The reckless speeder was brought before the judge, who delivered a sermon on speeding.

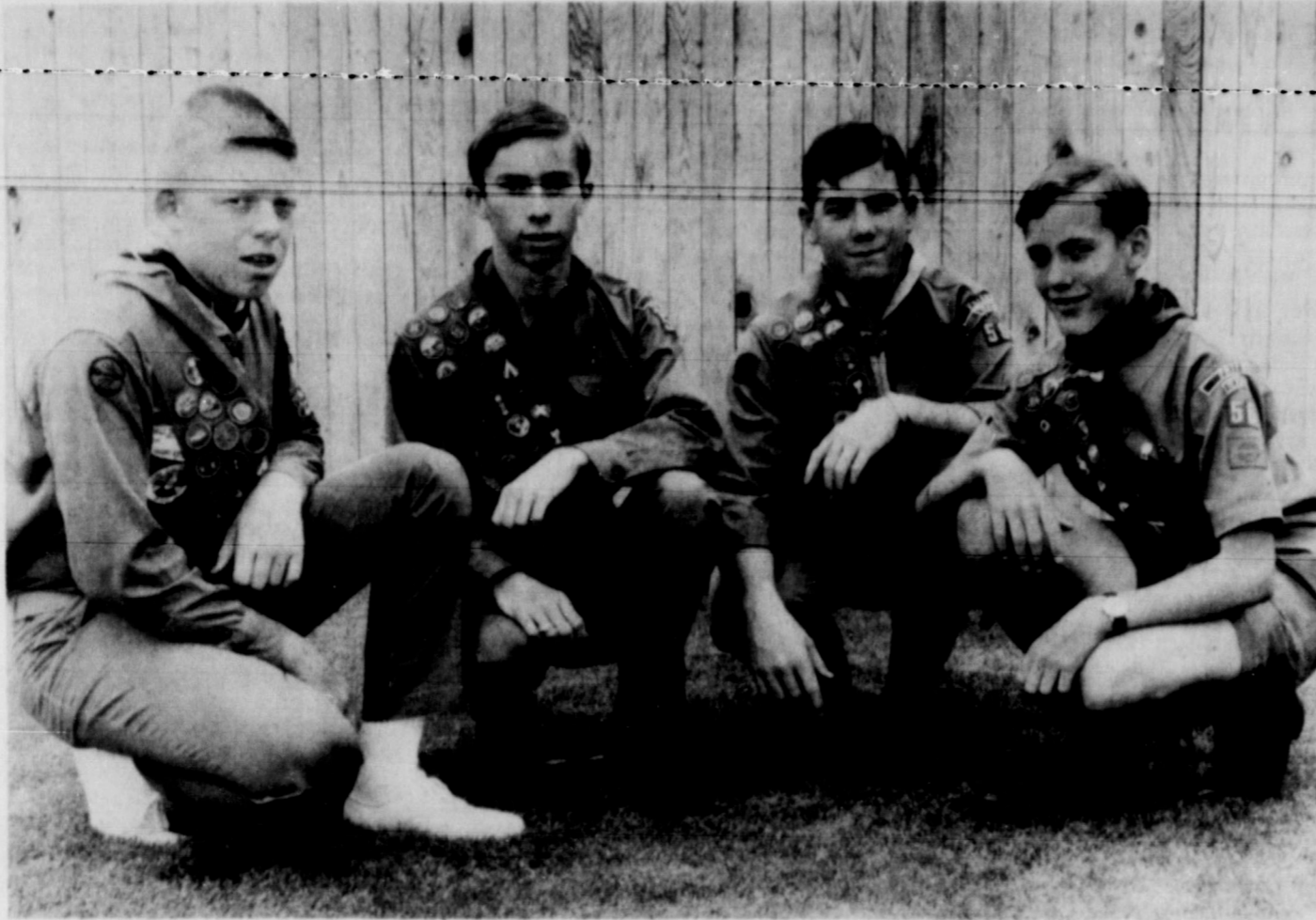
"Aren't you the eloquent one?" sneered the motorist. "I'll bet you can even recite Lincoln's Gettysburg Address."

# Friona Building Totals Stand At \$269,430

A total of 37 building permits had been issued by the City of Friona through June 30, for construction valued at an estimated \$269,430.

The building figure for the first six months of 1966 is down somewhat from the 1965 figure for the same date, which stood at \$378,490.

Although the building total is \$109,060 less than for the corresponding period in 1965, the total for one-half of 1965 compares favorably to two other recent years, 1963 and 1962, each of which turned out to be record years at the time. It is also \$45,980 more than the

figure through June 30, 1961, which was \$223,450.

