The disaster emergency relief agencies had set up extensive plans to have a simulated tornado on Saturday night, with people to act as casualties, police, radio operators, Red Cross, Salvation Army, National Guard, Scouts and others to take part.

The real tornado came about 24 hours ahead of the simulated one, which, needless to say, was canceled.

The exercise had been built up extensively by press and radio for almost a mouth shead of time. One guy surveying the fantastic damage in Plainview Saturday morning (estimated to total \$4.7 million) said, "Boy, when they simulate a tornado around here, they really do it up in style !"

screen means there is lightning in the thunderstorm. If the streaks fade slowly, there is a dangerous storm whether there is a tornado in it or not.

If bands become wide and linger, there is a storm in the offing that can cause severe damage or spawn a tornsito. The wider the bands, the more serions the storm is becoming.

The maximum number of nitios away a tornado can be nighted by this method appears to be about 20, but the average number of miles off when denection is made is about five miles-the reason for harte in finding shelter.

Colored or black and white I sets can be used, and an antennh is not necessary. An outside autenna expands the range of detection, however. Lightning can be seen in color on colored sets, but authorities say it is best to turn to black and white for tornado detection.

The reason a tornado can be detected with no antenna or with rabbit ears is that a tomado is in the line of sight, up high, where there is nothing to keep the television set from picking up the electrical frequency of the tor-

This frequency can be picked up on channel 2 because it is on a 55 megacycle band, the nearest television has to the electrical pulse generator of a tor-

This method of tornado detection has been cleared by the weather bureau after finding that it is really more effective than radar in pinpointing a tor nado locally.





Safe driving is not just for motorists. Bicyclists too, have a responsibility to drive safely; to drive a safe bicycle, and to drive it responsibly. - 8. Always use proper hand signals to let motorists know you intend to turn or stop.

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

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce supports the adoption of a farm bill that would support prices at a level that would give farmers an opportunity to operate at a profit. This could be a program similar to what we have had since 1965.

The Federal Government, commodity groups, and our own organization should be encouraged to work on programs that would remove the need for acreage controls, price supports and direct payments. Some of the



programs that would help remove these needs are:

1. The State Department should take more aggressive action to counter Common Market Tariffs on U. S. agriculture products with tariffs on industrial imports from Common Market countries and other countries that bar our agricultural products from their market place.

2. Our government and commodity groups should be more aggressive in promoting U. S. agricultural products at home and abroad.

Parity should be based on the purchasing power farmers had during a base period rather than the average price of a commodity during the past three years. The program should not be extended to other products not now included in the program.

We are opposed to any type of long-term land retirement or whole farm retirement program. We are also opposed to proposed legislation calling for a low level of price support and participating farmers agreeing to "set-aside" a percentage of their tilled land. Many segments of our economy are subsidized for the benefit of the consumer.

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
