KNOTHOLES in the Woodwork: There's some good news: city officials at St. Petersburg, Fla., faced by a strike of more than 200 garbage workers (all but one of them Negro), fired the whole group, and hired some other Negroes and whites to do the job. They may not get away with it though... I notice that the Lord is doing all He can to help get the troublemakers out of Washington. On three occasions when they planned demonstrations, it rained them out... Lucky South Africa has no television, one of the few places in the world not invaded by the one-eyed monster... Okay, so I like to watch football games on TV. But I'm not sure that even this makes it worthwhile.

A NEW YORK writer, Sylvia Porter, recently scribbled a column about buying a new car. And although she starts out by pointing out it costs a heck of a lot more than most people think, she no doubt pleases the car dealers by also asserting that it's as cheap to trade in a car for a new one after two years as it is to keep on driving the two-year-old.

When you buy a car listed at \$2,806, she says, you actually are signing, in effect, a contract to spend \$11,000 over a period of 10 years, assuming you keep it that long (which I wouldn't), and drive it 100,000 miles (which I couldn't).

She breaks it down thusly:
\$2,230 for 7,000 gallons of gasoline.
\$1,800 for parking and tolls.
\$1,763 for maintenance and repairs.

\$1,415 for insurance.
\$1,188 for state and federal taxes.

In spite of the fact that gasoline is the biggest single money item, the writer asserts that the biggest cost in terms of cents per mile driven is in depreciation of the original auto price. She says, in fact, that every time you drive the car a mile, it depreciates 2.8 cents.

She goes into a bunch of stuff about how often to trade in and then concludes that "there is remarkably little difference between the cents-per-mile cost of a relatively new car and of a car nearing the end of its days." Assuming a normal amount of driving, keeping a car after it is two years old saves some money, but not much, she says.

So if you want trade, go ahead and do it with a clear conscience. Tell them Ga-Ga sends you.

Meeks was killed in an accident about 9 a. m. Monday nine miles

out of Sudan on Hwy. 303 when the car he was driving north was in collision with a tractor-trailer loaded with cattle traveling south and driven by L. J. Vinbard of Abilene. Meeks was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of Peace L. A. Glasscock of Earth.

Driver of the trailer-truck was taken to a hospital in Muleshoe, but was later released.

Surviving Mr. Meeks are his wife, Mary Estier, of the home; a son, Warren, of Earth; three daughters, Mrs. Jane Campbell of Littlefield, Mrs. Lynn Perry of Lubbock, and Mrs. Ann Arnold of El Paso; three brothers, Frank Meeks of Hurst, Clyde of San Antonio, and Boyd of Big Cabin, Okla.; a sister, Mrs. George Campbell of Dallas; and six grandchildren.

How's your History of Lamb County coming? I surely do want a copy when you get it published.

