The Texas Water Plan

Dear Editor:

I have read many articles about the Texas Water Plan and have studied the effects of the plan on the future of Texas. The thing that concerns me most is letters to the editors which express non-truths about the Texas Water Plan. Of course, I realize there are those who would like to turn our state back to the birds, animals and barren lands, but I think most Texans are more concerned about human needs. The Bible teaches that God created all things and his highest creation was man. To man he gave the charge to "Be fruitful and replenish the earth, and subdue it." I hope we do not forget these commands and principles when we try to provide for man's needs.

The Texas Water Plan is big and will be costly, but the benefits Texans and their economy will receive from implementation of the Plan will be much, much more than the cost. Our cities and industries will continue to grow if provided ample water supplies and our agriculture land will be able to feed and clothe the increased population of the future. The actual financing of the plan will be at the expense of the users of the water. Constitutional Amendment No. 2 on the ballot August 5 would authorize an additional \$3.5 billion in bonds to the Water Development Board Fund. This fund has already helped more than 60 cities in Texas by lending them money at interest to provide water facilities for their people. The \$3.5 billion will be a continuation of this program with additional loans being made to political subdivisions for meeting their water needs for municipal and industrial use in the years ahead. However, it will all be coordinated and incorporated in a state-wide plan. The plan also considers fresh water inflows for the bays and estuaries to provide an ecological balance in those areas. The enhancement to fish and wildlife will be tremendous as well as refreshing and scenic to the tourist along with all the recreational benefits. Water for agriculture is provided in the plan, but this water will be furnished in cooperation with the Bureau of Reclamation and the Corps of Engineers. Before projects can be approved by Congress, the Bureau studies must show that benefits will exceed cost and the government will be paid back by water fees under user contracts.

The \$3.5 billion bond program would be for a period of 40-50 years as need arises. The bonds could not be placed on the market until approved in increments by a 2/3 majority vote of the legislature.

The greatness of Texas and Texans will depend on how we plan and provide for the future. In Proverbs it says that "Where there is no vision, the people perish." Texans have vision and will prove it August 5 by approving Amendment No. 2. If

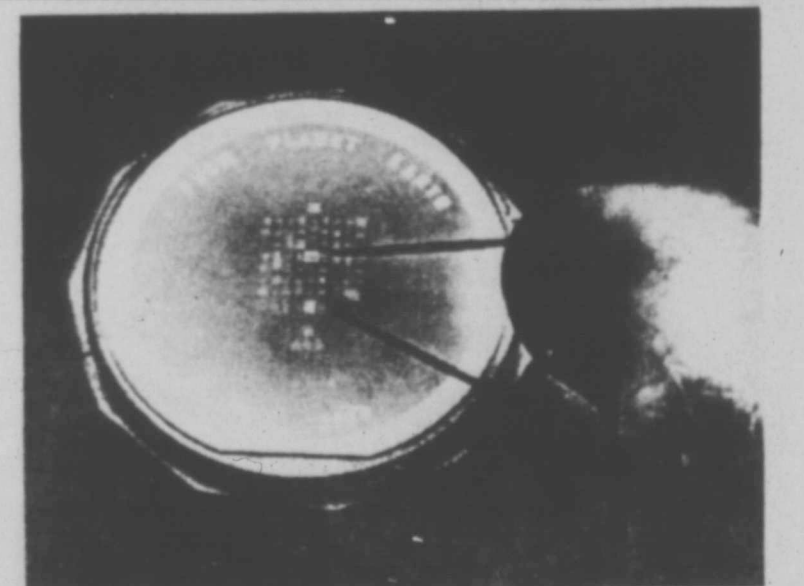

MICRO-MESSAGES FOR THE MOON from 74 heads of state plus four U.S. documents are contained on this 1 1/2 inch diameter silicon wafer in a Time Capsule left on the moon by the Apollo 11 astronauts.

The messages were reduced to 1/200th of their original size by a new information technology process developed by the Sprague Electric Company Semiconductor Division, Worcester, Mass.

By etching the micro-messages in an ultra-thin, 4-millionths of an inch, quartz (silicon dioxide) coating on the silicon wafer, a record able to withstand the extreme conditions of space will remain permanently on the moon to signify the historic event.

The Sprague process allows the pin-head sized messages to withstand temperatures over 1800 F indefinitely, something far beyond the abilities of microfilm and other previous micro-reproduction techniques.

Scripture: I Kings 17:1-16; St. Matthew 28:18

"So he went, and did according to the word of the Lord. . . . Elijah had faith to believe that what God said He would do, He was able and would do it. And the ravens brought Elijah food in the morning and again in the evening (just enough food for one meal at a time!) and he drank of the brook Cherith. But Elijah could have just done nothing, failing to go and do, and have starved to death.

