ONE THING about inflation--wages have made a valiant effort to keep up with rising prices. But in many instances the prices have run off and left the salaries.

A story from the Associated Press recently noted that a family man with two children had to earn about \$14,500 nowadays to equal the purchasing power of \$5,000 in 1939.

The story attempted to answer the question of "where did the purchasing power go?" and quoted some answers from the National Industrial Conference Board, whatever that is. The board says that of the difference between \$5,000 and \$14,000 or so, inflation took \$7,250 and higher taxes another \$2,000-plus.

Taxes, the story said, are presumed to be returned to the taxpayer in the form of services, but inflation "is like evaporation."

The article noted that from December 1965 to the beginning of this year, obstetrical fees rose 21 per cent, baby sitter services 22, legal fees for wills 14, and funeral 10 per cent. House prices vary by areas, but generally rose 17 per cent, restaurant meals 17, movie admissions 27, physician fees 21, fishing rods 15 per cent.

Skirts have gone up, too, and helium is rising, but the AP doesn't mention these.

What most of us would like is a return to 1939 prices while we keep our 1969 salaries.

Public Service Gets Texas Safety Honor

Employees of the Plains Division of the Southwestern Public Service Company, of which Sudan is part, have been honored by the Texas Safety Association for working the entire year of 1968 without a lost-time injury.

The division's 255 employees worked 549,022 man-hours last year without a disabling injury. In addition to accumulating the perfect safety record for last year, the group recorded an exceptional improvement over their 1967 effort which showed a frequency rate of 5.13 disabling injuries for every million man-hours worked.

The division received an award of merit from the Texas Safety Association for Group C, organizations working 200,000 to 1,000,000 man-hours a year.

Jerry Hays of Plainview is the division safety and personnel supervisor, with the safety program carried on through local safety units.

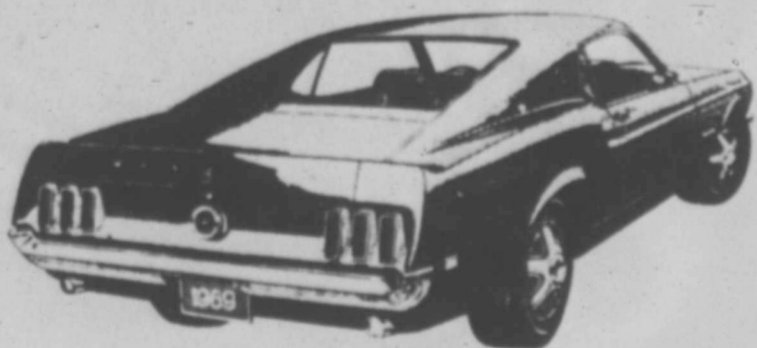

Storm Signal

The storm season is here, and the Sudan Volunteer Fire Dept. and city officials want to instruct the Sudan area residents on how to recognize what the siren signals are when they hear them.

Siren Signal for Fire: Both sirens will sound a continuous blast.

Siren Signal for Storm Alert: Sirens will make an oscillating (up and down tone) sound, with 10 second breaks. The sirens will continue sounding until the "all clear" is given.

Siren switches are located inside the door at the Sudan Fire hall and are labeled "Fire" and "Storm", Fire Chief Pete Phillips said. He also stated that when a weather alert is on, some firemen will be acting as look-out for any storm or tornado, with the cooperation of the Sudan City Marshal Charles Feagley.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR1)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature

enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows:

"Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board provided that the maximum not effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law.

(b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the

Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto.

(c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b.

(d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution.

(e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional bonds to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR1)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature

enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."
