HORNETS DOWN BOVINA 46-6

The Sudan Hornets won their first conference game Friday night by defeating the Bovina Mustangs, 46-6.

Hornet End Bobby Brown started the play early in the first quarter by recovering a Bovina fumble on the 35 yard line. Then QB Steve Martin tossed to Brown for an 18 yd. touchdown play with Brown running into the end zone. Bovina blocked the kick by HB Jerry Bellar, and the quarter ended with Sudan leading 6-0.

Starting the second quarter play with Sudan in possession of the ball on the Bovina 1-yard

line, QB Martin dived through the Mustang line for another Hornet TD. Try for extra point failed, and Sudan led 12-0. The Mustangs fullback Royce Sisk scrambled through the Hornet defense on the next series of play and ran 50 yards for Bovina's only touchdown of the game. Quarterback Stuart McMeans tried for two extra points, but was stopped by the Hornets. Later in the quarter, Bellar made a 36-yard run to move the ball to the 24. The Hornets moved on down to the 3 yard line, and Bellar carried the ball over for another touchdown. He kicked the point, and Sudan was leading, 19-6. The Hornet defense went to work in earnest and held the Mustangs on a 4th down play, giving Sudan the ball on the Hornet 21. Martin started his passing game again, and hit Brown for a 31-yd. gain to the Bovina 12. On the next play, FB Larry Hanna broke through the Mustangs and went in for another TD. Try for point failed, and at the half, Sudan was leading Bovina, 25-6.

Early in the second frame, Hornet tackle Harvey Willeby recovered a Mustang fumble on their 18 yard line, and marched to the goal line where they fumbled and Bovina recovered in the end zone for a touchdown bringing the ball out to the 20. Then End Joe Hines recovered a Mustang fumble on the 25 yard line, and on the first play from scrimmage, FB Hanna ran 25 yards for another 6 points for Sudan. Bellar kicked the point, to give the Hornets a 32-6 lead. As play continued, the Hornets fumbled again, but tackle Dex Baker was there to cover the ball for the Hornets on the Mustang 28. Operating from the 15 yard line, QB Martin passed to Bobby Brown in the end zone which was called back on a five yard penalty against the Hornets. But the Hornets' quarterback Martin and end Brown just repeated their performance on a second down play for a 20-yd. TD. Bellar kicked, and the score read Sudan over Bovina, 39-6. Bellar ended the quarter by intercepting a Mustang pass on the 46 yard line.

The Hornets were on the move again in the 4th, when Martin passed to end Joe Hines for a 32-yard gain to the 28. Moving down to the three yard line, Bellar ran in for the TD. He kicked the extra point and the score was 46-6, Sudan.

Hornet quarterback Rex Boyles made a 45-yard run to the 14, as the Sudan team tried to strike again. They moved to the three, where they fumbled and the Mustangs took over, with the game ending 46-6, Sudan over Bovina.

Guards Billy Ford and Monte Roberts lead the defensive unit in holding the Mustangs to only six points. On offense, Hornets FB Hanna made 138 yards rushing, and HB Bellar had 127. QB Martin had a good night in the air as he completed four out of five pass attempts for 101 yards.

Friday night in Hornet Stadium, 8:00 p. m., the Hornets will play Vega in their second conference game.

