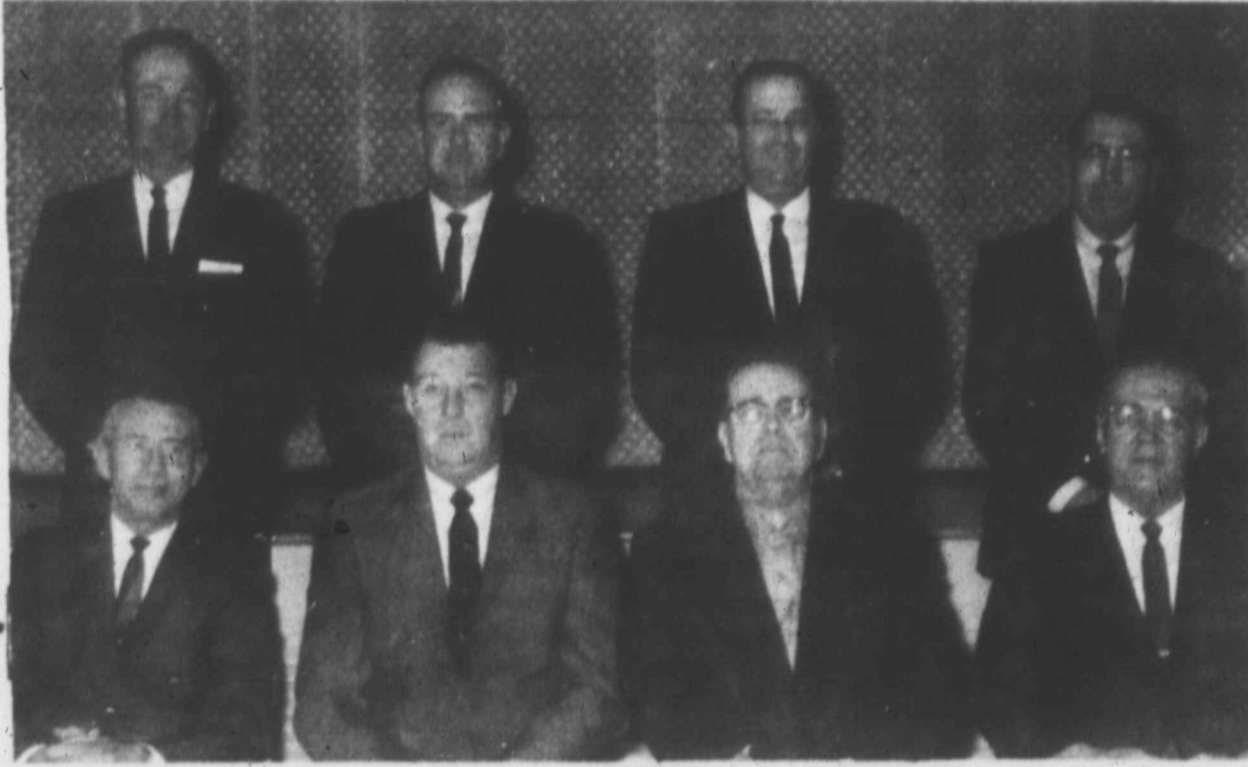

Don Hatley, 1305 W. 12th, has become the second candidate to announce for the office of sheriff of Lamb County.

Incumbent Sheriff Dick Dyer withdrew from the race upon advice of his physician. Currently Hatley's opponent is E. D. McNeese.

Hatley, 35, and his wife, Mary, who is the daughter of W. D. Pryor of Rt. 1, Sudan, own their home in Littlefield and have three daughters and one son. He was reared at Olton and attended school there, having moved with his parents from Paducah when he was two years old.

Hatley, a Democrat, has seven years of law enforcement experience to his record and completed four law schools for peace officers.

The Sudan Independent School Board of Trustees have called for a Bond Election to be held on Jan. 27, 1968.

