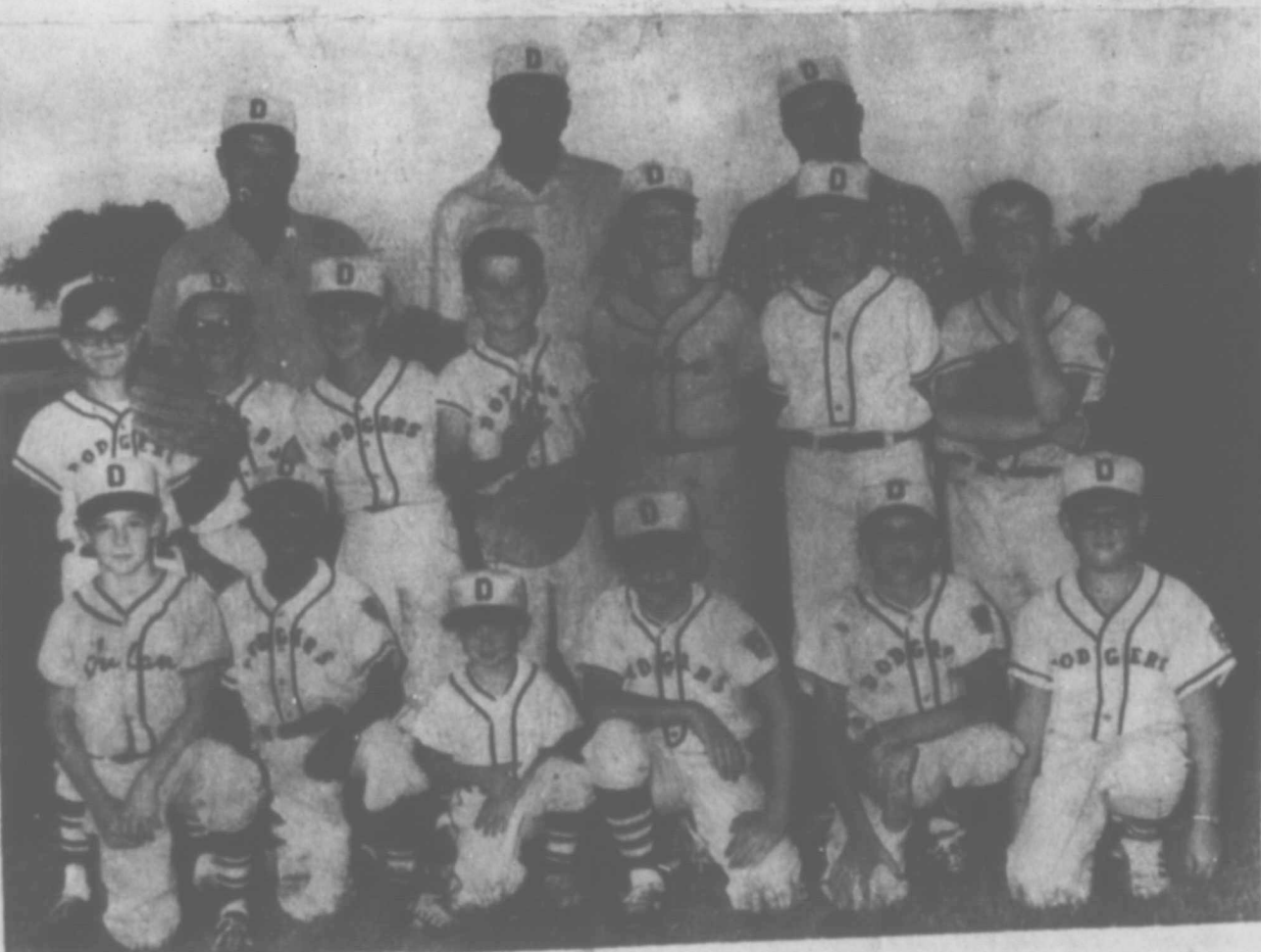
SENIOR CITIZENS TO MEET JULY 10

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

This week is our Nation's birthday. ASCS To Begin '70 Program Payments

The Lamb County ASCS will begin farm program payments for 1970 starting Wednesday. On July 1, \$1,300,000 was to be released.

Payments to the farmers is expected to be completed by the end of September when the total to be paid for feed grain, wheat and cotton will be approximately \$15,960,287. This is \$857,335 more than was paid in 1969.

Producers who earn payments in the voluntary feed grain, wheat and cotton programs will receive payment computation statements along with their payment drafts.

It is most important for producers to retain these computation statements along with their other farm records, ac-

ording to Lamar Aren. The Computation statements provide these important details:

1. Program for which payment is made. (Feed grain, Cotton or wheat).
2. Both gross and net payment, for entire farm and for individual producer.
3. Planted acreage and diverted acreage (if any).
4. Projected yield, used for payment computations.

