Possibly they were correct, but the significant factor was that people voted against some of these things because they could see no great personal benefit from the vetoed projects and because they simply wanted no more taxes or debt. However, they did vote for a city sales tax, so there is some paradox there.

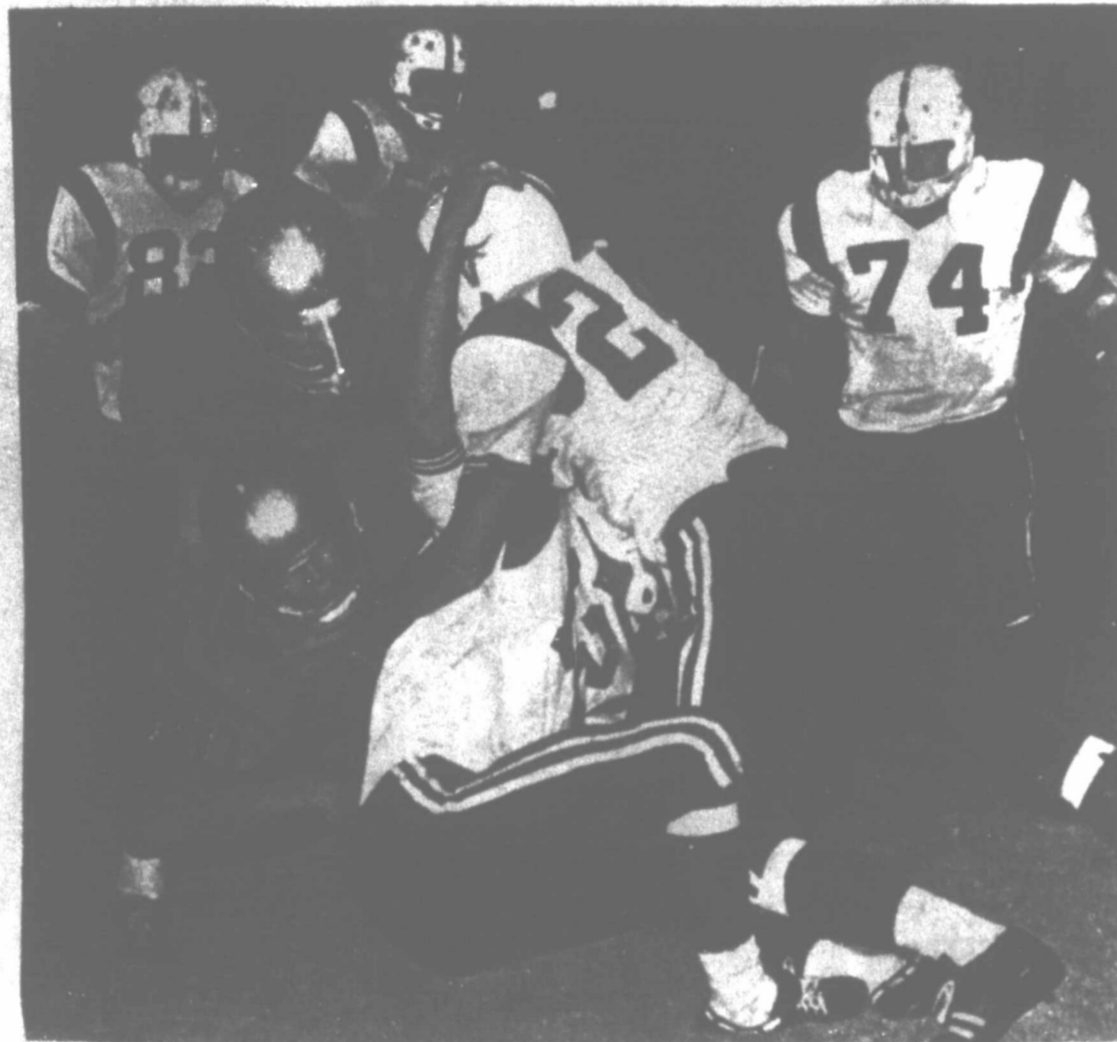
The outcome at least showed that many people, right or wrong, are not worshipping everything the politicians tell them. It's a good sign.

Minor damage, done to the pump, was the extent of damage reported.

