WANT TO LIVE to be more than 100? Well, here's how you do it, according to a survey reported by Hal Boyle of the Associated Press, who noted that the United States now has an estimated 13,000 persons over 100 years old.

A WATER consulting firm in Pasadena, Calif., says a family's income determines its water consumption. "The higher the standard of living, the more water is used by the people," said an engineer for the firm. "It stands to reason that a home with a dishwasher, washing machine and two baths will use more water than a home without as many modern conveniences."

This firm's survey showed that residents of Beverly Hills, where per capita income is \$4,929, used an average of 313 gallons of water a day, while residents of Compton, where per capita income is \$1,727, used an average of 89 gallons a day.

What they're saying is the rich folks are all wet, a situation which the Federal government attempts to remedy by soaking the poor.

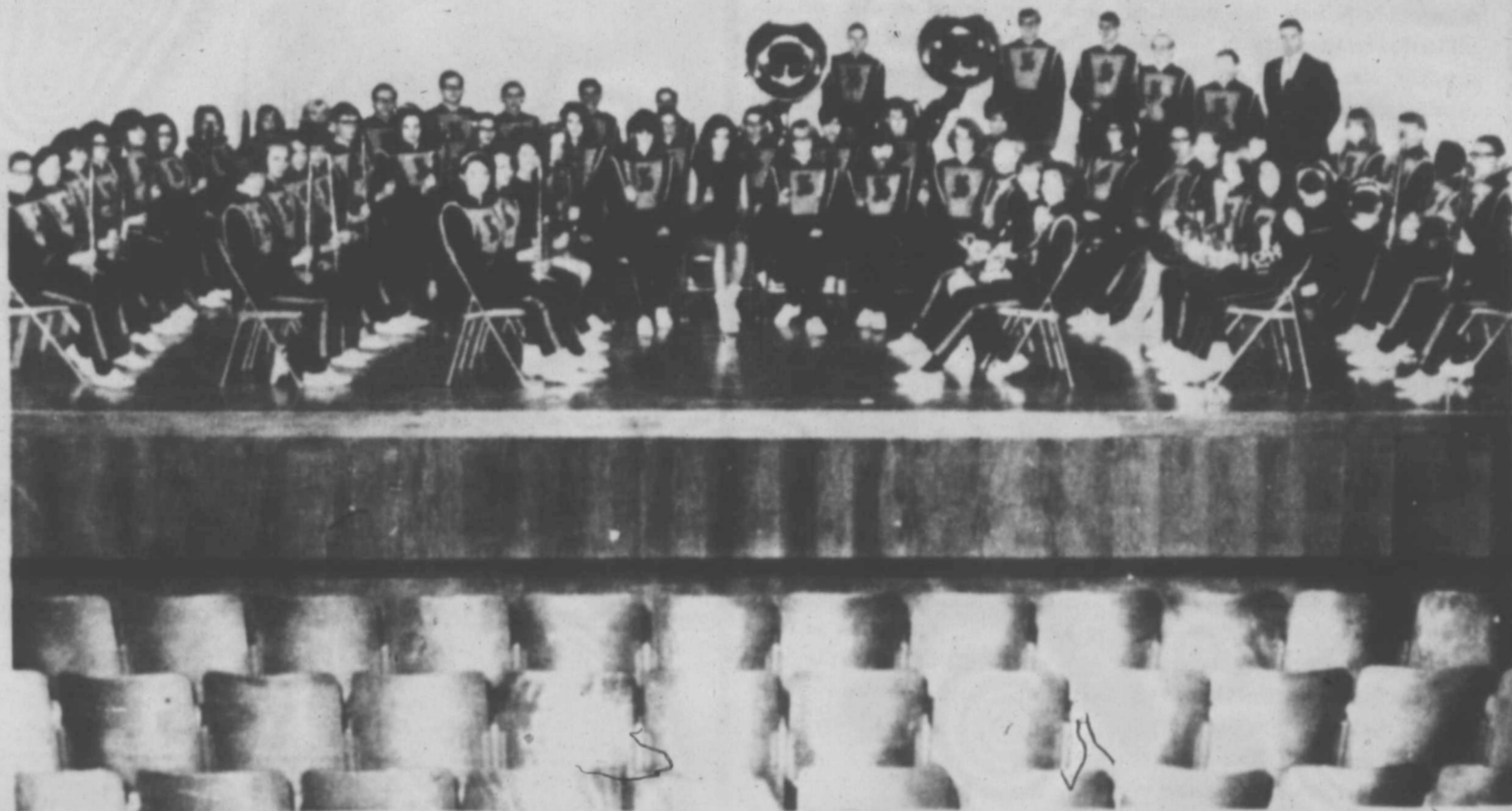

TRI-STATE FESTIVAL ON HORNET BAND SCHEDULE

May 1, 2, 3, 1969 are the dates that members of the Sudan Hornet Band are looking forward to with much anticipation. These are the dates of the Tri-State Music Festival held annually in Enid, Okla. The Tri-State Festival is sponsored by Phillips University of Enid, and endorsed by the Oklahoma Music Educator's Association and the National Association of Secondary School Activities.

The annual Tri-State Music Festivals are music Education events. Originally planned for bandmasters and students from a three state area, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Texas, the festivals provided real incentives, and have grown steadily in attendance and scope. In over 36 years of the Tri-State Music Festivals, 300,000 Tri-State participants have scattered throughout the world. This year an estimated 12,000 students from several states will attend. Suggestions of participating directors have stimulated interest in the Festivals, Adjudicators' recommendations are reflected in improved musicianship of the students and the organizations of the Southwest. The festivals are held to serve student interest, and to stimulate individual and group participation in music.

The great amount of time, effort, and money expended in producing the festival is dedicated to the schools who are interested in improving their musical organizations, to their progressive music directors, to the individually talented student musicians, their parents, and to the administrators of schools who understand and appreciate the great values of cooperation and comparison the festivals offer through music competition. Some truly distinguished musicians have been instrumental in the growth of the Festivals and have helped maintain the emphasis on the educational aspects. Through the years, featured soloists and clinicians have been outstanding and varied. This year's distinguished soloist clinicians include the following: Joe Morello, famous drummer with the Dave Brubeck Quartet; Doc Severinsen, director of the Tonight Show Orchestra and famous trumpeter; Skitch Henderson, New York City; James T. Matthews, director of Bands at the University of Houston; and composer John Cacavas, New York City, to name a few.

