Jimmy Hamilton Wins Subscription Contest

Probably the girls and their followers from Clear Creek High School don't think so, but this past week we felt as though their team had been partially avenged of the loss they suffered to Friona's Squaws for the state basketball championship in 1964.

We entered copies of our newspaper in the Texas Press contests, grand prize of which is the "General Excellence" award, similar to basketball's state championship.

Only newspaper with more total points than the Star, and winner of the newspaper "state championship" was one which represents the Clear Creek area.

Those were our thoughts when we learned that we had been beaten by the Clear Creek area paper. We remembered that Friona had beaten Clear Creek in another field of endeavor for an equally cherished prize. So, we decided, turn about is fair play.

At the same time, we're beginning to feel a little like Friona's basketball players and fans, who had to settle for the second best label for so long.

Like the motto had been at FHS prior to 1964, we'll just have to say "Wait till next year".

Do you like to let your imagination run wild? Associated Press stories in the past Sunday's daily papers give a person a lot to think about if they like to let their imagination wander.

The stories pertained to accounts in old Texas newspapers about the sightings of strange aircraft (unidentified flying objects if you prefer), in several spots in Texas back in -- and this is what makes it wild -- the year 1897!

If your history is as rusty as ours, we'll remind you that 1897 was six years before any Wright Brothers ever did any good with a "flying machine."

Stories came from several Texas towns, including Childress, Atlanta, Merkel and Aurora, reporting sightings of strange objects, accounts of which bore strange resemblance to some of the accounts which you read about in today's newspapers.

One of the accounts, from Aurora, Wise County, was particularly interesting. It told of the crashing of an "airship", which hit a windmill tower and exploded. Enough remains were found of the pilot, the story said, to show that "he was not an inhabitant of this world."

Inhabitants of the town, the story said, found papers written in strange hieroglyphics. Specimens of strange metal were also retrieved. A funeral was even held for the pilot.

The Associated Press more or less passed off the stories as products of "unbridled imagination" although some of the reports were supposed to have come from ministers, judges, physicians and attorneys usually a pretty reliable collection of people.

Possibly the stories may have stemmed from over-zealous newspaper editors, who at times we understand (especially in large cities, where they were competing newspapers) would go to almost any extreme to get a "scoop" on the other papers.

But, let's let our imaginations wander a little . . .

Suppose that the reports as recorded in the 1897 newspapers were actually correct, and that such things as "flying saucers" were present that long ago.

First reaction might be that the civilization from wherever the airships came must be far ahead of earth's to have produced space travellers at that date, which was far ahead of our own air and space efforts.

But--consider this, (Here's where the imagination comes in) Some scientists say that time is a dimension, and that it might be possible someday to "go back in time". If this were actually possible -- what if the flying saucers (both from 1897 and in recent years) were actually from our own earth, but were coming from the future, through the time-barrier, back to the present (or former) times?

And with that, we'll leave you, to let your own mind wander as it prefers.

Jimmy Hamilton, 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. James Hamilton, is the grand prize winner in the Friona Star's subscription contest.

But Hamilton, who led the contest since the first week, did not take the top prize before the contest became very close toward the end.

Hamilton rolled up a total of 68,400 points in the five-week contest. Brenda Hall, meanwhile, came from fifth place on the preceding Monday to claim second spot in the contest, with 60,600 points.

Rickey Rector, with 49,400 points to his credit as of 5

p.m. Monday, nailed down third place and Bill Bailey finished fourth.

Contestants amassed their points totals by selling subscriptions to the Friona Star. Miss Hall, eleven year old daughter of Joy Hall, had the best individual week of any contestant during the entire contest, adding 36,700 points to her total during the final runnerup spot. She won the special prize of a G-I Joe Walkie-Talkie for selling the most subscriptions during the week end Thursday June 23.

Brenda totaled 22,900 for the week ending June 23 to win the special added prize. She edged out Bill Bailey, who totaled 19,300 points for the week.