LOCAL FIRM PRESENTS SCHOLARSHIP FUND

W. E. Hancock, superintendent of Sudan schools, announced recently that \$1,000.00 has been deposited by Sudan Livestock and Feeding Company in a scholarship fund to be presented to a 1968 graduating senior. The recipient will be selected by the school board without regard to financial need.

Danny Martin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Adrain Martin, received the scholarship last year and is now attending Texas University at Austin.

Ben H. Davidson, manager of the local firm, reports that the company has presented the scholarship for the past three years and hopes to continue to do so in the future.

J.J. Serratt Rites Slated

Funeral services for Johnnie Jay Serratt, 58, are set for today (Thursday) 2 p.m. at the First Baptist Church. He died Wednesday about 1:20 a.m. in the hospital at Amherst, after a long illness.

Rev. Willie Hazel, pastor, will officiate, assisted by Rev. Joe Serratt of Lubbock. Burial will be in the Sudan Cemetery under direction of Payne Funeral Home, Amherst. Pallbearers are Nolan Ferrish, Leroy Fisher, Hoyt Robertson, John Burnett, Gaylon Swanson, and Bob Davison.

Serratt and his family came to Sudan from Littlefield, Texas in 1912. Living in Sudan for many years, he was a member of the Sudan Baptist Church, and a member of the Sudan Grange, No. 1000.

In an effort to correct interest in moving State Route No. 75 and M. R. F. Branch, Littlefield, 292 of State Road, more information on accident to passengers who travel on these trains have been made public.

VICTORY OVER FARWELL, 14-7

HORNETS WIN FIRST DISTRICT TITLE

The Sudan Hornets won the 3-A District Crown Friday night when they downed the Farwell Steers, 14-7. The jubilant Sudan fans wildly and loudly cheered the Hornets as they carried Head Coach Jim Cain and Coach Bill Adams off the field at the end of game. This was a sweet victory for the Hornets, as this is the first time in Sudan's football history to ever win district.

In Bi-district, the Hornets will play Crosbyton Saturday at Lowery Field in Lubbock. Game time is 7:30 P. M., and admission is adults \$2, high school and grade school students 75¢, and preschool age children free.

The Crosbyton Chieftains record for the season is 9-1, and while the Hornet record in conference play is 4-0, their season record stands at 8-2. Both these teams will be out to win, so lets go to the game and continue to back the Hornets all the way to win Bi-district!

Hornet statistics in the Farwell game tell the story even better than does the score, but it seems they kept remembering that the score is what counts at the end of the game. Trailing 7-0 at the end of the first half, the Hornets still had six first downs to the

Steers' four, and had 120 yards rushing to Farwell's 49. The combination of a strong Sudan defense and a determined and well-planned offense in the second half brought the Hornets to a victory over Farwell. The Steers were allowed only one first down and were held to a -6 yards rushing in the second half, while Sudan quarterback Ronnie Hill made a total of 92 yards rushing and scored two touchdowns and halfback Jerry Bellar made 133 yards rushing and booted the two extra points.

Strictly a defensive battle during the first quarter, in the closing moments the Steers drove down to the Hornet 13 yard line. Then four plays deep into the second frame, the Steers scored their only touchdown of the game when HB Mike Dasher went over from the 6, and Al Phillips kicked the point. Late in the quarter, the Hornets drove to the Steer five yard line and fumbled, and the Steers recovered on the two.

In the third frame, the Hornets again fumbled on the 48, and the Steers took over. Two plays later, Hill intercepted a pass and the Hornet drive began on the 40. Hill passed to End Steve Martin for 17 yards to the Farwell 15, and Martin made a sensational catch as he firmly planted both just inside the sideline and reached as far out as he possibly could to take the ball for the pass completion. Driving on down to the three, Hill plunged over for the TD, and Bellar kicked the point, and the score was tied, 7-7.

In the fourth, after a Steer drive bogged down, the Hornets took the ball on the Steer 26, and

on down to the 17, where Hill took the ball on an option play breaking through the middle of the line. With the Steer defense thinking they had him stopped some three times, Hill's tremendous effort in a turning, twisting, hard-driving run carried on over for the touchdown. Bellar kicked the point after and Sudan was leading Farwell, 14-7.