After a meeting of the board Monday night, when the order for the election was unanimously voted "Aye" by all board members, the order for the election was assigned, and a legal notice is given in this issue of the Beacon News.

Letters of explanation as to why the board feels the bond election necessary are being mailed to all the tax paying voters of the

Sudan Independent School District.

An open meeting has been called for Jan. 15, 7:30 p. m. in the school cafeteria for the purpose of discussing facts relative to the bond election. The public is invited to attend, the School board members said in making this announcement.

Some reasons stated by the board are as follows:

"In the past four years our school district has lost over \$40,000 in State Aid, due to the increase of County and State valuations within our district, and loss in average daily attendance of students in our school. Our budget shows that we will operate at approximately \$8,000 loss this current year."

"The Sudan Schools are in need of many improvements and repairs. With the Bond Issue proposed we feel that the improvements can be provided and the school can be operated in the black."

More than 20 resident tax paying voters signed the petition requesting the school board to order the bond election.

January 27 is the Bond Election date, and the election will be held at the Sudan Community Center, with Joe West as presiding judge, Fred Meeks, judge, and Mrs. Elsie Cate, Clerk.

Absentee voting will be conducted, with Calvin as clerk, at the School Tax Office between the hours of 8 a. m. and 5 p. m.

Ballots for the election will be prepared with the words "For" and "Against" and each voter is to place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he or she wishes to vote.

This week marked the opening of a statewide newspaper campaign organized by Secretary of State John L. Hill to promote voter registration in Texas. One feature of the registration drive is the publication of an application form which voters may cut out and mail to the county tax assessor-collector, who acts as the registrar of voters. The form is printed on page 3 of today's paper, and publication will be repeated each week during January.

Citizens reminded that the deadline for registering to vote is January 31.

All citizens, 20 to 100, must register in order to be eligible to vote in this year's elections. Registration is free.

Persons over 60 who formerly did not have to pay poll tax are now required to register before they are eligible to vote.

ORDER FOR BOND ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTIES OF LAMB
AND BAILEY

SUDAN INDEPENDENT

ON THIS, the 8th day of January, 1968, the Board of Trustees of SUDAN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT convened in regular session, being open to the public, at the regular meeting place of said Board in said District, with the following members present and in attendance, to wit:

WILEY H. MUDGETT, PRESIDENT; FRANK LANE, VICE PRESIDENT; GUY H. WALDEN, SECRETARY; DEXTER BAKER, MARVIN BOWLING, BILLY

CHESTER, LEE ROY FISHER, TRUSTEES

and with the following absent: None, constituting a quorum; and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees were the following:

THERE CAME ON to be considered the petition of Richard West and 33 others, asking that an election be ordered upon the proposition hereinafter stated; and,

IT APPEARING to the satisfaction of this Board that said petition is signed by more than twenty (20) resident qualified electors and taxpaying voters of SUDAN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, who own taxable property in said District and who each has rendered the same for taxation, and that such petition is otherwise in conformity with the law, this Board is of the opinion that said petition should be granted, and that said election as prayed for should be ordered; and,

WHEREAS, the SUDAN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT has heretofore adopted the provisions of Article 2784e-1, V. A. T. C. S., at an election held on the 22nd day of June, 1963; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SUDAN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

THAT an election be held in said SUDAN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT on the 27th day of January, 1968, which is not less than ten (10) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, at which election, in accordance with said petition, the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors and taxpaying voters of SUDAN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, who each owns taxable property in said District and who has duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

"SHALL the Board of Trustees of SUDAN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT of Lamb and Bailey Counties, Texas be authorized and empowered to issue the bonds of said District, pursuant to the authority of Article 2784e-1, V. A. T. C. S., and to the amount of TWO HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$250,000) for school building purposes within the limits of said District, to-wit: the purchase, construction, repair or equipment of public free school buildings and the purchase

of necessary sites therefor, said bonds to become due and payable serially or otherwise in such installments as may be fixed by the Board of Trustees of said District, and to bear interest at a rate not exceeding FIVE PER CENTUM (5%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and shall there be annually assessed, levied and collected on all taxable property in said District for the current year and each year thereafter, while said bonds or any of them or any interest thereon are outstanding, a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and the principal thereof as the same becomes due?"