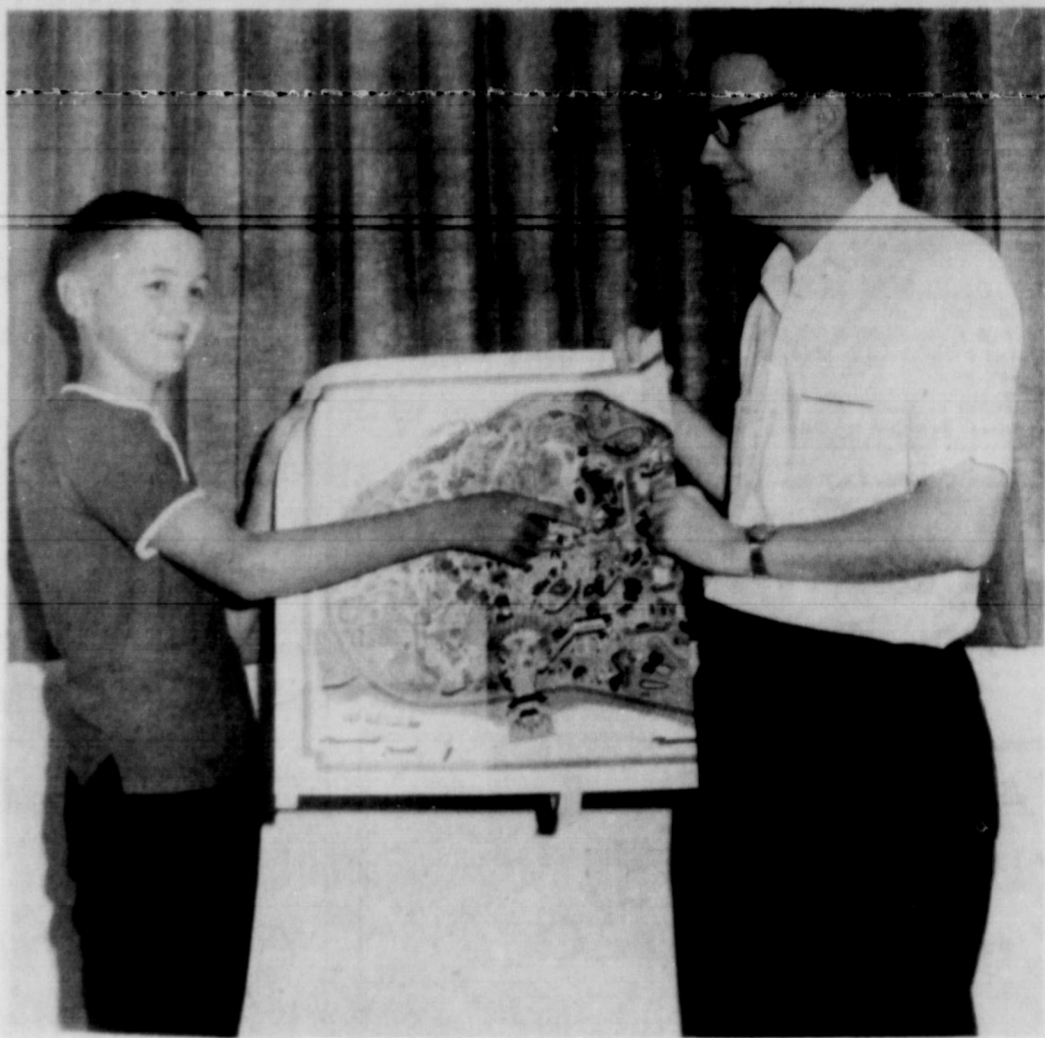

Wheat Harvest Over The Hump

Wheat farmers in the Friona area, delayed with their harvest by rains most of last week, were pushing in an effort to finish up the harvest this week, and those close to the situation thought the harvest might virtually be completed by the end of the week, barring more rain. Estimates ranged from 65 to 80 per cent complete as of Tuesday night.

Yields on the 1966 wheat crop are not bad, ranging from 40 to 65 bushels per acre. Some fields have had hail damage, and some few had late frost damage.

The wheat price has fluctuated from \$1.60 per bushel to \$1.79 per bushel.

Star Wins 3 Prizes In State Contests

The Friona Star brought home three awards from the Texas Press Association's annual awards banquet, a part of the association's 87th annual convention in El Paso last weekend.

The Star, competing against other newspapers published in towns with 2,001 to 3,500 population, scored in the top three places in three of the association's five contest categories. The Friona publication placed second in both the column writing and "appearance" divisions, and rated a third place in news pictures.

In winning the three awards the Star racked up 190 points in the race for the division's "general excellence" trophy, and was edged out for that coveted award only by the Webster Citizen, which had a total of 240 points.

It marked the second time that the Star had placed second in the state general excellence

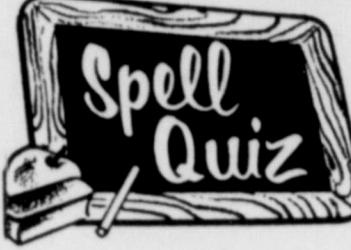

On The Farm In Parmer County

Most wells were started last week on grain sorghum irrigations. We saw several fields that were just getting over with the water by the time the last sets were beginning to show some water stress. If you have some later planted sorghum around the last of May, you still have another week or so probably before you'll need to start your wells.

We want to discuss the water requirements of the grain sorghum plant with you and use the accompanying picture to illustrate the daily water use.

Grain Sorghum uses less than one-tenth of an inch of water per day up to about the seven leaf stage and then the use rate increases rapidly.

The peak water use of more than .3 inch per day comes between the boot and bloom stage. Most of our sorghum is presently using .2 to .3 inch of water per day. This means that in 14 days sorghum will have used from about 2.8 to 4.2 inches of water.

Everyone needs to consider their own water resources in helping plan their irrigations. Most farmers around here are still shooting for maximum yields to give maximum net profit. However, I believe we have reached the point in our farming operations that maximum yields will not always give us maximum net profit.

This is especially true when we consider the value of our irrigation water and how much water we will be able to pump 15 years from now.

I firmly believe we need to plan for the future of this area by making wise and efficient use of our irrigation water today. Last year our water table for Parmer County dropped an average of 4 feet. At that rate for 15 years would be a 60 foot drop. I used 15 years because think back to where we were 15 years ago.

