Early day cattle drives merely followed wagon tracks on "Chisholm Trail", which Chisholm in trading with the Indians had laid between present-day Wichita, Kan. to near Yukon, Okla. -- a distance of some 220 miles. Later, the Chisholm Trail (cattle trail) stretched from south Texas to the railheads in Kansas. The main trunk of the trail followed a line north through or near San Antonio, Austin, Waco, Fort Worth, and crossed the Texas-Oklahoma border at the Red River Station.

This year marks the centennial celebration of the 1867 founding of the Chisholm Trail. Two men, Jesse Chisholm and Joseph G. McCoy, played the key parts in the establishment and success of this famed cattle trail.

CAR CRASH DAMAGES BILL OLDS HOME

O. B. McClendon of Sudan drove his car through a six-foot redwood fence and into the wall of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Olds' brick home on Austin Street about 4:20 a. m. Sunday.

According to the investigating officer, deputy sheriff Homer McLaury, the car was traveling east on 2nd St. and left the street at corner of Worth and 2nd, crossing the alley and into the Olds' house. The garage and storage room wall crashed in by the impact and the car was lodged half-in and half-way out of the brick

wall. No estimate of the damage was given.

McClendon was only slightly injured and the deputy sheriff took him to jail. D. W. L. charges were filed and bond set at \$1000. McClendon pleaded not guilty.

SWPS SETS SAFETY RECORD

The 387 employees of Southwestern Public Service Company's 10 power plants have worked 4,000,000 man-hour without a lost-time injury. The 4-million man-hour mark, which is being added to daily, was reached in mid-November, a check of plant safety records revealed.

The last disabling injury in one of the power plants occurred in March of 1963, and two of the plants, Carlsbad and Denver City, have each worked more than 1,000,000 man-hours without a lost-time injury.

The generating stations contributing to the safety accomplishment are Nichols Station and East Plant, Amarillo; Moore County, Sunny; Riverview, Berger; Plant X in Lamb County, Texas; Tuco, near Abernathy; Cunningham at Hobbs, New Mexico; Roswell, Carlsbad and Denver City.

NEWS OF AREA SERVICEMEN

BRISCOE COUNTY FARMER HAS NEAR RECORD MICRONAIRE

It is a quite interesting story to hear the experience of Mr. Joe B. Mercer, a member in the Briscoe County Co-Op Gin, who lives in Silvertown and farms on the High Plains near that city, as he relates his experience with a new cotton that was first released in 1966. Mr. Mercer has a verticillium wilt problem on his farm and he planted the new Gregg 25V that has the glandless seed, both years of 1966 and 1967, and no wilt showed up in the cotton. In 1966 he watered in July and then again just before the rain started around the 20th of August, which lasted for 4 or 5 weeks, and he says the cotton didn't make at all. This year he planted the same cotton again, but he managed it differently and he has a quite different story to tell.

Out of 97 wrap-ups from approximately 48 acres he had 80 bales ranging in micronaire from 3.7 to 4.3 with only 11 bales falling below the 3.5. The lint yield per acre averaged 1054 pounds compress weights; there were 61% of the staples ranging from 1 inch to 1-1/8; with 30% being Lockney Highway, Plainview 31/32, and the remainder Texas. 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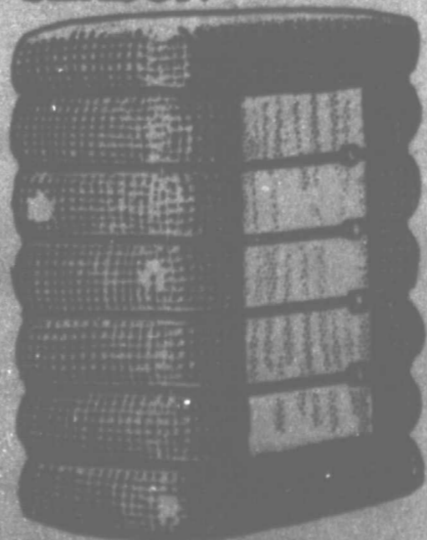