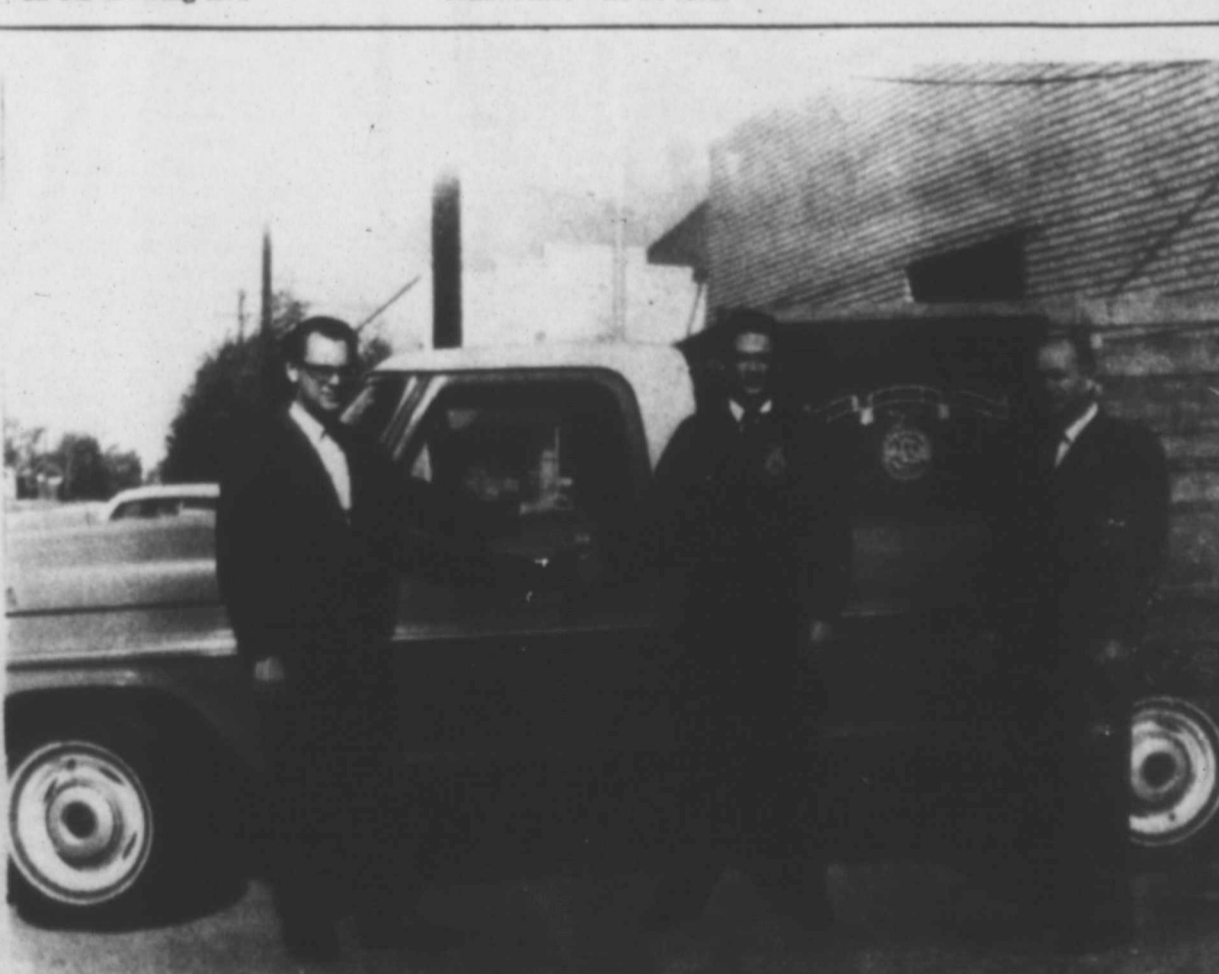
The two classes to be honored this year will be the 1927 class and the 1947 class.

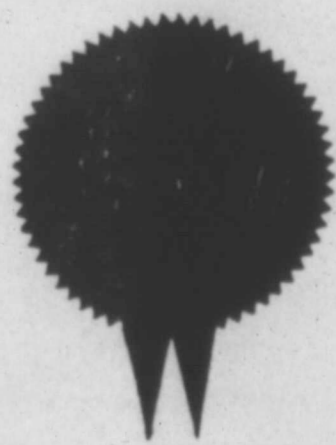

WATER CONSERVATION AND IMPORTATION:

