Right now hundreds of Americans are being held captive in North Vietnam. A few prisoners have made it back. They talk about bamboo cages.
Malnutrition. Humiliation.
But the North Vietnamese will tell us But the North Vietnamese will tell us
nothing. And it's this silence that makes our appeal more urgent
For the families at home, there is no word on who's alive. Who's dead. Or even who's being held. There is nothing. Except the anguish of not knowing.
Maybe you can change this. By writing to the one man who can change it: The President of North Vietnam.
