aspect of agriculture. The view is as shortsighted as it is outdated. It asks farmers, already hurt by the long-enduring cost-price squeeze, to bear more than their fair share of the stewardship responsibility. Because it belies the breadth of benefits and operates as a barrier to wider support, it adds to the crisis in the countryside.
