Rotary Governor To Visit Local Club Wednesday

Rotarians will welcome the Governor of Rotary District 573, Dr. Jack Rodgers of Odessa at their Wednesday, August 14 noon meeting.

He will address the Rotary Club of Sudan, one of the forty-seven in his District, and will confer with H.H. Potter, President of the local Rotary Club, and with other club officials to obtain information on the group's plan for its service activities, for emphasis on the theme of the Rotary International of "Participation," and the District theme of "More Rotary Information."

FORD HAS PLAN TO REDUCE CRIME

Frank Ford, Republican candidate for State Representative, has outlined a three point program for reducing the rising crime rate in Texas.

"Salaries for our Department of Public Safety and local law enforcement personnel must be such as to keep and attract high-caliber, dedicated men," said Ford. "And these men must be provided with the best in training."

"Volunteer work with youth must be stressed to help our young people develop into good citizens, and support for law enforcement evidenced in home and school."

"Finally, we must elect a President of the United States who is pledged to appoint an Attorney General and Supreme Court Justices who will show concern for the rights of law abiding citizens."

"There are hundreds of murders and other serious crimes committed each year by compulsive criminals who were freed by come technicality due to Supreme Court decisions, and it is time to reverse this trend."

Ford is a candidate in the 72nd Legislative District.

Dr. Rodgers is one of 288 Rotary Governors in all parts of the world who are serving as representatives of Rotary International in districts composed of member clubs. Each district leader is responsible for supervising the clubs in his area. Rotary, an international men's service organization, has more than 630,000 members in some 13,000 clubs in 42 countries.

A member and past President of the Rotary Club of Odessa, Dr. Rodgers is President of Odessa College. He was elected to his present Rotary office at the Rotary Convention in Mexico City in May, 1968 and will serve until June 30, 1969.

Though a seasoned Rotarian before his election to the office of District Governor, Dr. Rodgers attended an eight-day International Assembly last May at Lake Placid, N. Y. at which all Rotary Governors for 1968-69 attended in-depth seminars to plan for their jobs. One of his biggest jobs will be to hold a District Conference of all Rotary Clubs in this District. The Conference will be held in Midland on April 17-19, 1969. The District Assembly, a training school for incoming club officers for 1969-70, will be held in Leveland on the Campus of South Plains College on June 16, 1969.

SCOUT NEWS

At a Court of Honor and Indian Campfire on Aug. 2, the second week of the summer camping season for Boy Scouts of the South Plains Council was closed at Camp Post. According to Camp Director Warren Green more than 450 Scouts, leaders, parents and friends participated in this final event of the week. This included troop 635 of Sudan, who returned home Saturday.

The Scouting awards presented included 39 Second Class Ranks, 30 First Class Ranks, two Star Scout Ranks, five Life Scout Ranks and 236 merit badges. The most popular merit badge this week was Cooking which was earned by 22 different Scouts.

Other recognitions made included two National Rifle Association Certificates, 33 Mile Swim awards and two Scout Life Guard ratings.

17 candidates for membership in the Order of the Arrow were tapped out during the week. They will be initiated into the local lodge early in September.

The 17 volunteer leaders who were in camp with their own troops, supported by the central staff of 27 men and older Scouts, made this fine record possible, Green said.

Superintendent W. E. Hancock said in making this announcement early Wednesday.

In Memoriam



THOMAS C. WISEMAN

Thomas C. Wiseman, 89, a retired farmer and pioneer resident of this area, died Tuesday, July 30, 1968 in the Littlefield Hospital after a lengthy illness. He farmed in the Fairview Community having moved there in 1834 from Vernon.

Wiseman was born in Nolanville, Bell County, Texas on December 19, 1878. His father's parents moved there in 1850 from Newberry County, South Carolina. His father, William Henry Wiseman was a Confederate Veteran. His mother was Alice Mel-

vina Townsend, also of a Bell County pioneer family.

Wiseman was a charter member of Fairview Baptist Church and helped with the organization of several early Baptist Churches in Bailey County. He had been a member of the First Baptist Church in Sudan since 1940. He moved to this area in 1924.

On July 7, 1899 he married Leacia Ella Murry and to this union were born eight children, seven of whom survive him in death. After her death in 1916, he married Alma A. Stevens who died May 14, 1959. The sons are Brent, Otis, Charles and Milton of Sudan and Claude of Rawlins, Wyoming. The two daughters and Mrs. P. A. Howard of Littlefield and Mrs. Dorman Chester, Sudan.

Other survivors are 21 grandchildren, 35 great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

Funeral services were held in the First Baptist Church of Sudan Thursday, Aug. 1, 3 p. m. Officiating was Rev. J. R. Manning. Pallbearers were grandsons of Mr. Wiseman. Interment was in Littlefield Memorial Park with arrangements by Hamilton Funeral Home.