High Scholastic-ideals of Phillips University, the sponsoring institution, serve to guide in directing the purposes of Tri-State toward the advancement of musical performance and appreciation.

Enid, the sponsoring community, is ideally located near the geographic center of the United States and has the facilities to entertain the Festival. The city will be gaily decorated for the visiting musicians and the citizens are friendly, keenly interested in the festival, and most willing to provide housing and assistance.

The Sudan Hornet Band will be entering two of several contests sponsored by the festival. They will enter the Concert Band Contest and the Sight Reading Contest. They will be striving for a 1st Division at the festival.

The Sudan Band Parents are shouldering the responsibility in sending the high school band on this educational trip to Tri-State. The Band Parents are sponsoring the High School Band in a Mid-Winter Concert Thursday, Feb. 27. The Concert will be held at

Dr. Ray stressed which cotton varieties are suitable for this area.

A rule of thumb that he recommended in selecting the best variety is: to look for the cotton with the greatest yield; look for the cotton with the highest micronaire; and look for the cotton that is strongest and of the greatest length.

The Ag. club meets each third Tuesday of every month. The

Is Great Society Possible Now?



Is the Great Society dead—now that Lyndon Johnson has moved off the center of the stage?

Perhaps a better question would be: Was the Great Society, as propounded by LBJ, ever a really attainable objective? And a closely related question: Is a Great Society possible in this imperfect world?

A young Puerto Rican in New York—one of six children in a family which is now fatherless—has his own idea about this.

"Real Great Society"

Without waiting for someone to step in with massive financial assistance, he set about, five years ago, to create what he calls "The Real Great Society."

He and a few others—who believed in helping themselves and others with what resources they had available—began to assist elementary school children in their neighborhood with reading and writing.

When people saw what these high-school young people were doing, they wanted to help them. The Astor Foundation gave them \$15,000, then followed this with two other grants of funds.

Now the young man, Angelo Giordani, who is a senior in college, is directing the operation of a school for drop-outs, where young people who have dropped out of the regular school system can study and attain a high-school equivalency diploma, fitting them for entrance into college.