As usual the major portion of the construction totals went into the building of new homes. The figures in this category compared favorably with last year at this time. Included in the six-month totals were 11 permits for new homes, valued at an estimated \$191,280.

At the same time in 1965, 10 permits for new homes had been issued, worth an estimated \$196,500.

Non-residential construction for the first half of 1966 stood at \$47,300. While this figure was a decrease of \$19,300 from the same period in 1965, it was

practically the same as the first six months of 1964.

Included in the non-residential figures are the \$25,000 addition-alteration job at Reeve Chevrolet; the new Masonic Hall at \$13,700; the coin-operated car wash at \$6,600 and the remodeled auto shop for Jim Guinn at \$2,000.

One column which is below last year's six month report is the addition-alteration column. This year's figure of \$21,050 is considerably less than that of \$109,300 for 1965. However, the 1965 figures were bolstered by the \$70,000 addition to the First Baptist Church.

The year 1966 stands as the all-time record building year for the City of Friona. Including the figures for Friona High School, building in 1964 totalled \$1,978,040. Even discounting the high school figures

the city's building that year totalled \$1,149,040.

Although the 1966 figures are somewhat below those for the corresponding period of 1965, four more permits had been issued this year than for the first six months of last year.

Teachers hired were Mrs. John Messenger, for the second grade, Mrs. Sam Mears, who has not yet been assigned, and Charles Faulkner, as assistant band director.

Two teacher resignations were acted upon by the board. Edra Hudson, assistant band director, resigned to accept a position as junior high school band director at Canyon. Mrs.

John Loehr, second grade teacher, also resigned.

Three men were appointed by the school board to sit on the Board of Equalization at its meeting July 30. They are Clyde Goodwine, Wright Williams, and C.L. Mercer. P.L. London was named as alternate.

Porter Roberts, tax assessor-collector for the school district, reported that May tax collections stood at \$1,094,41.

Superintendent of Schools Alton Farr, reported that he had been notified that the new school bus requisitioned by the board will be a 60-passenger International bus.

## Committee Approves Area For Study In Water Plan

Congressman Walter Rogers announced today the House Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation, of which he is chairman, today voted approval of the Lower Colorado River Basin Project Act.

Included in the bill as recommended by the Subcommittee is an amendment to include West Texas -- that portion west of the 98th Meridian -- in any water resource planning activity affecting Lower Colorado River Basin States.

Congressman Rogers, from the outset of deliberations on the bill, had fought vigorously to

see that West Texas was included in the provisions.

"This means that the Texas Panhandle and High Plains area will be considered as planning is undertaken by the act to make further distribution of western and southwestern water resources," Congressman Rogers said.

"I am delighted that my colleagues on the Subcommittee gave their approval to the amendment. The action demonstrates the awareness of Congress that providing water from such sources as are available is a regional problem and that planning must be undertaken on a region-wide basis," Congressman Rogers said.

The 98th Meridian covers the area west of a line on approximately the eastern boundary of Clay County, the county east of Wichita County. The county seat of Wichita County is Wichita Falls.

"The entire 30-county 18th Congressional District area is covered by the planning provisions," Congressman Rogers said.

The action of the Subcommittee, by a vote of 13 to 5, forwarded the bill to the full House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs. The full committee, on which Congressman Rogers serves as second ranking majority member, is expected to begin deliberations shortly, Congressman Rogers said.

## Friona Roller Rink Opens For Business

Newest recreation facility for the Friona area, Friona Roller Rink, opened this week, adding roller skating to the list of activities available in Friona.

Robert Taylor, former teacher at Friona High School, is proprietor of the new business. It is located on Fifth Street just off Main, in the building which formerly was the home of Parmer County Implement Company.

Admission to the rink is 65 cents per person for each session. A session is normally two and one-half hours. For those who have their skates, the charge will be reduced to 50 cents per session.

Sessions are to be held at 2 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. on weekdays. On Saturdays two sessions will be held in the afternoon, at 1:30 and 3:30 p.m., plus the 7:30 p.m. session.

Taylor invites the public to visit the new establishment.

It welcomes church groups and others to use the facilities for skating parties.

Taylor has three year experience in the skating business having worked with Bill Gillespie, former skating proprietor in Slaton and Lubbock.

There are currently 62 pairs of skates which may be rented by those using the facilities of Friona Roller Rink, and this will be increased to 100 pairs shortly, Taylor says.

Wednesday night's session will start at 8:15 p.m.; only one session will be held on Sunday from 2 to 4:30 p.m.