In the closing five minutes of the game, the Hornet defense really took charge. When the Steers quarterback tried to start some action, dropping back to pass, all he could see was Robin Davis, Monte Roberts, and a horde of onrushing Hornets who pushed the Steers back some 31 yards in four plays and when the game ended the scoreboard read Sudan over Farwell, 14-7, and the Sudan Hornets were District Champs!

In Conference play, the Hornets have stacked up 114 points and have allowed only 15 points to be scored against them. For the 10-game season, the Hornets have scored 246 points, allowing their opponents only 84.

All the Hornets, Coaches Jim Cain, Bill Adams, Troy Chitty, and Tommy Laceywell; and Son Qualls have made this a great football season and are to be congratulated on winning the district title.

RED RAIDERS TO PLAY BAYLOR IN JONES STADIUM

The Texas Tech Red Raiders will play host to the Baylor Bears in a Southwest Conference game here Saturday afternoon in Jones Stadium.

Both teams will be attempting to get back in the victory column. Texas Tech was upset 16-0 by a surging TCU eleven Saturday and Baylor fell victim to the Texas Longhorns, 24-0.

Baylor defeated the Red Raiders 29-14 last year in a game played in Lubbock before 28,965 fans.

Two All-America candidates will be in action in Saturday's tilt. Greg Pipes, a 236-pound senior from Fort Worth, will man the left defensive tackle post for the Baylor crew. Texas Tech fans will be watching the performance of Phil Tucker, the left offensive guard in Coach J. T. King's Tandem I formation. Pipes, a two-year all-conference performer at guard, was moved to defensive tackle this fall and was a pre-season All-America pick.

Tucker has been one of the main reasons Texas Tech has been ranked nationally in rushing offense. The 232-pound senior from Tulsa, like Pipes, is extremely fast for an interior lineman. Both players run 40 yards in 4.9 seconds. Kickoff is set for 2 p. m.

WATER DEPLETION TAX CLAIM REPORT

Recent information for the Internal Revenue Service, Dallas, revealed they had processed 6,218 amended water depletion tax claims for the years 1962, 1963 and 1964.

A total of \$1,400,000 was refunded from these claims.

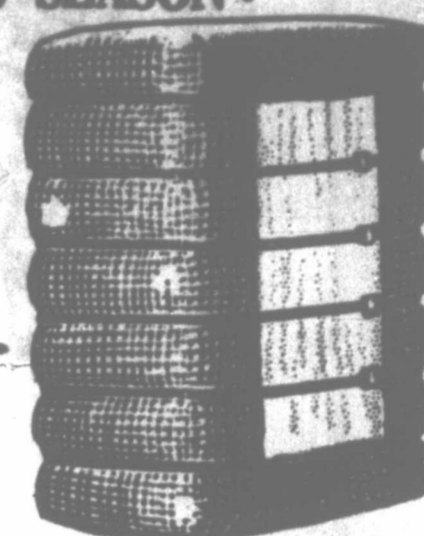
The 1965 and 1966 water depletion claims were handled in a routine fashion, similar to the depreciation schedule allowed for tractors and other farm machinery.

Revenue officials estimated that there were between 5,000 and 5,500 individual claims made for the years 1965 and 1966, which resulted in refunds of \$1,000,000 to \$1,200,000 per year to farmers filing these claims.

1935 Study Club Meeting Held

MAHON REPORTS

Representative George Mahon predicted this week that Congress at this session will reduce the President's request for funds in excess of six billion dollars.

Mahon reported that the present Congress has devoted a great majority of its time to the battle of the budget. In his capacity as Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Mahon has been in the thick of the spending battle since the President submitted his budget in January.

He pointed out that during the past two years Congress had approved many new and expensive programs--too many, according to Mahon. He thinks the present Congress deserves credit rather than criticism for its decision not to embark on extensive additional ventures in government programs. A number of programs have been renewed and some have been expanded, but on the whole Mahon feels this Congress can be characterized as an appropriations Congress.