"I'm interested in all people," Giordani says. However, his work has been primarily among

Puerto Ricans because, as he puts it, "Where there's a weak segment of our society, we have to build up that part of it first."

"Love Thy Neighbor" While Giordani calls his organization "The Real Great Society," it seems to be a manifestation of the commandment, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."

While other dissatisfied young people are shutting down great institutions of learning with their divisive and disruptive tactics, here is a young man who is putting into action the concern for others which is the foundation stone of real progress.

When we learn that, far from being idealistic and unrealistic, Jesus' principles are the only sound basis for a really great society?

When the Master was asked, "Which is the great commandment?" His reply was—you remember—"Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind."

"And," He added, "the second is like unto it, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."

When we have a Great Society, it will be built on this principle.

Massive hand-outs from the public treasury will not do it. Destructive attacks on our system of higher education will not do it.

Following the commandments of the Master will bring about the Great Society.

Medicare Fees Remain The Same

The monthly premium older people pay for the voluntary medical insurance part of Medicare will remain at the present \$4 for the period July 1969 through June 1970, John G. Hutton, Lubbock social security district manager, noted today.

The premium covers half the cost of protection that helps pay doctors' and surgeons' bills and a variety of other health care expenses. The other half is paid out of Federal General revenue.

Of the population 65 and over, 95 percent are now enrolled in the supplementary medical insurance program, Hutton said, up from the 91 per cent enrolled when the Medicare program began on July 1, 1966.

A new enrollment period opened January 1, Hutton said, and will provide another chance for the protection. For some, those born October 1, 1901, or earlier, and earlier, and those who were enrolled but dropped out before January 1, 1969 - - - it will be the last chance to enroll.

Older people who delay in enrolling, Hutton said, pay a premium that is 10 percent higher for each full year they could have had the medical insurance protection but were not enrolled.

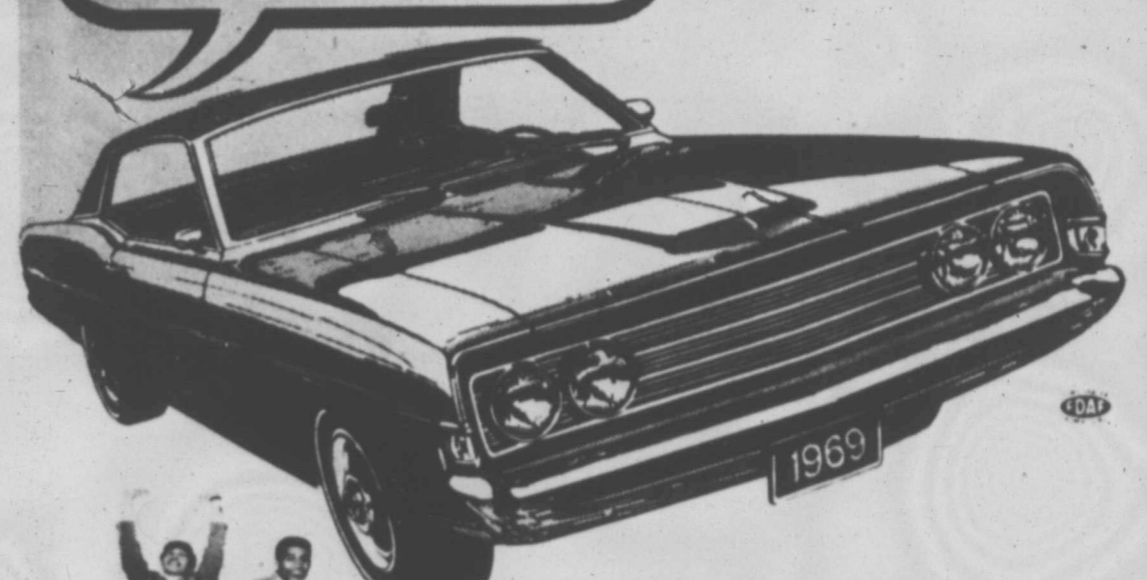
Hutton said that many of the elderly people in the Lubbock and nearby towns who have not yet signed up for the supplementary doctor bill insurance will be receiving application blanks in the mail soon. If they have any questions about how to fill them out or about Medicare itself, or if they do not receive a form, the people in the Lubbock social security office will be glad to help them.
