Our goal is to make Texas public schools the finest in the nation. To achieve this, our citizens are urged to take an active interest in the school sys-

tems and to cooperate with their school board, superintendents, principals and teachers."

In issuing the local visitation invitation, Superintendent W. E. Hancock said that some parents need to come to school to see how much the teaching techniques and subjects have changed in recent years. Most home-rooms will display student hand-work and all school personnel will be on hand to answer any questions that you may have on the school policies.

Parents may visit any time, but an Open House is planned for Monday, March 2, at 7 p. m. with refreshments to be served in the cafeteria until 8:30 p. m.

Visitors will be allowed to eat in the lunchroom for the regular student price of 40¢, but are

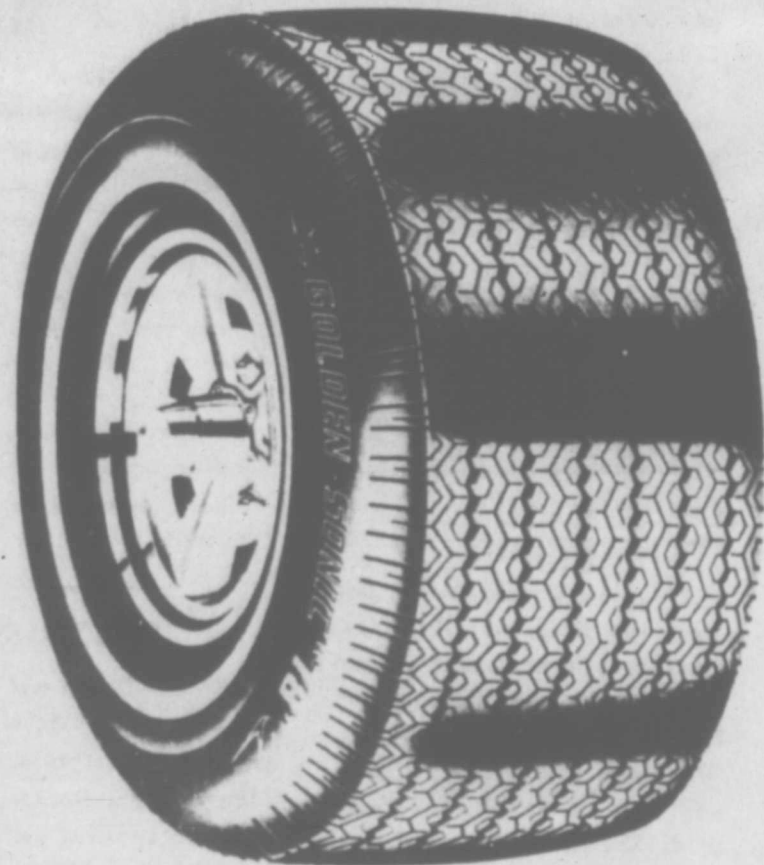
