Every Week Should Be Poison Prevention Week

This week is National Poison Prevention Week, and parents would do well to heed the following rules. Look also for the public service message sponsored on these pages by the local pharmacies.

- Keep your medicine cabinet up-to-date in this manner:
- Keep only what you need -- don't collect.
- Throw out any liquid medicine that shows of discoloring, caking, cloudiness . . . or no label. Buy small amounts and renew more often.
- Don't save left over prescription unless your doctors says so; don't use anyone else's medicine.
- Shake all fluids well before using.
- Cap bottles, tubes tightly -- store as directed.
- Keep poisons clearly marked, put on a high shelf or locked up. Ask yourself if you need to keep each one and know the antidote for the ones you save. Seal top with tape.
- Dispose of old razor blades and never take medicines in the dark -- read and re-read the label first.

Deadline Stressed For Medicare Registration

Parmer County citizens over 65 are eligible for coverage under the Medicare program according to Joe VarZand, Parmer County Agent. All persons concerned with the Medicare program should contact their local Federal Social Security Office now to obtain detailed information.

All senior citizens should know the provisions of the program. If you are 65 years of age or over -- and not receiving Federal social security or State old-age assistance -- it is important that you visit your Social Security office immediately. This means you, even if you are working full-time or if you are not receiving any social security benefits.

The Social Security Administration has advised that such persons are eligible for Medicare. Qualified persons will need to make a decision concerning the program before March 31.

We are interested in the senior citizens of Texas understanding any program that affects them -- and the Federal Medicare program is one that is extremely important to them. Because of this, we urge that senior citizens who are not drawing State welfare or Federal social security contact their social security offices to learn the significance of the program to them before the deadline of March 31.

The local county Extension Service office advises eligible persons who desire detailed information about Medicare to contact their social security office. There is an office in Clovis at 102 W. 5th Street that serves Bovina, Farwell and Lariat. Friona is served by the office in Amarillo located at 1006 Adams Street.

Palo Duro Canyon cuts a spectacular 120-mile gash through the Texas Panhandle. Six miles wide and more than 700 feet deep, the canyon is considered one of the truly geological wonders of the State.

Patriots Shape '66 Conquest

A combination of rugged natural beauty, the pride of a great state and the hustle of an alert community brought realization of a fond dream for Texas Panhandle patriots, according to Will E. Odom of Austin, Chairman of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

All of these mighty factors means converting picturesque Palo Duro Canyon State Park into a permanent reminder of what coordinated effort can accomplish, he said.

Currently plans are being made to invest approximately a quarter of a million dollars, as authorized by the last Legislature plus a substantial added sum from matching Federal funds, in varied improvements.

A key part in the dramatic success story, centered around a rugged area once known as a forbidding rock jungle, is the history-minded Panhandle Heritage Foundation.

Now officials of that area-wide organization are meeting with nationally celebrated Paul Green to shape the summer production of the musical drama, "TEXAS."

Meanwhile, young people at West Texas State College are here already mastering the vocals for the show which depicts development of the West. They received college credits for this effort.

Thus the Pioneer Amphitheater, financed originally by the Foundation, will mark another triumph by playwright-poet Green, North Carolina Native, who for years has re-created glories of the American past to inspire national belief for the future.

This year's production run of nightly shows will be from July 1 through Labor Day.

Selections will run the whole scale of band repertoire from the stirring marches of Sousa to classics of Friedeman and Tschaiakowsky. Unusual instruments such as the post horn, the celeste and the English hand bells will be presented with the evening's music rounded out with solos, trios and quartets with band accompaniment, Latin American music and novelties. 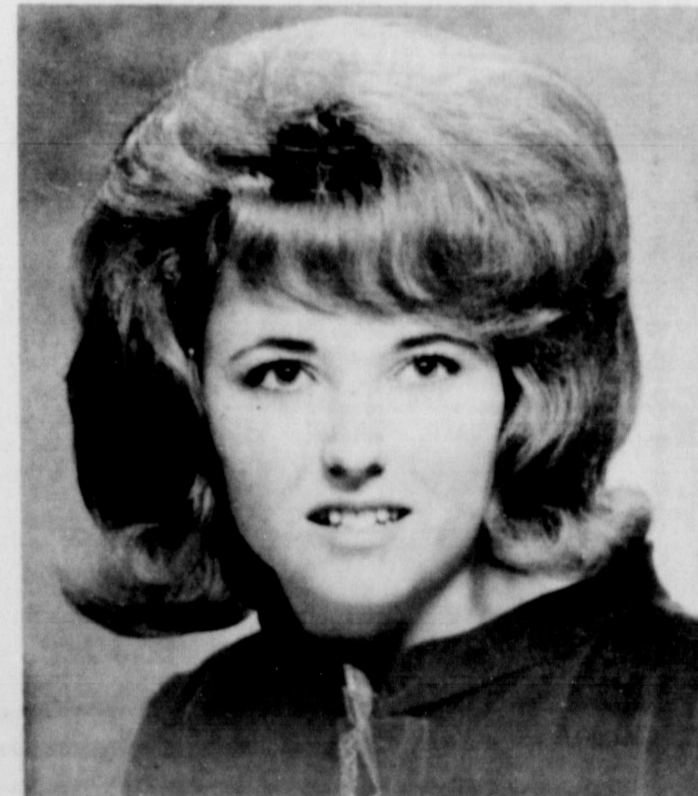

