



MAHON REPORTS

Representative George Mahon predicted this week that Congress at this session will reduce the President's request for funds in excess of six billion dollars.

Mahon reported that the present Congress has de voted a great majority of its time to the battle of the budget. In his capacity as Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Mahon has been in the thick of the spending battle since the President submitted his budget in January.

He pointed out that during the past two years Congress had approved many new and expensive programs -- too many, according to Mahon. He thinks the present Congress deserves credit rather than criticism for its decision not to embark on extensive additional ventures in government programs. A number of programs have been renewed and some

Congress this fiscal year will be less than were provided last fiscal year. This is good, Mahon indicated, but he cautioned that spending will be higher than last year. This results from the current expenditure of large carryover funds for the war in Vietnam.