Appropriations approved by the Congress this fiscal year will be less than were provided last fiscal year. This is good, Mahon indicated, but he cautioned that spending will be higher than last year. This results from the current expenditure of large carry-over funds for the war in Vietnam. In regard to a possible adjourn-

Kendrick spoke on life in Nigeria, West Africa, where he and his family have resided the past year. He, also, displayed artifacts of the country.

Kendrick, who is a student in the Sudan grade school at present, will leave next week with his family for Alaska where his father will be associated with the geophysical dept. of an oil company.

Among artifacts displayed were items of apparel worn by both men and women of Nigeria, and handicraft, including baskets and musical instruments. His mother, Mrs. Greer, who is the daughter of Mrs. Joe Wilkinson, modeled a dress she had made similar to those worn by the native women of the country. At the end of his talk Kendrick answered questions concerning Nigeria.

Also appearing on the program was Mrs. Milton Wiseman who reported on her recent trip to the Genealogical Library in Salt Lake City, Utah. The Library is said

to be the largest in the world. Mrs. Wiseman gave highlights of the trip which was sponsored by the South Plains Genealogical Society where she is a member. She pointed out that the Library belongs to the Church of the Latter Day Saints and it is the duty of members of the church to file ancestral charts which are then made available to the public.

During the business meeting plans were made by the club members for the Christmas Party honoring the Senior Citizens, Dec. 3, and also plans for the club Christmas dinner on Dec. 11.

Mrs. R. D. Nix presided at the business meeting preceding the program and Mrs. E. C. Nichols introduced the guest speaker. Present for the meeting were guests, Kendrick and Mrs. Greer, Mrs. C. J. Shockley, Mrs. R. E. Scott, Mrs. Joe Foster of Level-

land, and members Mmes. Nix, ment date, Mahon said that while the end is apparently in sight on money bills, the final adjournment date is still unpredictable.

DO YOU
KNOW JESUS?

Scriptures: Psalms 25: 4-15; 26: 7. "That I may publish with the voice of thanksgiving, and tell of all thy wondrous works."

The main purpose in writing this devotional is to tell others about Jesus and His love for all mankind; about His saving power; about His abiding presence with and in those who love Him; and about His redeeming and all-sufficient grace.

My desire is to do God's will and His work, and God's will is that no man be lost.

The secret of the Lord is with them that fear Him, and according to our given Scripture, He will show them His covenant. The Lord is faithful to keep His Word, but the reason some of us are still confused do not understand what to do next is because we are not faithful enough to God; and we do not listen enough to Him. We do not spend enough time with Jesus to really know what He is like.

A lack of love for Jesus and for

each other is one of the basic reasons for many failures in the church today. It is an amazing thing that the most beautiful and expensive buildings of the world are built in the name of Jesus, who was born in a stable almost 2000 years ago. But even that does not compare with the amazing fact that Jesus loves and seeks those that are lost from the Father. Speed Kills

Texas motorists will be watching their speedometers more in coming months, as the Texas Highway Patrol fields more patrolmen and more radar speed checking units in a battle against motorcide.

Purpose of the all-out drive against speeders is simple. The Highway Patrol knows that speed kills--and they hope that by sprinkling the state's heavily traveled arteries with radar speed checking units, the ever mounting Texas highway death toll will be reduced.

Previous articles in this series have shown that excessive speed is a contributing factor in a large percentage of the accidents on Texas highways, that the chances of a driver becoming involved in an accident increase many fold when he drives faster than the speed limit, and that one motorist in eight was driving faster than the speed limit on Texas highways last year.

"Now just what is the Highway Patrol going to do about all this speeding?" asks Mr. average motorist, and the answer is supplied by Major Luther C. Moore, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Major Moore has announced that the DPS has ordered enough radar speed measuring units to equip almost every patrol car in the field.

Sergeant Thurman Keefer, the Highway Patrol supervisor in this area, adds: "Use of the radar sets will enable us to patrol the highways more effectively, to encourage all drivers to stay

within the speed limit."

The sergeant continues: "We hope everyone will drive within the speed limit but some will fail to comply, so our efforts will be directed toward apprehending the speeders in order to protect motorists who do comply with the law."

Speeders who are apprehended will face fines up to \$200.00 and convictions will be recorded on their driving records, which could affect insurance premiums. Four convictions for moving traffic violations within 12 months or seven within 24 months will result in loss of drivers license and driving privileges.