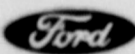

Janet Rushing Scores 15 As Queen Bees Win

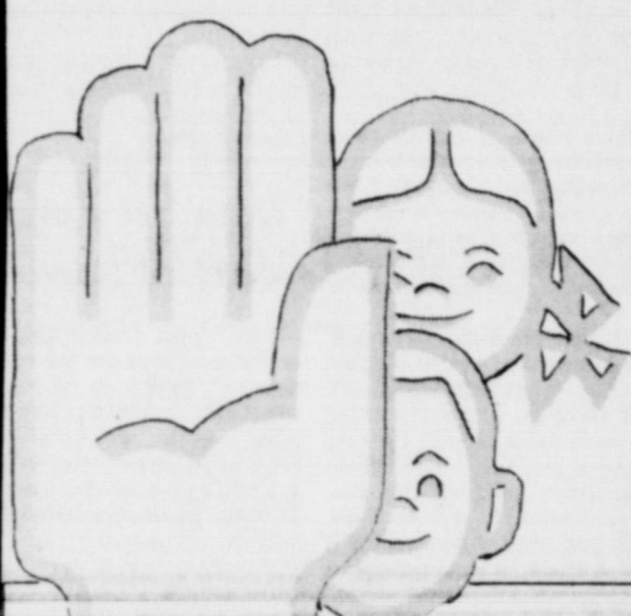

REPORT SHOWS

1965-66 Cotton Had Quality Deficiency

The 1965-66 South Plains cotton crop was lower in quality than the 1964-65 crop, according to W.K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the USDA.

This season's crop was one of the largest ever harvested on the South Plains but was slightly lower in grade and staple and much lower in micronaire than the 1964-65 crop.

Final harvesting figures of this season's crop have not been completed but estimates indicate that approximately 2,175,000 bales will be harvested. The 1964-65 season produced approximately 1,863,000 bales. Fifty-six per cent of the South Plains cotton this season was classed in the White grades and the remaining 44 per cent in the Light Spotted, Spotted and Timed grades. During the 1964-65 season, 64 per cent was classed in the White grades and 36 per cent in the Light Spotted and Spotted grades.

The average staple length of the South Plains crop remained the same as the 1964-65 average -- 30.0/32nds-inch, or 15/16 of an inch. Average staple length was very good during the

early part of the season but declined as the season progressed.

The most significant aspect of this season's crop was the low average micronaire. Only 35 per cent of the crop was in the desirable category of 3.5 and better, compared to 63 per cent of the 1964-65 crop. Wasty cotton made up 8 per cent of this season's crop, compared to only 3 per cent of the 1964-65 crop. Micronaire began declining in October and continued to decline as the season progressed. During the week ending October 19th, 90 per cent of the cotton at Lubbock had micronaire of 3.5 and better. During the week ending December 21st, only 27 per cent was in this desirable category of 3.5 and better.

Soybeans In Texas

-- Soybeans are becoming an important cash crop in Texas. Last year some 80,000 acres were harvested and production was up 30 per cent above that for 1964, reports R.J. Mears, Extension agronomist at Texas A&M University. The per acre yield in Texas is 28 bushels an acre, one of the highest in the nation. Until recently, Texas production was centered on the South Plains but areas are now developing in the Red River Valley, Gulf Coast and along the Brazos River.

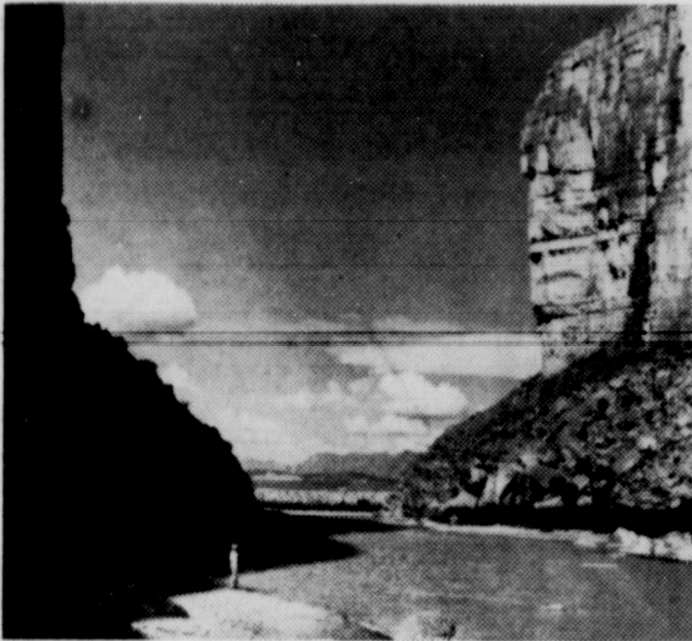