"Water is the life-blood of our irrigated economy, and the importance of total water resources planning cannot be over-emphasized. Feasibility studies for importing water to the high-plains from the lower Mississippi basin should be pushed forward at maximum speed. 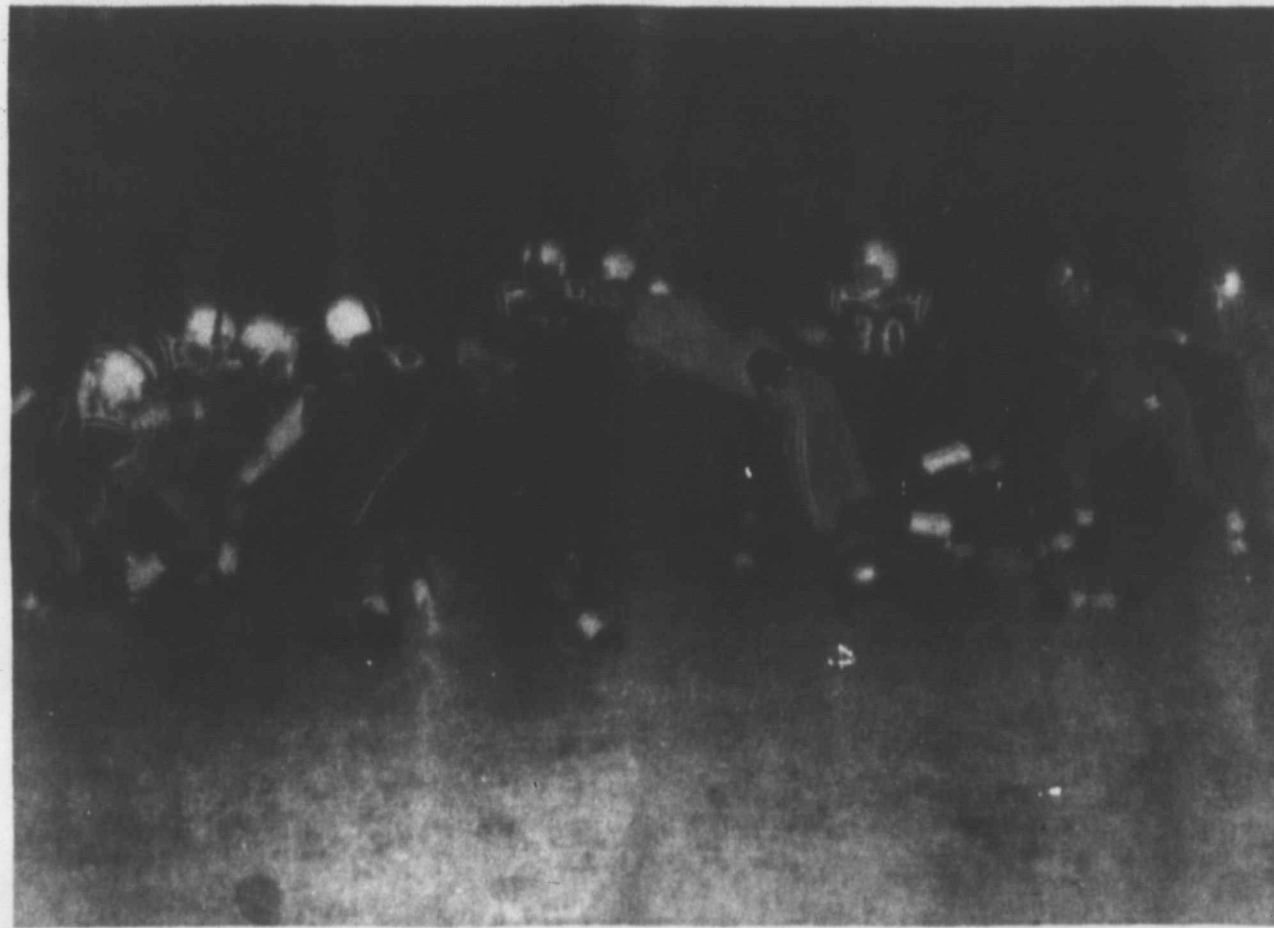

Scout News

The South Plains Council is an association of communities in a 20 county area in Texas. The function of the council is to provide those services to individual Scout Troops, Cub Packs, and Explorer Posts that they cannot provide by themselves, and to extend the Scouting program to all boys.

