Early in the final period, the Eagles moved the ball all the way to the Hornet three, where QB Flemmons passed to Gilmore in the end some for an Engle TD. FB Kent Crutcher's try for two points failed as he met a swarm of Homets, and the score was Hornets 34, Eagles 22. The Eagles tried another onside kick, and Sudan's tackle Pat Minyard covered the ball for the Hornets. With five minutes left on the clock, Hanna crossed the goal line from 10 yands out for his 3nd TD of the night. Getting a 5 yand penalty for delay of the game, Bellar's kick was blocked, and Sutian led 40-22. The final touchdown of the game was made by Eagle Q8 Flemmons going into the end zone from 2 yards out. Try for two points failed. The Hornets marched to the Engle 10 yand line, and lost the ball when they failed to make a first down, with only nine seconds left in the game. The wildly cheering Sudan Homet fass were on their feet and counting off the last nine seconds, when the game ended Sudan over Seagraves, 40-28. 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



SWAT THE FROG