THAT SAID ELECTION shall be held at the COMMUNITY CENTER, Sudan, Texas, in the SUDAN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, and the officers of said election shall be as follows: JOE WEST Presiding Judge; FRED MEEK Judge; MRS. ELSIE CATE Clerk

MR. CALVIN VERNON is hereby appointed as Clerk for ABSENTEE VOTING at the election herein ordered and absentee voting shall be conducted at the School Tax Office, Sudan, Texas, and said Clerk shall keep the office open between the hours of 8:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. each day that is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, all in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, V. A. T. C. S., Election Code.

THE BALLOTS for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. C. S., Election Code, and printed on such ballots shall appear the following proposition:

"THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "For" and "Against" and each voter shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

NONE but resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the SUDAN INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be allowed to vote at said election.

THE SECRETARY of this Board of Trustees shall forthwith issue notice of said election, stating in substance the contents of this election order and the time and place of said election, and said Secretary shall post a copy of such notice at three public places in the District for ten (10) days prior to the date fixed for said election, and publish in at least one newspaper of general circulation in the County where the Board is located not less than ten (10) days prior to the date fixed for said election. Immediately after said election has been held,

Postal Rates Increased

Increased rates for all classes of mail except parcel post and international mail went into effect January 7, Postmaster Ken Minyard reminded postal customers this week.

"Even with the new rates of six cents for first-class mail and 10 cents for air mail, postal service is still a real bargain," Postmaster Minyard declared. "For six cents you can send a letter to any of the 50 States, to any United States territory or possession, to Canada or Mexico, or to an American serviceman stationed anywhere in the world."

The postmaster pointed out that the new rate for post cards will be five cents and for air mail post cards eight cents.

He said the added cent in the letter rate is a 20 per cent increase compared to a 24 per cent boost in the rates for mailing newspapers and magazines and a 34 per cent hike for advertising circulars, "occupant" mail, and other material in the third-class category.

The new rate of six cents per ounce for first-class mail applies up to 13 ounces and the new rate of 10 cents per ounce for air mail applies up to 7 ounces. Under the new rate structure all first-class mail over 13 ounces and all

the officers holding the same shall make returns of the results thereof to the Board of Trustees of said School District and return the ballot box to the Secretary of said Board, who shall safely keep and deliver same, together with the returns of said election to the Board of Trustees at its next regular or special meeting.

SAID ELECTION shall be held and conducted as provided by law for general elections, except as modified by Chapter 13, Title 49 of the 1925 Texas Revised Civil Statutes and amendments thereto, and Article 2784e-1, V. A. T. C. S., and this Board will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

The above order having been read in full, it was moved by Mr. Bowling and seconded by Mr. Baker that the same be passed. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Board voted "AYE": Messrs. Mudgett, Lane, Walden, Baker, Bowling, Chester and Fisher; and none voted "NO".

air mail over 7 ounces will be merged into a single category.

Postmaster Minyard said that effective January 7 special handling will be available on third-class parcels weighing between eight and sixteen ounces. Special handling has not been available on these parcels since 1958, when packages weighing between eight and sixteen ounces were transferred from fourth to third-class mail. There will be no changes in the charges for special delivery, special handling, registered mail, certified mail, cash on delivery or insurance.

"We have an ample supply of one-cent stamps on hand," Minyard said, "for those people who have five-cent stamps and need one-cent stamps to make up the postage required under the new rates."

Higher rates also went into effect Jan. 7 for all categories of second-class mail, bulk-rate third-class mail, controlled circulation mail, and the educational materials category of fourth-class mail. Mailers using these classes who need information on the new rates should contact the local Post Office.

There will be no more drop letter rates; for instance, all unsealed mail for the city goes at the first class rate, Minyard said.