1. Activities — to stimulate Unit program, including camps, service projects, courts of honor, Explorer conferences and many others.

2. The Camping Program — including the operation of Camps Tres Ritos and Post, providing overhead operation such as maintenance, insurance, etc.

3. Field Service — a staff of ten trained executives who work full time in Scouting to help the 3200 volunteer leaders succeed.

4. New Scouting Units — where they do not now exist, so that more boys may develop leadership through Scouting.

5. Leadership Training — giving Scoutmasters, Den Mothers, and other men and women who work directly with boys the necessary training for their important jobs.

6. The Scout Service Center for the entire 20 county area, where records are kept, badges issued, bulletins published, and efforts of volunteer leaders coordinated.

A great many men serve boys through Scouting as Scoutmasters, Troop Committeemen, District

personnel, and executive board members, to name a few. All of these persons and the organizations that sponsor Scouting Units render hundreds of hours of service. The Sustaining Member matches with his membership fee the hours of time these people give. The Sustaining Member gains satisfaction according to his ability and opportunity.

Sustaining Membership Fees are one of two main sources of income for the South Plains Council. The Council participates in several United Fund campaigns. In those communities friends of Scouting become Sustaining Members in addition to their pledges through the United Fund.

In areas of the council where there is no United campaign, citizens are asked once each year to support Scouting through their Sustaining Membership in the South Plains Council.

