I really figured this minor ailment as more of a fever than a cold, and immediately thought of the old adage "feed a cold and starve a fever. " Only I couldn't (and still can't, and never could) remember if it went that way, or if it was "starve a a cold and feed a fever. " The problem always perplexes me wheneverI have a cold or fever.

And I always solve it simply by eating everything in sight, ...

A somewhat similar problem arises whenever we switch to or from daylight savings time. Somebody said they could always remember which way to set the clock by another old sayback. " Or was it "Fall forward and Spring back"?

Being a middle-of-the-roader, I have considered doing this: When most folks run their clocks up an hour, I'll compromise and run mine forward 30 minutes. * * * *


CITY IN NEED OF CHRISTMAS DECORATIONS