Many of us say we believe God's promises; that we love Him because He first loved us, and suffered, and died and rose again to give us hope and life eternal, but sometimes we ACT as if we do not believe God is able or willing to keep his word.

Elijah had a service to do for God—so do I and so do you. Yet we are, I think, prone to be too easily discouraged. Still God has sweet patience and continues to love us, to speak to us, trying in every way to make His will known to us, to make His voice heard by His own children—and He knows who loves Him.

Personal witnessing to God's power, and to His messages to me, are what I offer you in these devotionals as best I can express them as He gives me words—for it is His will that some of us, not one of us should perish, but that all of us should come to know this: that God so loved us that He gave Jesus, His only begotten Son, to die for our sin that "whosoever" believeth in Him, as Savior and Lord, should not perish but have eternal life. Sometimes, even God's born

again children get into a place where we do not know all the answers—but we see not orphans alone in this world for our Father knows the answers and He is our way through any situation.

Once as I awakened in the night, and in meditation I felt a deep need, a hunger for a remembered fellowship and the spirit of joy of that Christian fellowship, and I cried "Where will I get this now?" Suddenly I seemed to hear "God will feed you." Then as I remembered Elijah, the joy came again and there in the night I knew God had fed even me—and I knew He would feed me over and over again whenever I seek Him with a hunger for His righteousness and for knowledge of Him.

Our trouble, as human beings, is failure to recognize that God is not a natural being, but a supernatural. It is our lack of faith to believe that God is able to do all He has promised. That is why some are not saved—because they will not accept God's word that He is able to do what He says and He said that He can and will give you and me eternal life, and will provide the power to overcome, and make a way of escape from, ANY temptation we may have to face. For He said He would not allow us to be tempted above what we could bear (I Corinthians 10:21).

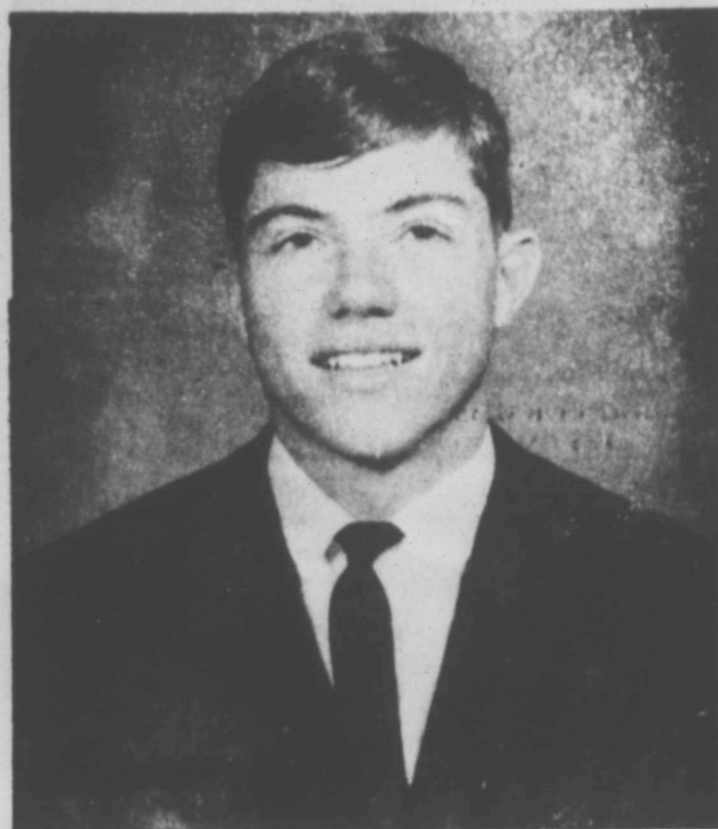
I witness today to the fact that Jesus is "able to deliver thee", for He has delivered me from sin and death and given me a joy and hope and peace and comfort and guidance such as words cannot express. He will give us all this—as much as you or I will obediently use.

Trip to the Moon Raises Questions



"Mankind is going to establish places of abode outside of his home planet, the earth," said Dr. Thomas O. Paine, NASA administrator, shortly after Astronauts Armstrong and Aldrin had landed on the moon. If man does, indeed, journey to other planets and even set up colonies there, will this create a conflict between our deeds and our beliefs?

When God said to Adam, "Be fruitful, and multiply and replenish the earth and subdue it," did He intend to limit us to this planet?

Or is it true, as a famous biologist said, some time ago, that "in the evolutionary pattern of thought there is no longer either need or room for supernatural beings capable of affecting the course of events?" "The earth was not created. It evolved," he said. "So did all the animals and plants that inhabit it, including our human selves, mind and soul, as well as brain and body."

Is Science Against God? Have the achievements of modern science really outmoded faith in God as the supreme Creator? Some, who believe that science and God cannot peacefully coexist in the same universe, declare that science has now displaced God.