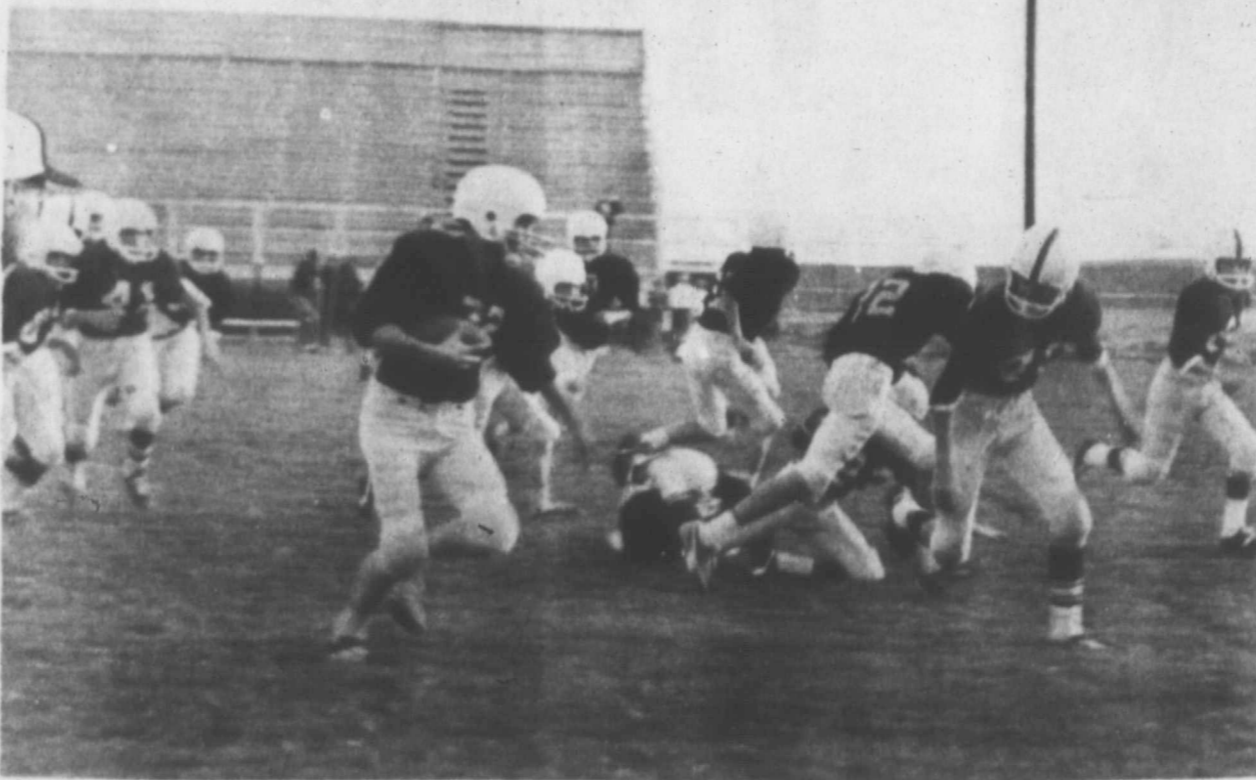

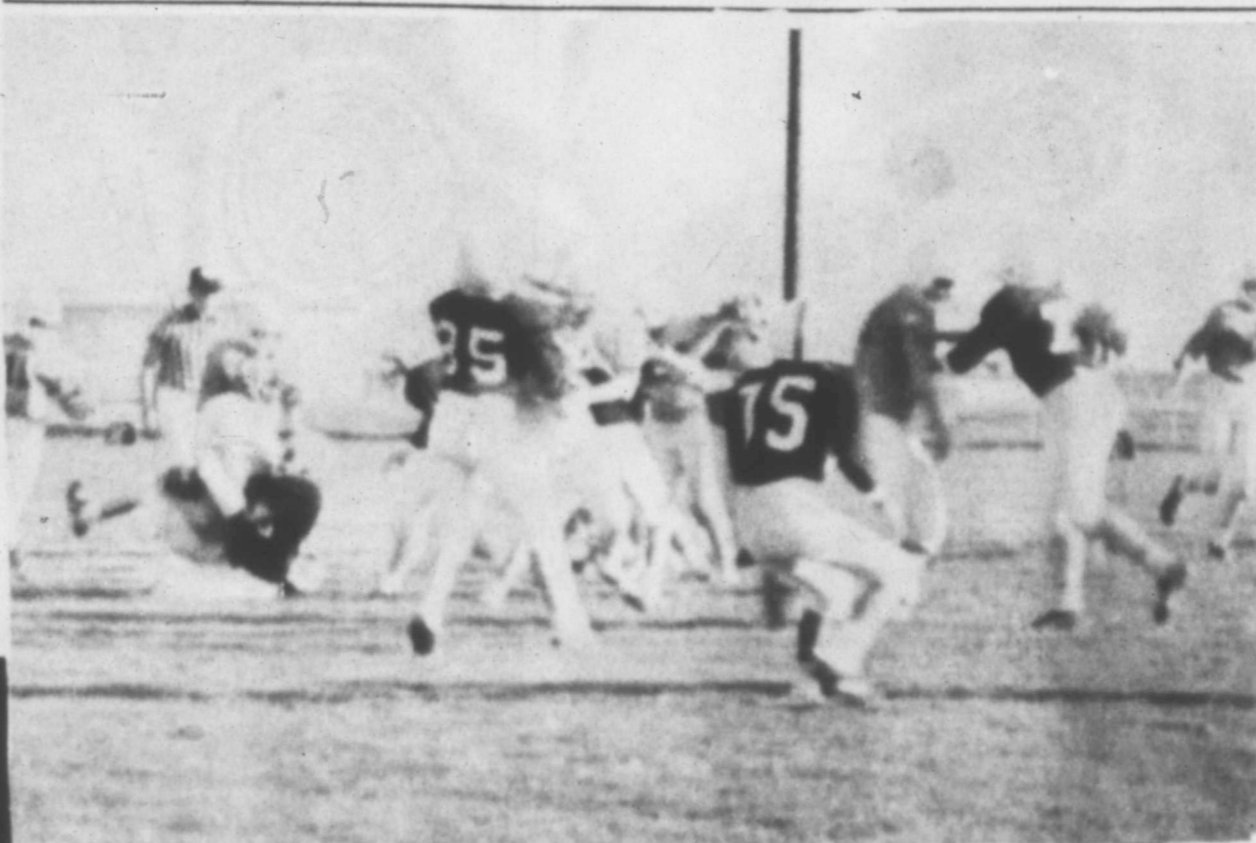

Election Ballot Change May Confuse Some Voters

Two factors may cause some balloting confusion in the November 5 general election, election officials in Texas forecast this week.

The two factors are:

1. A new State law has inserted a new top line on the paper ballots so that persons desiring to vote a "straight party ticket" may do so by making one mark. This new line is expected to confuse not only the "straight ticket" voters, but also the "split ticket" voters.
2. "Split ticket" voters are expected to be more numerous than ever before, especially since there is a third party, the American Party, and it has candidates for only President and Vice-President and no other offices.

Voters are cautioned to be certain that their ballots are properly marked so that their intentions will not be subject to interpretation by election officials.

The "scratch" method of voting, which some people prefer, is still permitted. However, voters using this method are cautioned to be certain to mark through all names in all three party columns for which they do not wish to vote.

There are 19 counties in Texas that use voting machines. As in the past, one lever can be pulled to vote a "straight ticket." To vote a "split ticket," individual levers should be pulled for each candidate of the voter's choice.

Persons who are uncertain as to how to operate a machine should contact one of the election officials before entering the voting booth.

Voting machines are scheduled to be used in the following counties: Bell, Bexar, Brazoria, Cameron, Dallas, Ector, El Paso, Galveston, Gregg, Harris, Hidalgo, Jefferson, Midland, Nueces, Potter, Randall, Rusk, Smith and Tarrant.