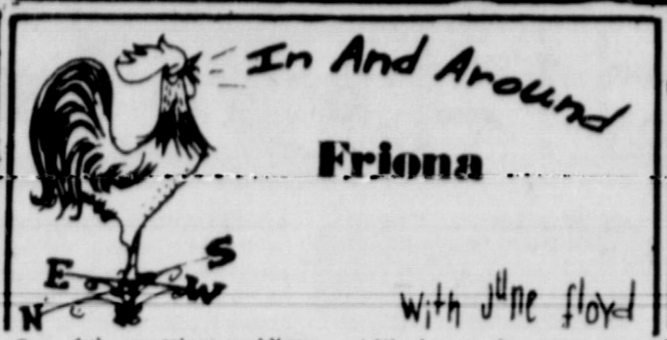

**On The Farm  
In Parmer County**

**COTTON INSECTS**

Most cotton fields are squaring pretty good and now is the time to check your cotton for fleahoppers.

Examine the main stem terminal buds (about 3-4 in. of top of plant) of 100 cotton plants at several representative points in the field. As cotton reaches the fruiting stage, apply control measures when 15-20 fleahoppers are found per 100 terminals. As plants increase in size and fruit load, larger populations may be tolerated without serious damage. Base later treatments on numbers of fleahoppers and on damage as indicated by excessive loss of small squares. Apply sprays at 7-day intervals.

There is one additional chemical that is recommended for fleahoppers that is not recommended for thrips and this is trichlorfon (Dylox).

All of the thrip control insecticides will work on fleahoppers. Repeat application of trichlorfon at 3-5 day intervals as needed.

This has been one year where thrip damage has been pretty severe on cotton that didn't receive any insecticides. Be sure and check for fleahoppers and blasted squares that are a sign fleahoppers might be present.

**SHOULD I OWN MACHINERY**

The question is often asked me, "Can I, or can't I, afford to own a combine or hay baler or other pieces of machinery. The question, of course, cannot be answered with a simple "yes" or "no." But there is available some information which may make the decision easier.

For instance: The decision whether or not to buy a certain piece of machinery should be based on a simple economic theory called "principle of opportunity cost."

The theory means your profits will be the greatest if your land, labor and capital (money) are used where they add the most to your income.

Simple stated, the opportunity cost of owning a piece of machinery is the amount of income you would give up if this money was invested in the next most profitable place in your business.

Before buying, you should estimate the breakeven point in the profitability of owning the machine opposed to hiring the work custom done. When estimating the breakeven point, be sure to consider more than just your own acreage on which you'll be using the machine. Consider the possibility of doing some custom work yourself.

Some advantages to hiring work custom done are; reduces amount of capital invested in machinery, can produce crops that require equipment that a farmer cannot economically own, risk of timeliness may be reduced by hiring more than one machine, custom operators may be more expert operators and do better work and frees farm operation to do other work.

Disadvantages of custom hiring are: may not be available when needed, carry noxious weeds and grass from farm to farm, small acreage unattractive to custom operators since they won't make a large profit and not all custom operators do good, conscientious work.

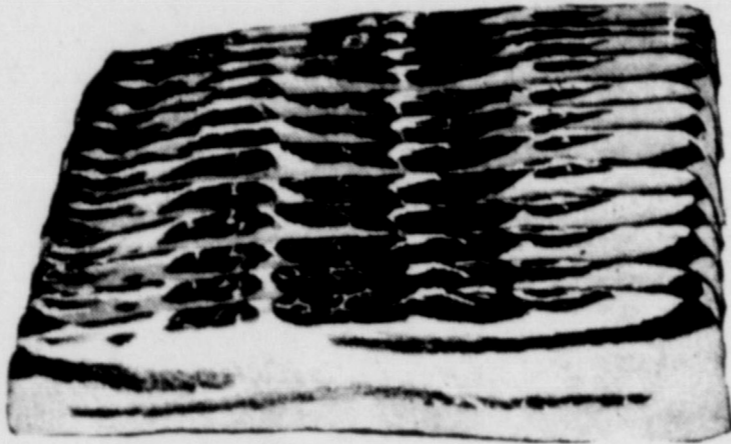

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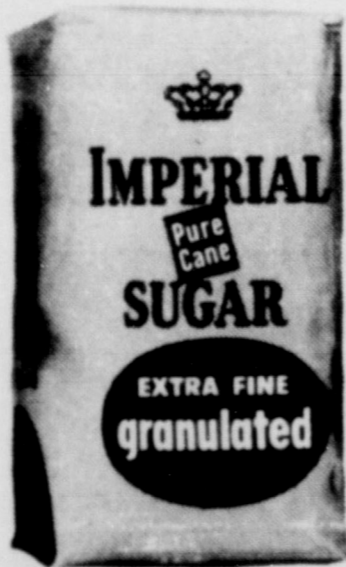
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
