GRATITUDE FOR YOU DEPT. : Three and a half years ago, a guy named Donald Correll in Los Angeles was told by a doctor that he would die within a year. But Correll didn't die.

Correll had\_testified that the doctor's report prompted him to quithis job, causing him to lose 18 years of seniority and pension

SPIRO AGNEW, who by now at least is a household word, surely must have been correct when he said last week that "a vast, faceless majority of Americans is quietly furious" about the campus rebellions and the takeovers by violent minorities. a And President Nixon and Atty. Gen. John Mitchell have come out with some strong statements on the issue, Mitchell saying "the time has come for an end to patience" on the disorders. Nixon said college administrators must take the necessary action to stop cam-

These are all statements that most of us would applaud, especially if followed with action. But not everyone is of like mind. A bunch of college professors (at a convention of the American Assn. of University Professors) sharply disagreed, and many of them supported the lawless students.

It is this support of armed and violent student uprisings that has encouraged it, along with the deplorable failure of the college administrations to squash violent protests quickly and finally.

I've always felt that the private schools could handle the situation better than the statesupported ones, but the sorry spectacle at SMU last week shattered that idea. SMU administrators appear as cowardly as those at Columbia and such places as that.


