# SUDAN EDGES BOVINA, 15-6

The Hornets won their first conference game Friday night as they edged the Bovina Mustangs, 15 to 6. The Hornet defense really got tough in this game as they stopped the Mustangs from capitalizing on some of the fumbles lost by the Hornet offensive teams. The ball changed hands several times in the first quarter either on fumbles or by one of the teams failing to make a first down. The only attempt to get on the score board in the first quarter was the Mustangs attempting a 30 yard field goal, which was short.

Early in the second quarter the Hornets were on the move as QB Rex Boyles passed to end Shawn Potter for a 21 yard gain to the Mustang 30 yard line. The Hornets drew a 5 yard penalty on the next play to move them back to the 35. HB Jerry Bellar broke loose and ran 35 yards to put the Hornets on the score board. Bellar's kick was off to the left, so the Hornets led 6 to 0. Sudan lost the ball two more times on fumbles in the first half. The Hornets had possession on their own 40 yard line as the first half ended, and they were leading the Mustangs, 6-0.

The second half began as a strictly defensive battle without either team getting close to the goal line during the 3rd quarter. The Hornets fumbled 3 times in this quarter, but the strong defense of their teammates kept the score at 6-0.

Early in the 4th quarter, HB Jerry Bellar kicked a 28 yd. field goal to give the Hornets a 9 to 0 lead. But the Mustangs came back the next time they got the ball and made their only touchdown of the game. HB Jimmy Harris ran 40 yds. for the Mustang TD. The kick was short, but this narrowed the Hornet lead, 9 to 6. The Hornets started their final drive of the game on the Hornet 40 yd. line. They moved to the 8, where Bellar thrust over the goal line for his second TD of the evening. Bellar's kick was blocked, and as time ran out the score read, Hornets over the Mustangs, 15-6.

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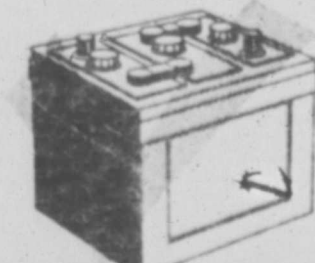
