As far as we could tell, there was not a single paid fan from Memphis here to witness the two district basketball games. At least if there were, they mingled in with the fans on the Friona side, so as to not be conspicuous.

High School principal Raymond Cook says he cannot remember when, if ever, a school was represented at a Friona game with no more than coaches and players as representatives.

It was all the more noticeable since the Friona side was crammed with one of the best crowds of the season.

There could have been a pretty good "gate" except for one technicality--there was absoltely no paying customers supporting the visiting teams.

This is thanks to the latest fiasco by the Interscholastic League which places Memphis in the same district with Fri-

The only thing which Memphis and Friona have in common is that they have a comparitively similar school enrollment. The two towns are 150 miles apart, so have not developed the type of rivalry which usually goes along with district competition.

Usually the UIL shows fair judgment in getting schools in the same general geographic area in a district alignment. However, it didn't work out when they formed 3-AA the past year.

Underscoring the fact that it clearly is a scheduling "freak" is the fact that the games were played on a Friday night -- not a week night. And the Memphis boys are definitely still in contention for

district honors. It was just clearly a case where Memphis fans didn't think enough of it to make the 300 mile round-trip. And, in case the UIL is interested, it marked the first time in history for Friona and Memphis to meet in basketball - some district rivalry!

schools had met only once before in football. That was in 1963, when Friona had cancelled its game with Portales. Memphis turned out to be the only other team in this part of the state with an open date matching Friona's on the occasion.

Memphis in the past has been associated with such rivalries as McLean, Wellington, Clarendon and the like.

Apparently the UIL thinks rivalires can be made - not born. Or, perhaps they're not interested in whether sports have a financial success on the local level.

They've indicated this earlier in another classic example we've quoted previously. This was in District 1-AAA, where they placed Muleshoe High School in a district with such "South Plains" rivals as Dumas, Perryton and Canyon.

The Interscholastic League should realize that 300 and 400mile round trips for games such as Districts 1-AAA and 3-AA have kinda taken the "sport" out of basketball, especially where girls as well as boys (and fans) are involved.

If we were located in as sparsely settled an area as that in far Western Texas, it might be different. But when you consider that Friona's current district is made up of eight teams-it definitely isn't a case of not enough teams. Seems to as this is enough teams for two districts.

Then such possible games as Friona-Memphis, Muleshoe-Perryton, Muleshoe - Dumas, etc. would be reserved for bidistrict rounds, if the teams got that far. Then you wouldn't have to worry about fan support. It would be there for the playoffs.

Back in 1960, while we were a sportswriter for the San Mateo Times in California, we attended the first football game ever played in the American Football League between the then Dallas Texans and the Oakland Raiders.

At the time, the AFL was called an "Upstart" league by many followers of the rival NFL, and predictions were made as to its (Continued On Page 10)

A total of 48 building permits were issued by the city during 1966, for construction valued at an estimated \$339,330. This is \$259,780 below the total construction for 1965, which stood at 58 permits and a valuation of \$599,100.

New home construction in 1966 made up the bulk of the construction in Friona, as is usually the case. There were 15 permits issued for construction valued at \$264,780. In 1965, there had been 20 homes built at an estimated worth of \$405,050.

The all-time record year for new home construction in Friona was 1964, when homes worth an estimated \$818,300 were

Other yearly totals for recent years include \$315,100 in 1961; \$457,669 in 1962; and \$577,350 in 1963.

Non-residential construction in Friona during 1966 stood at \$40,400. This was the lowest since 1961, when the total was \$36,800. Non-residential construction in 1965 stood at \$139,-

Bulk of the non-residential construction total was made up by the \$25,000 addition to Reeve Chevrolet.

the last coming on July 1, 1971. Use of Zip Code in the recipient's address will enable the sender or a mail clerk to quickly determine the proper zone, and thus the rate, for the packaging. The zones will be based on the distance a parcel travels between the 552 sec-

tional centers in the country. By consulting a simple chart which is available at all post offices, the zone can readily identify because the first three numbers of the ZIP CODE represent the sectional center. This replaces a method in which a directory often had to be consulted to locate the proper zone for each of the nation's 33,000

post offices. The new rate will range from 40 cents for a three-pound parcel destined for local delivery to 60 cents for the same parcel to zone 3 (150-300) miles to \$1.05 to zone 8 (over 1800 miles). The new zoning method will also apply to air mail parcel post, catalogs and publishers who pay zone rates on the periodicals.

Williams noted that all parcels mailed between post offices within the Amarillo sectional center will be charged at the first zone rate. There are 85 post offices within the Amarillo sectional center.

The new rates are expected to provide an additional \$74 million a year for the Post Office Department. The later size and weight increases will aid another \$32 million a year. The additional revenue is to help the Department within 4 per cent of costs on parcels post as required by law.
