The Sudan Hornets stayed in the conference running, as one of the only two undefeated teams in Class 3A, when they defeated the Springlake-Earth Wolverines, 17-13, Friday night. In the first quarter with 7:28

left the Hornets got on the score board as Jerry Bellar kicked an 18-yd. field goal. After the recovery of a Wolverine fumble by Sudan's Gregory McNabb, the Hornets had the ball on their own 43-yd. line, and moved to the Springlake 19 as the quarter ended.