When the Russians succeeded in photographing the dark side of the moon from an unmanned satellite, some years ago, the Russian newspaper "Izvestia" reported that a Russian Orthodox priest had been converted to atheism.

On the other hand, Dr. Werner von Braun, director of the NASA Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala., declared recently, in a "Christian Life" interview, "We must learn to consider God as Creator of the universe and Master of everything."

Von Braun says that he considers it as difficult "to understand a scientist who does not acknowledge the presence of a superior rationality behind the existence of the universe as it is to comprehend a theologian who would deny the advances of science."

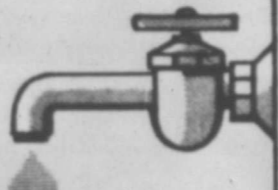

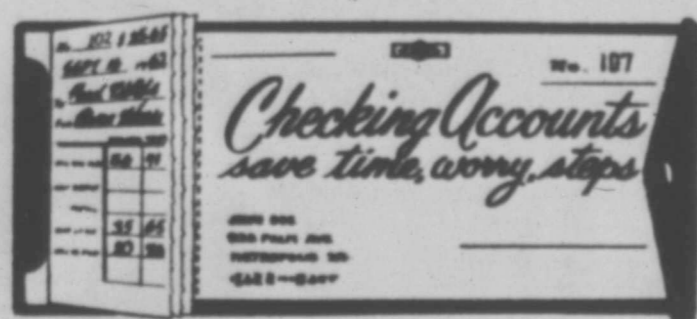
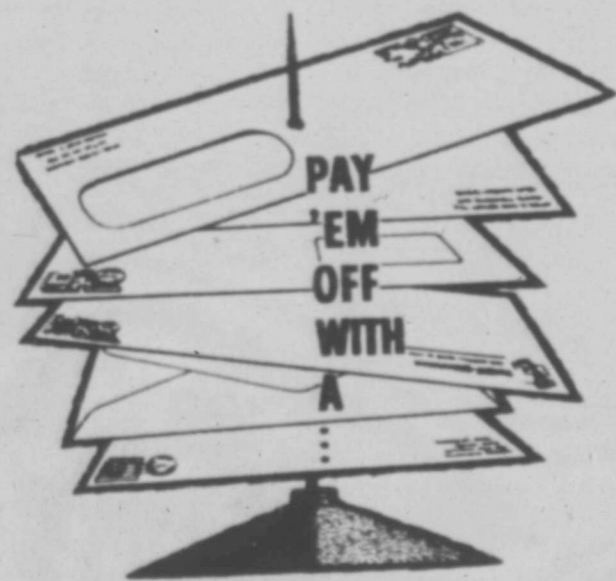


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Japanese Village and Deer Park Attracting Record Throngs

RUTH S.S. CLASS HAS SOCIAL

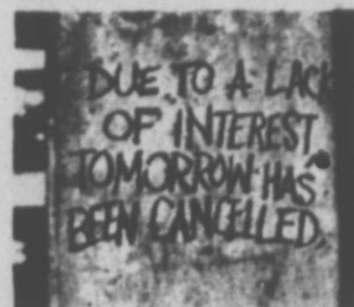
The Ruth Sunday School class of the First Baptist Church met Thursday night in the home of Mrs. Mary Harper for a salad supper and social.

FARM BUREAU SUPPORTS AMENDMENTS 2 & 9

Future irrigation needs for agriculture and drinking water for rural areas are involved in two of the nine proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on in the special election Aug. 5, according to Elroy Wisian of Springlake, president of the Lamb County Farm Bureau.

Proposed Amendment No. 2 (H. J. R. 9) on the ballot would grant the powers and flexibility of operation to the Texas Water Development Board necessary to develop sufficient water resources for present and future economic development of the state. The proposed amendment contains those constitutional changes necessary to implement the Texas Water Plan.

Proposed Amendment No. 4 (S. J. R. 6) on the ballot would exempt non-profit water supply corporation from ad valorem taxation. This would give the many rural water systems that have been set up in recent years the same tax status as municipal government water systems.

The Texas Farm Bureau supported both of these proposals in the recent regular 61st session of the Legislature, Wisian said. In regard to Amendment No. 2,

known lecturers will address the Waco training school, according to Elroy Wisian of Springlake, president of the Lamb County Farm Bureau.

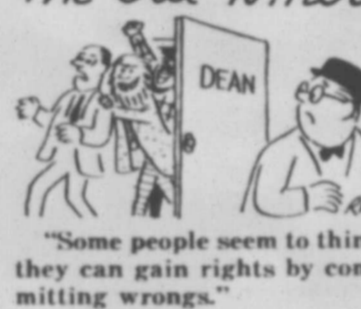