ROTARY CLUB MEETING HELD

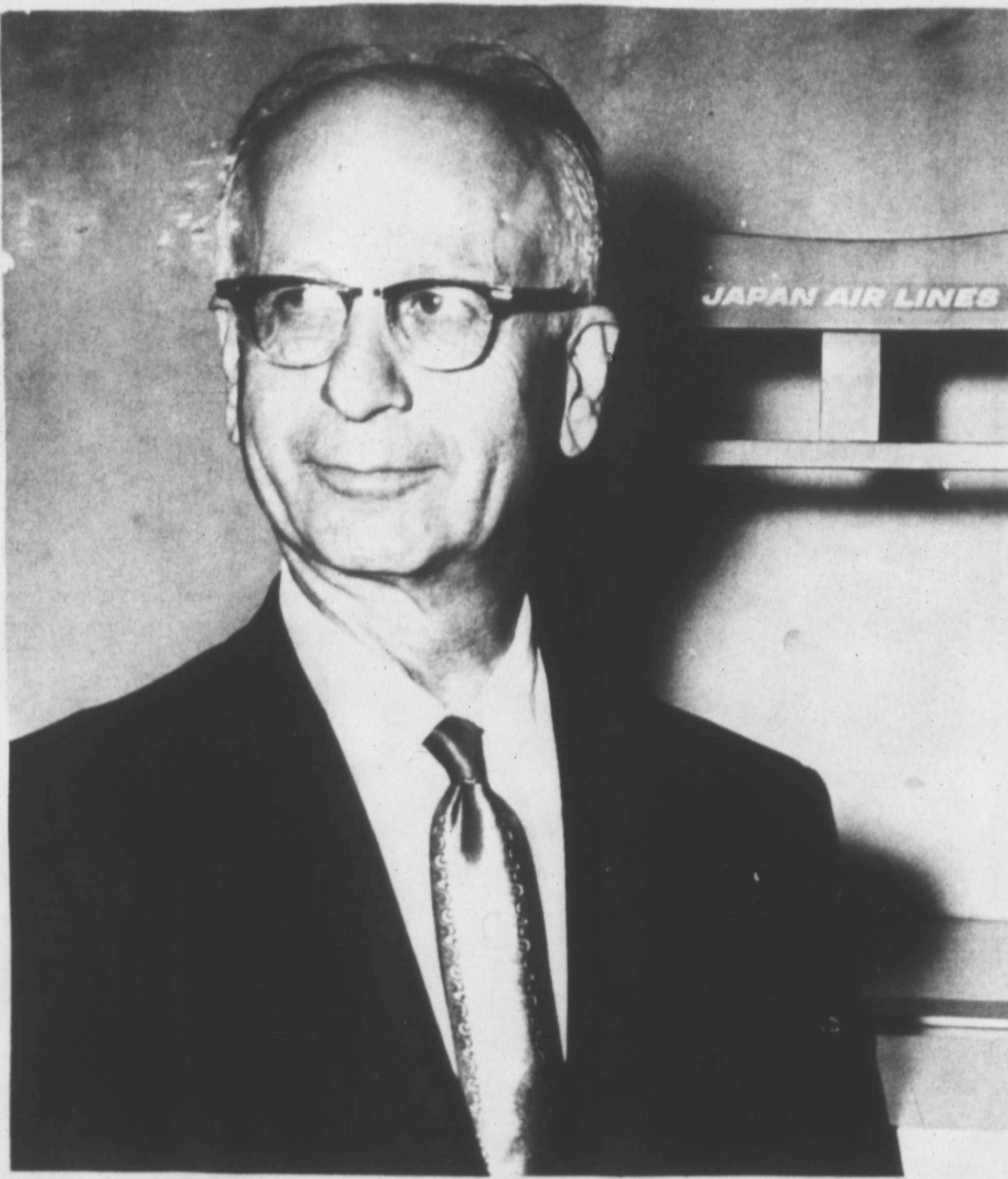
Some 19 members and seven visitors, including two high school seniors, Dex Baker and Dick Black, attended the Rotary Club meeting Wednesday.

TOPS TO USE BREATHALYZERS

Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that 62 breath analysis instruments will be placed in operation over the state on Friday, Oct. 25.

The "Breathalyzers" will be utilized in the highway patrol's driving while intoxicated enforcement program. The 62 instruments going into the field Friday are the first of 90 purchased by the DPS for use in 80 of the state's most populous counties where the DWI problem is greatest. The remainder will be placed in service when delivered by the manufacturer.

Driving while intoxicated suspects who consent to the test will accompany the highway patrolman to an office where an instrument is located. There, the suspect will blow into a tube attached to the Breathalyzer and

the percentage of alcohol in his blood will register on an indicator.

"Drivers who drink contribute significantly to the traffic death toll in Texas," Speir said. "We believe that use of the Breathalyzer will enable us to more

effectively enforce the state's traffic laws," he added.

In the Lubbock District instruments will be located in the following cities:

Lubbock, Plainview, Haskell, Wichita Falls, Mineral Wells, Brownfield, and Bowie.

Bill Clayton Named On Committee

State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake was today elected to the Executive Committee of the Interstate Conference on Water Problems, holding its annual meeting in New Orleans.

The Interstate Conference on Water Problems is composed of State water officials, river authority officers and legislators throughout the United States. It is affiliated with the Council of State Governments with offices in Washington, D. C., Atlanta, Chicago and San Francisco.

The Interstate Conference on Water Problems concerns itself with all aspects of water conservation, development, pollution control and other water-related problems throughout the Nation. Its officers and members closely follow congressional legislation and federal agency regulations on water subjects to assure that the rights of the States and local areas are fully protected from federal encroachment and domination. Officers of the Conference are often called upon to testify before Congressional Committees on water legislation.