The sergeant also explained that no warning tickets will be issued to speeders since the Texas Public Safety Commission has ordered that charges will be filed in every case where there is a clear cut and substantial violation of the speed law.

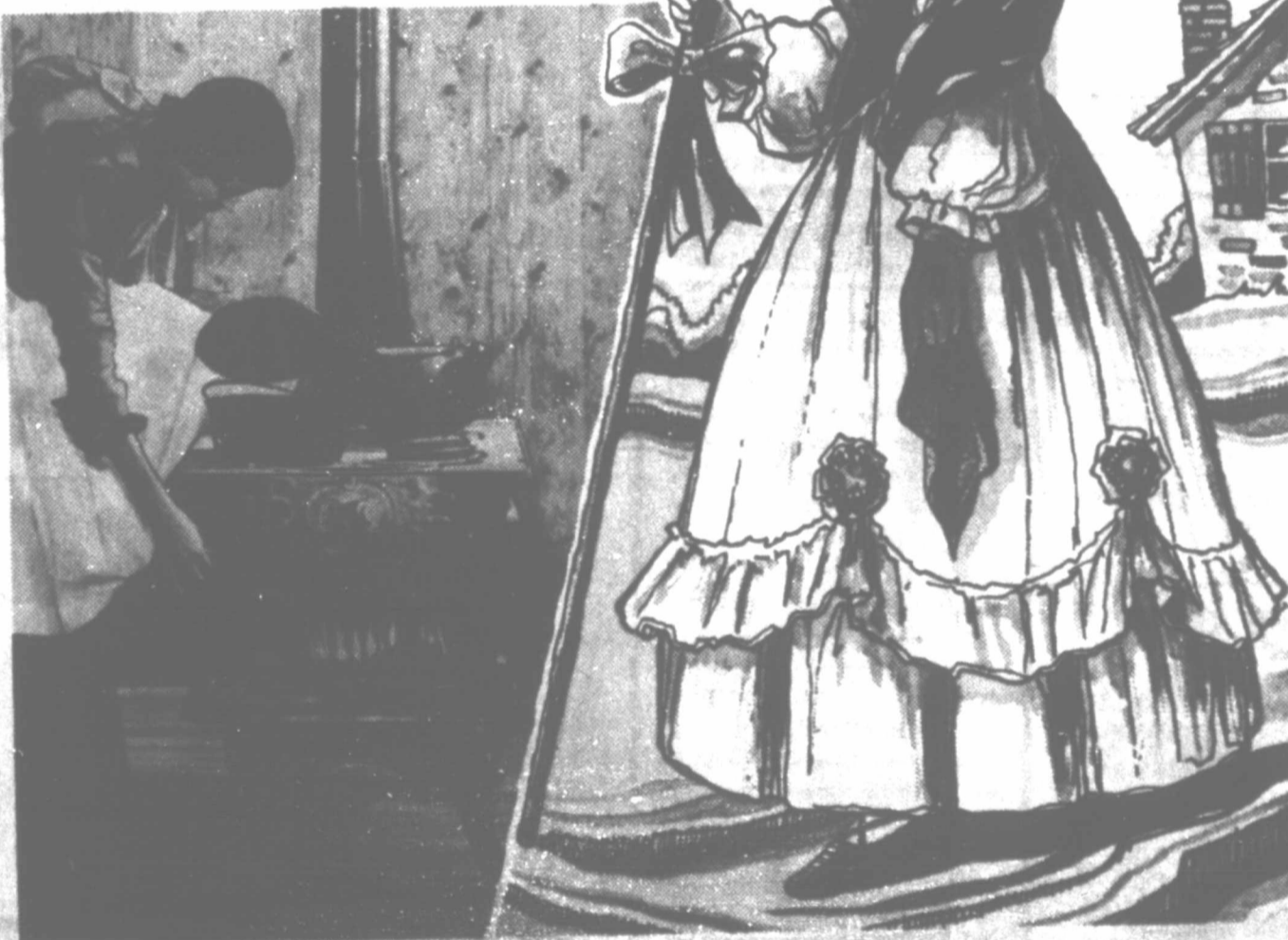
