

Scripture: St. Luke 19:1-10 So many words are said, so many things claim our attention, so many opinions tend to sway us from the way we know; so much noise and pressure from the crowd, that sometimes one far out may not be able to see to the center where the action is going on.

"And he sought to see Jesus who He was, and could not for the press, because he was little of stature. "

This man, Zacchaeus, was a rich man, a publican. But when Jesus came to Jericho, evidently Zacchaeus had heard of Him and wanted to see Him as He was passing by.

So, rich and holding a high position as tax collector for the government, yet his desire was so great that he forgot this "dignity" and ran out in front of the crowds and climbed uu a sycamore tree in order to see Jesus, for he "was to pass that way. "

Then Jesus looked up and saw Zacchaeus in the tree, and told him to hurry and come down, for He must abide at his house

Zacchaeus was hated by most of the Jews, first because he was rich and they were so poor, but most of all because of his job as tax collector. So when Zacchaeus heard Jesus call to him and say he was going to his house, he came down hastily and joyfully.


