

The Pioneer Natural Gas Company has filed an application with the West Texas Distribution system for an increase in the General Service Rate now

A company spokesman stated that it is necessary for Pioneer to request a higher rate as revenues are not now sufficient under the present rate to insure the company of a reasonable return on its investment, enabling them to expand and plan for the future.

Under the distribution system, the company is entitled up to 6 1/2 per cent return on their investment. Reports are that the company is presently getting a 2, 35 per cent return, with the requested rate bring-





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