Devotional

Scripture: St. Luke 20:19-26; 12:40; Isaiah 55:10-11.

"--Render therefore unto Caesar the things which be Caesar's, and unto God the things which be God's."

This is not an easy subject for me to write or talk about, but God wants all His message told to us, not just in part, and this is His word.

It seems that we learn even our adult lessons by the method of repetition, and Jesus knew this for He tells His messengers and followers continually to "Go and Tell" His words.

Jesus' authority was being questioned by the chief priests and the scribes, as they sought to trick

Him into doing or saying something that they might use to have Him arrested. But Jesus knew their thoughts and gave an answer which amazed them.

That answer is still truth today, yet many Christians seem to go right by this Scripture without hearing what Jesus is saying to us.

Caesar was the ruler, the law, and Jesus said give Caesar what was due him. Some of our laws may not be what we think are the best laws, but, Christians, as much as we possibly can do, we should do in order to keep the laws of our land.

And, like Jesus, avoid being tricked into a poor witness for Christ by our failure to keep the first part of Jesus' admonition. In other words, we should render unto God the things which are God's, but we should also render unto Caesar the things which are Caesar's. It has been said that Christians fall far short in remembering these words of our Lord in "practice" daily. As the rulers watched Jesus, and sent our spies, even so the world watches the followers of Jesus today. Can the world see Jesus in you?

God's word, repeated by us, is the "seed given to the sower" and as we sow these thoughts, our prayer is that even one person may be brought anew to search for the truths recorded in God's Holy Word.

For it is God's word that tells us of Jesus--and how to have

eternal life. The record of the Son of God bears witness that He is the way, the only way, into eternal, abundant life. And also tells us that Jesus is coming again to earth to take all of us, with Him, safely home. But the word Jesus says about His return to earth is:

"Be ye therefore ready also," (not get ready, but be ready--so if you are not ready, now is the time, the only time you are promised); "for the Son of man cometh at an hour when ye think not."

If you should meet God tonight--are you ready? Jesus is the way to be ready. Accept Him now.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR20)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors.

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not

in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital.

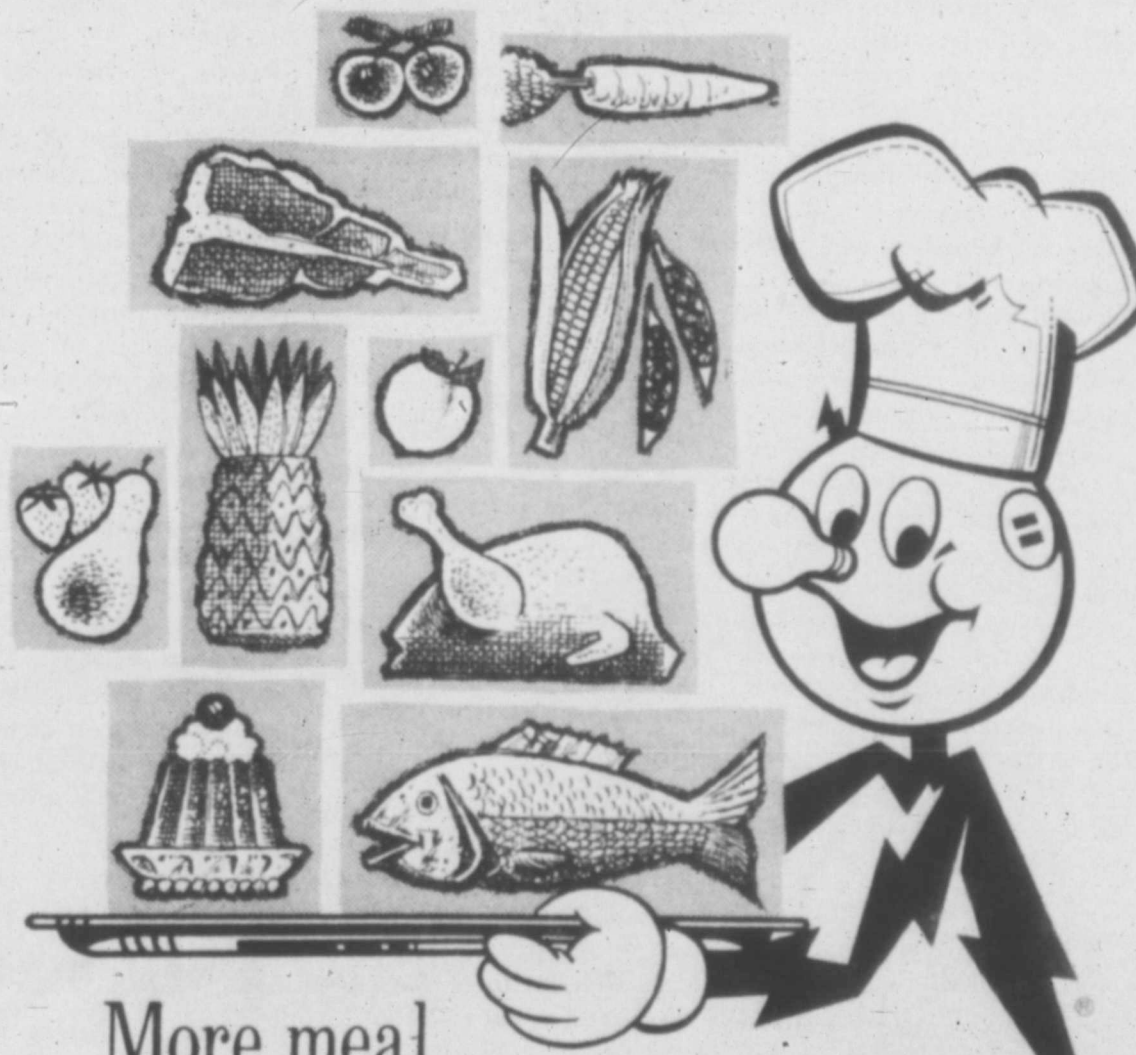
"The interest, dividends and other income accruing from the investments of the Permanent University Fund, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution.

