HORNETS STING WOLVERINES, 17-13

The Sudan Hornets stayed in the conference running, as one of the only two undefeated teams in Class 3A, when they defeated the Springlake-Earth Wolverines, 17-13, Friday night.

In the first quarter with 7:28 left the Hornets got on the score board as Jerry Bellar kicked an 18-yd. field goal. After the recovery of a Wolverine fumble by Sudan's Gregory McNabb, the Hornets had the ball on their own 43-yd. line, and moved to the Springlake 19 as the quarter ended.

Early in the second quarter, Bellar attempted a 25-yd. field goal which was off to the left. With only 54 seconds left in the first half, Terry Bridge carried over from the 2 yd. line for a Wolverine TD. Bridge kicked the EP so as the half ended the Wolverines led, 7-3.

Roger Boyles recovered a Wolverine fumble on the 43-yd. line to start the second frame. The Hornets only had the ball for two plays, then fumbled again on the 40. Later in the 3rd quarter, McNabb recovered another fumble on the 41-yd. line. Larry Hanna made the first TD for the Hornets from 10 yds. out. Bellar kicked the EP. With only 3 minutes left in the quarter, Roger Boyles intercepted a pass on the 40 and ran to the 22-yd. line. Hanna scored again for the Hornets from the 1-yd. line. Bellar kicked the EP to give the Hornets a 17-7 lead at the end of the 3rd quarter.

Early in the last quarter, the Wolverines got on the score-board again as QB Mike Cleavenger passed to End Steve Sanderson for a 45-yd. TD. Bridge

attempted to carry for the conversion, but failed. The remainder of the game was a defensive battle, and as the game ended the Hornets had won, 17-13.

Bellar was top ball carrier with 110 yds. on 20 carries. Hanna was second, with 78 yds. on 22 carries.

The Hornets will play the Kress Kangaroos Friday in Hornet Stadium. The game starts at 7:30p.m. Kress was defeated last week by Farwell, 19 to 18. Sudan has a 6-2 season record with a 3-0 conference record.

The Sudan B-team football team lost to the Springlake eleven in their game here Thursday by a score of 19-12. Larry Baker and Harry Jefferson made the touchdowns for the home-team with attempts for extra points failing.

The Sudan 8th Grade football team won their second game of the year by walloping the 8th Graders from Springlake Thursday by a score of 48-0.

Captains for the game for Sudan were QB Curtis Chester and Guard Roby Lym.

Outstanding players for Sudan were Ernest Jefferson, Mark Hanna, Frank Lopez, and Don Noles. Jefferson scored a total of 26 points with one TD coming after a 70 yard run; Hanna scored 14 points and Lopez scored 8 points. Noles made an outstanding punt of 25 yards.

Sudan gained 10 first downs compared to 3 for Springlake.

Sudan attempted 2 passes that were incomplete; Springlake attempted 2 and completed 1 for 10 yards.

Sudan received 4 penalties for a total of 25 yards; Springlake was penalized 2 times for 30 yds. Springlake fumbled 4 times with Sudan recovering, and Sudan had no fumbles.

The Springlake 7th Graders invaded Sudan territory Thursday to nip the hometown team by a score of 32-12.

Early in the first quarter Mitch Chester ran 51 yards for a TD. Try for extra point failed.

At the end of the second quarter Carroll Legg was stopped short of a TD on the 1 yard line after a 30 yard run as the whistle blew ending the first half.

Mitch Chester scored again in the 3rd quarter ending the scoring for the Sudan team as try for the extra point failed.

Richard Tamplin and Alex Caberera made some outstanding runs after kick-offs. QB Chester passed to Caberera 8 times completing 6 and having one incomplete, and Springlake intercepting one pass.

Springlake completed one pass for 10 yards.

Sudan had 9 first downs, Springlake 6; Sudan 2 fumbles, recovering one; Sudan 3 penalties for 15 yards, Springlake 5 for 45 yards.

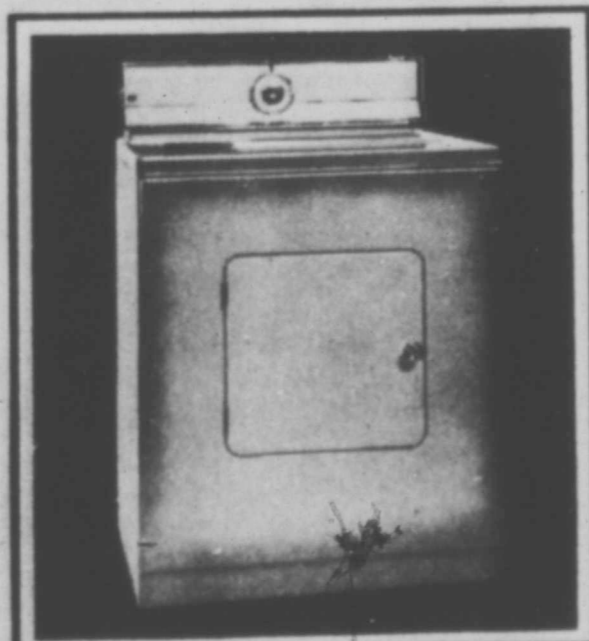
