"When you stop to realize that 90 per cent of the scientists who ever lived are living today, you can see that we are in for some startling and unbelievable changes for our world in the future," Waldrop

#### WHAT TO DO **DURING A TORNADO!**

■ THE ROAR is defeaning. It sounds like hundreds of airplanes flying overhead at once. You look into the sky and what you see scares you as much as if there really were hundreds of planes-enemy planes-

A dark funnel cloud is sweeping along between 25 and 40 miles an hour, bursting buildings, scooping up trees and hurling autos about like toys.

This is a tornado. But if you use your head, you have a good chance of escaping unharmed.

Each year about 200 tornadoes rip across sections of the United States killing more than 200 persons. In the last 50 years every state, including Alaska and Hawaii, has been

struck by destructive funnel clouds. Few twisters occur west of the Rocky Mountains, but Iowa, Kansas, Mississippi, Texas, and Oklahoma have more than a fair

Weathermen can't pinpoint where a tornado will occur, but they can and do issue warnings of possible tornadoes, sometimes hours in advance.

Even if you don't hear about a tornado warning, these twisters have certain "habits" that indicate when and where to watch for them. For one thing, most tornadoes occur between 3 and 6 p. m. For another, they usually accompany thunderstorms, especially

hailstorms. And invariably, they travel from the southwest to the northeast.

If you are inside your home when a tornado occurs, open all windows and doors and shut off water, gas and electricity, if you have time. Then seek shelter under a heavy table or other furniture in the basement against the southwest corner

walls. If you have no basement, lie on the first floor against an inner wall.

If you are in your car, you might be able to outrun a twister. Since winds on the left side of a tornado generally are not as strong as those on the right, drive toward the left of the tornado at right angles with the tornado.

If you can't outrun it, seek shelter in a nearby building or lie flat in a ditch if you have to. Don't remain in a car which can be picked up and crushed.

If you have a choice of shelters, select the bottom floor of a steel framed or reinforced concrete building. Large open structures such as churches and halls, won't provide much protection. Of course, a storm celler, cave or some other underground excavation, offers the best protection.

The path of a tornado usually is relatively small, about 10 to 40 miles long and only 300 to 400 feet wide. So, if you act immediately and sensibly, you may be able to save yourself.

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#### On The Farm In Parmer County

We have been seeing and hearing of a few problems in our wheat crop retely. Ever since the hard freeze several weeks ago, people have been asking me about freeze damage. Previously, freeze damage had not shown up until late-

In the past week or two a few white heads or the top part of some scattered heads has shown up. Also, a few scattered stalks are falling down after bending over in usually the second jont area. The freeze apparently damaged the cell structure in the area where these stalks are bending over. I'm afraid that more of this type of damage may continue to show up.

We're also beginning to see rot may continue to show up.

CATTLE HEEL FLIES - Cartle running across the field with their tails held high in the air or standing in water are pretty good indications that heel flies are busy. The animais try to protect themselves in these ways from the eggylaying flies.

Heel flies, the adult stage of cattle grubs, neither sting or bite. Instead, they merely attach their eggs to the hairs on the legs and lower body parts of cattle. As the eggs hatch, the small maggots bore through the skin at the base of the hair, enter and migrate through the leg muscle,s through the abdominal and chest cavities to the esophagus and neural canal for further maturation.

During the late summer and early fall, the larva move to the animal's backbone and each forms a pouch under the skin. After a few weeks, it cuts a breathing and emergence hole through the skin. A month or two later, the full grown grub emerges through the breathing hole and falls to the ground. It develops into a heel fly within a few weeks.

Heel flies can be effectively controlled only while they are in the animal's body. A number of methods and formulas are available to control them, including sprays, systemics, dips, and powders. ## **Brush Control Is** Big Problem

by The Soil Conservation Service

The major cash income of the rancher results from the sale of livestock, livestock products and possibly, from deer. antelope and other hunting permits. The basis for successful commercial ranch operations, however, is production and maintenance of an adequate supply of high quality forage for livestock - year-round.

Brush control as a part of grassland improvement must be carried out as a part of a coordinated, long-ranged plan which includes all the treatment needed to bring the productivity of grasslands and maintain their potential. Controlling undesirable woody plants that rob the operators of their soil and water resources is an essentail first

Reinfestation from seeds and root sprouts usually requires additional control measures in from five to ten years. Good grass management following initial brush control will reduce the frequency of follow - up control measures. Without such management, brush control is Attractive gural mail boxes, such as used by this roadside reader, not economically worthwhile.

The use of chemicals in controlling brush becomes a problem near cropland areas. The danger of drift from herbicides may imperil cotton or other field crops nearby unless timcacti infest over 320 million ing, equipment, and material which minimize this danger are

> The cost of control treatment in itself is a major factor to consider. At best it is an expensive operation that varies widely in cost and effective-Generally, the cost ness. ranges from a low of about \$2 per acre upward.

> Federal participating in the cost of this work on private land is through the Agricultural Conservation Program and the Great Plains Conservation Program of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The second step in range re-

storation is to improve the stand and productivity of the forage plants once the brush has been controlled. Some grasslands habe enough of the desirable forage plant left to make needed imporvement if the grass is given a chance. Most grass on brushland is in low vigor, the result of competing with the brush for sunlight, moisture, and soil nutrients. A rest period following brush control is essential. Other brushland may have so little grass remaining that reseeding of adapted grasses is necessary. Seedbed preparation and price of seed add to the cost. Reseeded areas must be rested for a growing season to permit new seedlings to become established. Deferring grazing following treatment is often the key to successful improvement. Treatment on many acres has been nullified because the grasses were not given a chance following brush control.

The basic need in bringing grassland back into high production is to improve or restore the plants that can produce high quality forage most efficiently under local conditions. Because of the dominance of brush on millions of acres, range restorations will have to consist of a four-point program - (1) control of un-

For those brown patches, off moths. specialist in this field, recommend that over stimulation with nitrogen be avoided as this increases the fungus disease that attack the lawns.

If your favorite shrub or tree seems to be dying, it could be a neglect of watering throughout the winter months -- this often happens especially if little moisture was present during the long winter season. Too often people assume that watering is not necessary during cool weather - which is a mistaken idea.

Although new cedar chests do give protection from moths, it is safer to treat woolens with a good mothproofing agent before they're stored.

This is especially important with older cedar chests. Tests show that red cedar loses some of its effectiveness against moths after 24 months, and white or South American cedar after 12 to 20 months. Researchers also find that

the tightness of a chest is an important part of the mothproofing. Cedar-lined closets also should be tight and woolable from the Extension office ens moth-proofed before stor-

cautions on the label. DARK RINGS ARE HARMLESS

Do you ever wonder why eggs cooked at high temperatures for a long period of time may have a dark ring where their whites and yolks touch?

This is caused by a combination of sulphur in the white and iron in the yolk, which forms ferrous sulphide.

Although it may detract from the egg yolk's appearance, this darkening is entirely harm-

The higher the cooking temperature and the longer the cooking time, the more darken-

ing takes place. By plunging the eggs into cold water immediately after cooking, the possibility of this darkening is reduced. This lowers the egg's temperature and helps prevent the formation of ferrous sulphide.

Immersing eggs quickly and holding them in cold water for a short time after cooking also makes eggs easier to peel.