"This amendment shall be self-enacting, and shall become effective upon its adoption, provided, however, that the Legislature shall provide by law for full disclosure of all details concerning the investments in corporate stocks and bonds and other investments authorized herein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

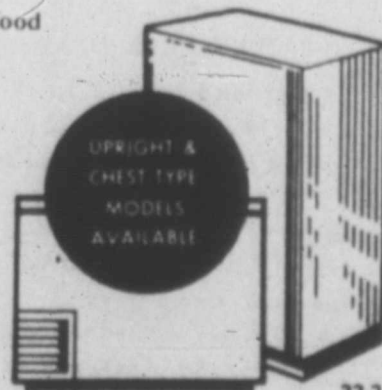

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR1)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state, provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund.

"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Section III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension, retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

"AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

Each voter shall mark one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

TEXAS COTTON PRODUCTION DOWN

Texas cotton production was down 16.1 per cent during the 1967-68 season, the Cotton Economic Research office at The University of Texas reports.

Tabulations as of Jan 16, 1968, showed 2,638,896 running bales ginned. At the same time in 1967 there were 3,149,925.

The estimated value of lint cotton and cottonseed produced in Texas was down more than \$37 million from that of the previous season, the "Summary Report" said.

"The decrease in the value of production affects the entire economy of the state," the report explains, but hardest hit were segments of the industry other than the grower, primarily the gins, oil mills, compresses and warehouses.

And the cause of the decrease--that unpredictable Texas weather coupled with an increase in diverted acreage.

The report forecasts a brighter picture in 68-69: "All indicators point to an increase in the planted acreage in Texas for the 1968-69 season, along with improved weather

conditions, for increased production. New and improved varieties are being planted for improved cotton quality rather than for yield alone."

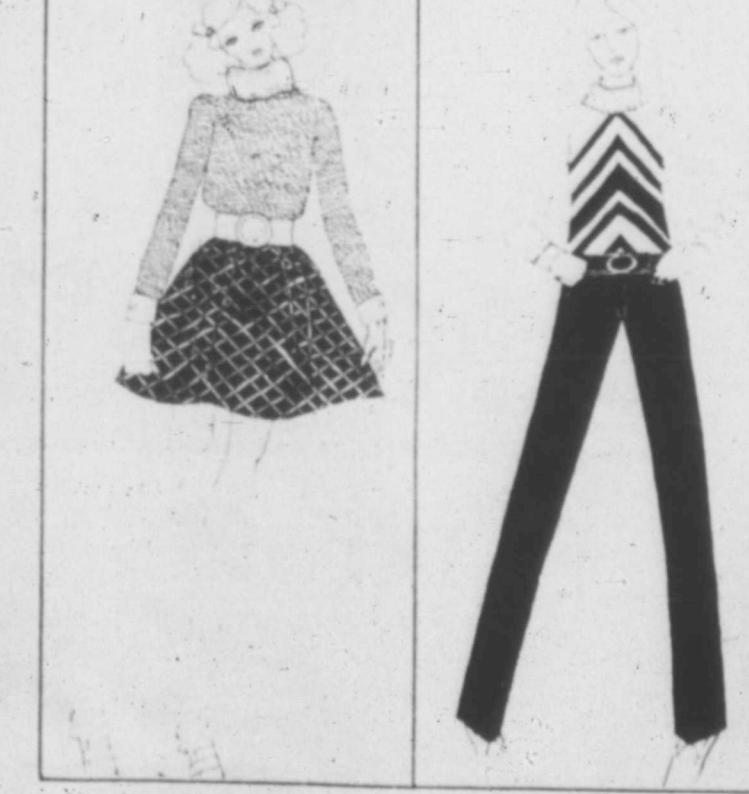
