Bellar's kick was blocked, and the Cowboys made a valiant attempt to score, but had to give up the ball on downs at the Homet 25. So, on the move again, Hanna made a 56 yard run to the Cowboy 9, and three plays later plunged over for another Sudan TD. Bellar kicked the point. Late in the third quarter, Roger Boyles covered a Cowboy fumble on the Hornet 14, and Gore soon scored from five yards out. The run for extra points was stopped.

Sudan's 3rd QB in the game, Bo Lance, tossed a 26 yard touchdown pass to end Roger Bellar. McNabb carried the ball in for a 2-point conversion. Then the Cowboys scored again, with Lewis Howard plunging over from 3 yards out. John Love again made the two-points conversion good. Then the Hornets marched to the Cowboy 10, and lost the ball on a fumble. The final score for the Cowboys came then when QB Gary Linesay passed to Love for a 30 yard TD, but try for two points failed. As the game ended, the score read Sudan 70, Plains 22.

Hanna was top ball carrier with 189 yards rushing, with Bellar having 139. All the Hornet defense did a great job in stopping the Cowboys.

With a 3-2 record, the Hornets will play here again on their home field Friday night against Bovina. Note the game will start at the same time -8 p. m. and will be at 8 p. m. until the DST time changes on Oct. 26.