In 1951, irrigation was just getting a good start here.

Two well-timed seasonal irrigations will generally give good yields and probably near maximum net returns on grain sorghum. Ideally, these should be applied at pre-boot and at the late bloom stage. I know that

most farmers in this area plan on 3 to 5 waterings each summer and they are making money watering this much. But you are not figuring in any value to the water except what it cost to pump and put it on the ground.

Some areas of Parmer County are already short of water. Research indicates one irrigation on grain sorghum, as well as cotton, gives the most efficient water use. If rainfall is short, the boot stage is the approximate time to apply the one irrigation.

However, if conditions allow delaying this irrigation to the milk stage, research shows yields will be better even though earlier moisture stress many shorten the plant more than a foot.

No matter how many irrigations are applied, excessive early moisture followed by later moisture stress should be avoided on grain sorghum if possible. Good growth before the boot stage followed by moisture stress during grain development is likely to cause lodging as a result of charcoal rot.

This irrigation research information may not always work as expected on every farm. But local farmers can consider the basic ideas and apply those that fit into their water and crop situation.

COTTON DEMONSTRATIONS
Last week we inspected 4 cotton demonstrations where insecticides and fungicides had been applied at planting time either in-furrow or seed overcoat treatment were used.

I was actually surprised somewhat at the results and they were all consistent. We have all seen lots of excellent cotton stands this year, and thought fungicides did not have much effect.

John Christian used two different treatments on one of his cotton fields. Where Di-Syston and Terrachlor Super X were applied in the - furrow he has 119,192 plants per acre with light thrip damage. On adjacent rows he used Demosan and Di-Syston as a seed overcoat treatment and he has 78,588 plants per acre with heavy thrip damage. The seed over-

coat treated areas were three-fourths inch shorter than the in-furrow treated areas.

Gilbert Kaltwasser had three different treatments and a check plot. Where Terrachlor Super X and Thimet were applied in the-furrow at the rate of 10 pounds per acre he has 80,553 plants per acre with light thrip damage. On the plots with Di-Syston in-furrow treatments at 7 pounds per acre, he has 52,610 plant per acre with light thrip damage. Where Demosan and Di-Syston were used as seed overcoat treatments, he has 73,349 plants per acre with moderate thrip damage. The check plot has 68,546 plants per acre with heavy thrip damage and some stunting of plants.

Henry Haseloff on a plot receiving 7 lbs. of Terrachlor Super X has a plant count of 73,506 plant per acre, while an area receiving 7 lbs of Di-Syston has a plant count of 65,136 plants per acre. An adjacent Di-Syston plot with a higher planting rate has 77,144 plants per acre and he used Rillcot seed on these three demonstration areas.

Henry changed over to Gregg seed and at the higher planting rate with Terrachlor Super X and Di-Syston in the furrow treatment has 91,700 plants per acre. A treatment plot of Captan and Folepet has 69,867 plants per acre.

Henry had sprayed all plots twice with Ditrin and the Di-Syston plots consistently showed less thrip damage.

Jimmie Seaton has two treatments and a check plot just behind his house. In one plot he used Demosan overcoat seed and Di-Syston in the-furrow treatment 10 pounds per acre and has 113,897 plants per acre with only light thrip damage. On a plot with Terrachlor Super X and Di-Syston in-furrow treatment at 10 lbs. each material per acre, there are 126,269 plants per acre with light thrip damage. The check plot has 110,258 plants per acre and severe thrip damage.

Based on these 4 demonstrations I will say that the use of an in-furrow treatment with an insecticide (Di - Syston or Thimet) combined with a fungicide gave the best results with the best looking cotton at this stage of growth. Terrachlor Super X was the fungicide that gave good consistent results in these 4 demonstrations. However, this is not to say that other fungicides would not have given as good of results if they

had been used as in-furrow treatments. Research has shown this to be true.

Research has proven that a plant population of 20,000 to 50,000 is most desirable. Yields have decreased progressively as populations have increased over 50,000 plants per acre. This is equivalent to about 4 plants per foot of row on 40 inch rows. Research has proven that plant populations of about 3 to 4 stalks per foot produces the most lint.

Farmers are going to need to reduce planting rates to about 20 pounds of seed for fungicides to be most profitable. Every time I say this, farmers say they have to plant thicker on account of possible hail damage, which deserves some merit. However, you can reduce your planting rate, use fungicides, and still come up with the same plant population you want and the plants will be healthier

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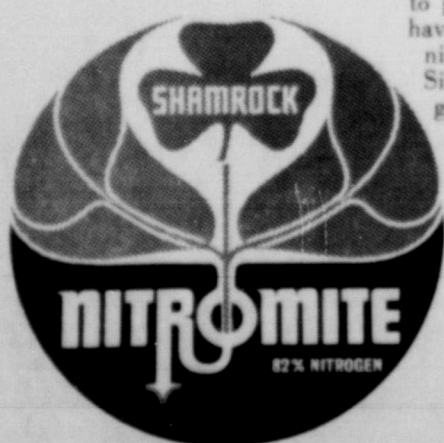
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The Library Corner