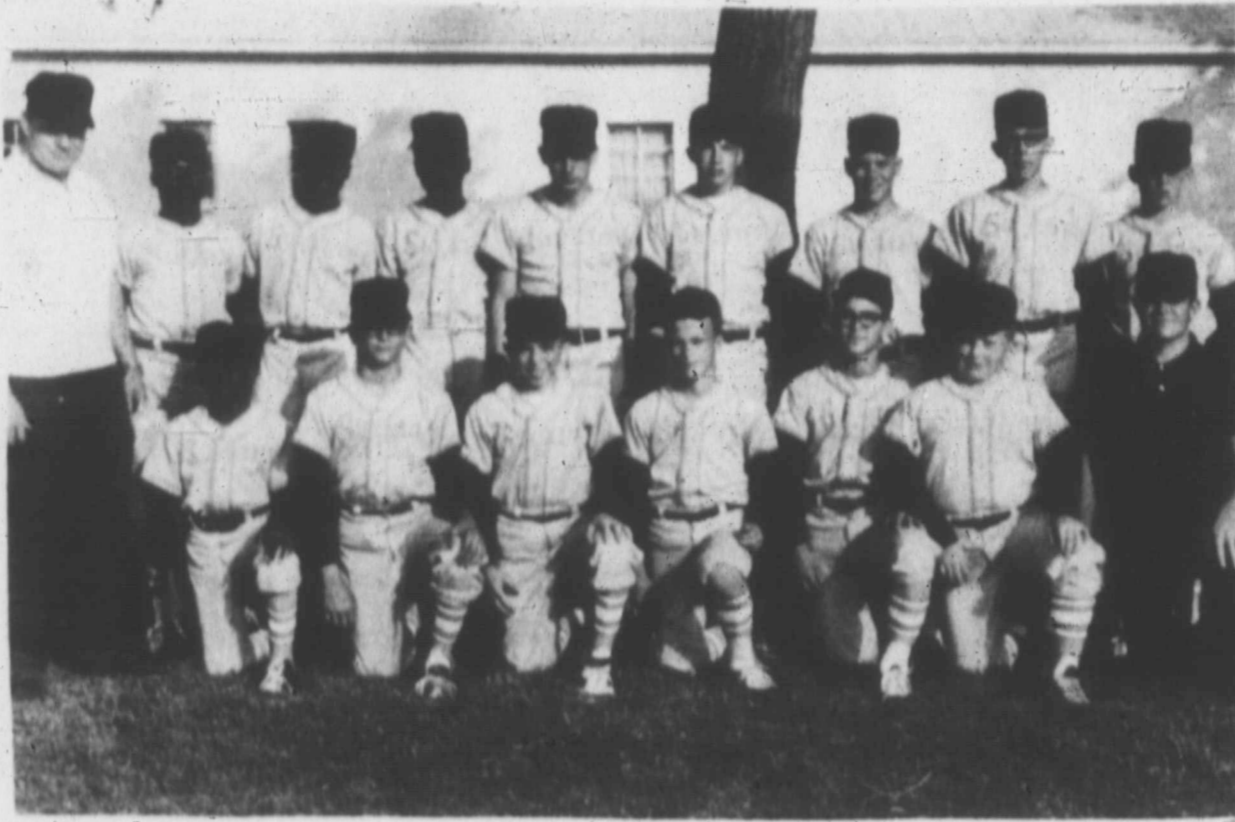

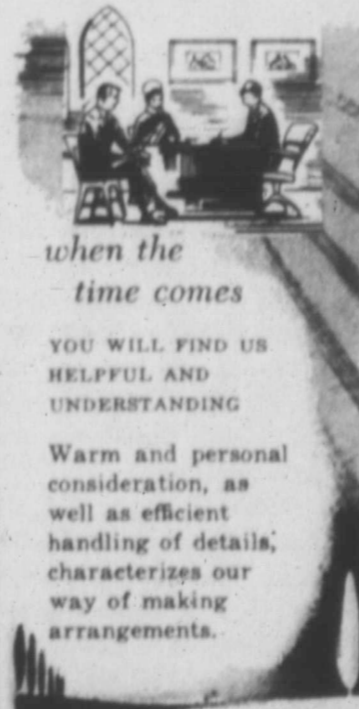

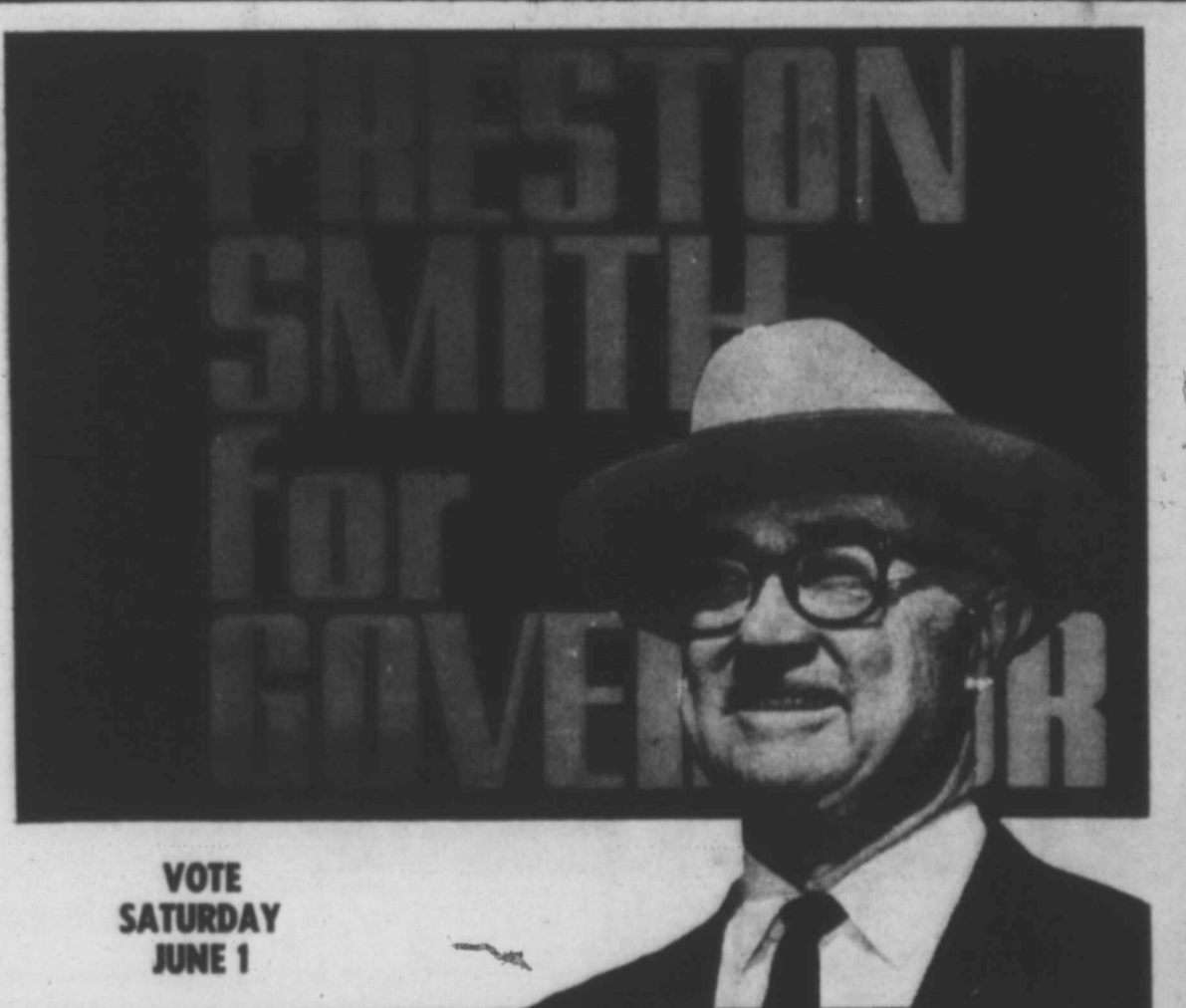