Only one other elected State official, Henry Stucky of South Carolina, is on the Executive Committee with Clayton. State water officials who also serve on the Executive Committee are Reinhold W. Thieme, Vermont; Calvin T. Watts, Louisiana; Francis W. Montanari, New York; Herbert Lambert, Utah; Norman Billings, Michigan; Herbert A. Howlett, New Jersey; Robert R. Lee, Idaho; and Othie McMurry, Iowa.

A person must continue as a legislator or state official to remain on the Executive Committee of the Conference.

Through Clayton's efforts at

New Orleans the Resolutions Committee recommended to the Conference that during the next year particular study would be given to the 160-acre limitation in the law governing projects of the Bureau of Reclamation. The conferees attending were impressed with Clayton's arguments on this subject, so it is anticipated that the Interstate Conference will soon take an official position urging modification of the existing federal law which was considered too stringent.

While at the Interstate Conference on Water Problems, Clayton finalized arrangements with the Bureau of Reclamation for a West Texas area tour by Calvin Watts, Assistant Director of the Department of Public Works, Louisiana, John Pegg, Chairman of the Mississippi River Commission from Vicksburg, Howard Boswell, Executive Director, Texas Water Development Board, Leon Hill, Amarillo Regional Director of the Bureau of Reclamation and Harry Burleigh, Chief Engineer of the Austin office of the Bureau of Reclamation on November 7th and 8th. This tour is considered vital in proving the future water requirements of West Texas. Helping in the tour arrangements with Clayton will be Water Inc. and the High Plains Underground Water District.

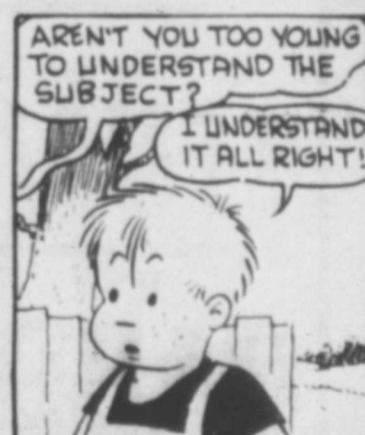

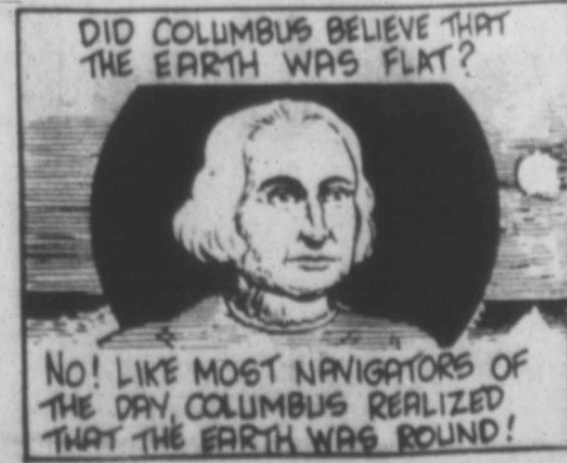
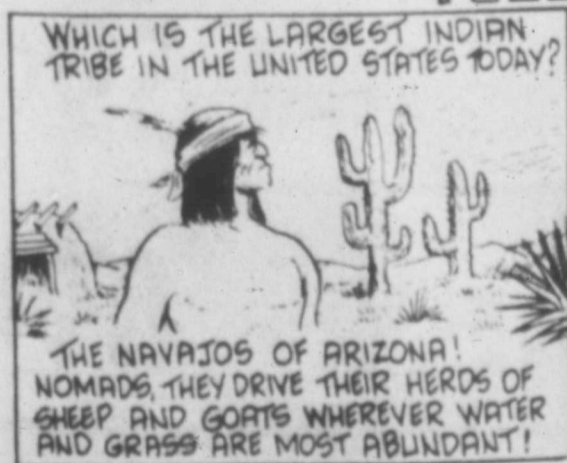