It is suggested that producers verify their computation statements with their farm records before filing them in a safe place. If producers have any questions, they should get in touch with their county ASCS office as soon as possible.

If farm program computation statements are lost or destroyed, producers may obtain the information from records in the County ASCS Office.

Davidson Chairman For Senate Campaign

Congressman George Bush of Houston has announced the appointment of Jim Davidson of Littlefield as his Lamb County chairman for the Bush for U. S. Senate campaign.

"Everything since the primary has been encouraging," Bush said, "and the enthusiasm of people like Jim Davidson definitely will be a major factor in the months ahead. I'm happy to have him join my campaign team and help in Lamb County."

Bush was elected to Congress in 1966 and in 1968 was the first Texas Republican to be re-elected to the Congress without opposition. He is presently a member of the Ways and Means Committee, the most important committee in the House. He is chairman of the Republican Task Force on Earth Resources and Population. He has actively sponsored legislation concerning urban affairs, bilingual education, setting priorities in federal spending, conservation, and Congressional ethics.

HISTORICAL MARKER TO BE ERECTED

An Official Texas Historical Marker for the replica of XIT's giant windmill will be erected August 28, during Festivities Days, according to Mrs. S. D. Hay of Sudan, chairman of the Lamb County Historical Survey Committee.

The marker will be placed at the windmill, at the north end of XIT on Delano Street in Littlefield.

Dedication plans will be announced in the near future. Made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect, the marker measures 20" by 20" and is sponsored by Littlefield Chamber of Commerce.

The inscription on the marker reads:

REPLICA OF

XIT'S GIANT WINDMILL

"Yellowhouse division of 3,050,000-acre XIT Ranch built (1887) a 132-foot windmill southwest of here. Set in a canyon, it had to be tall to catch breezes and pump water. It was known as the world's tallest windmill until it was toppled by winds in 1926. This replica was erected May 27, 1969. (1970)

The marking of local historic sites and landmarks is part of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee's program of preservation activities.

These include archeological investigations, small museum consultation, and administering the National Historic Preservation Act in Texas.

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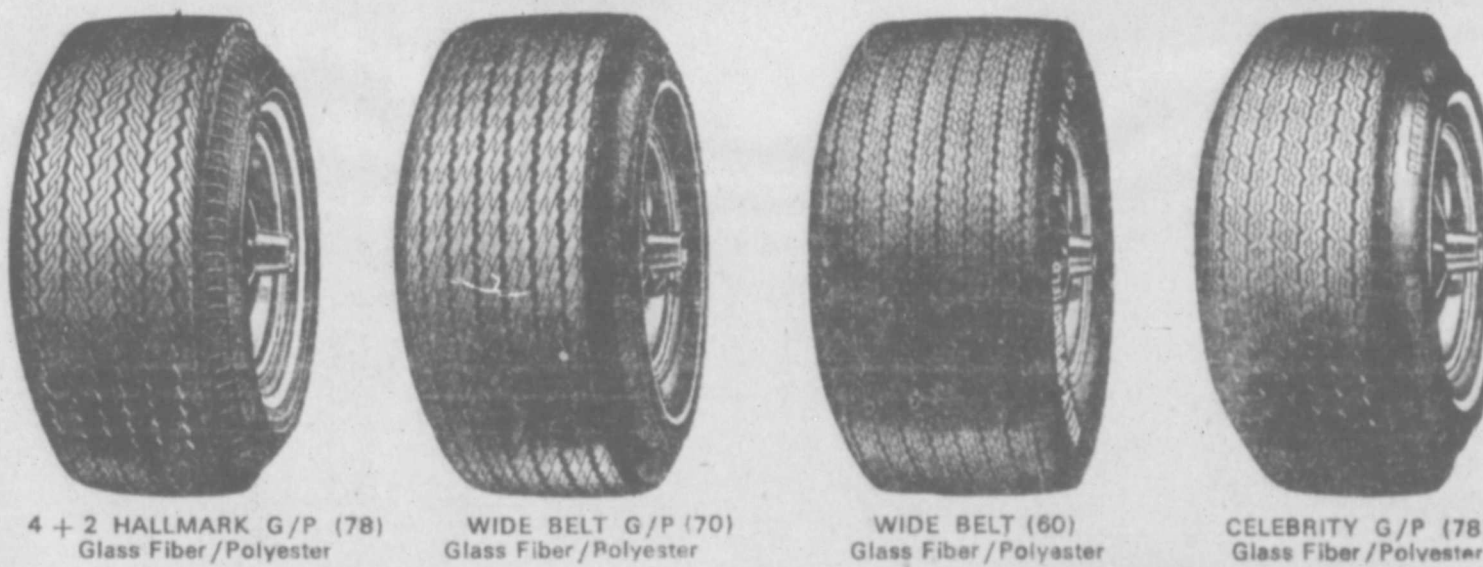

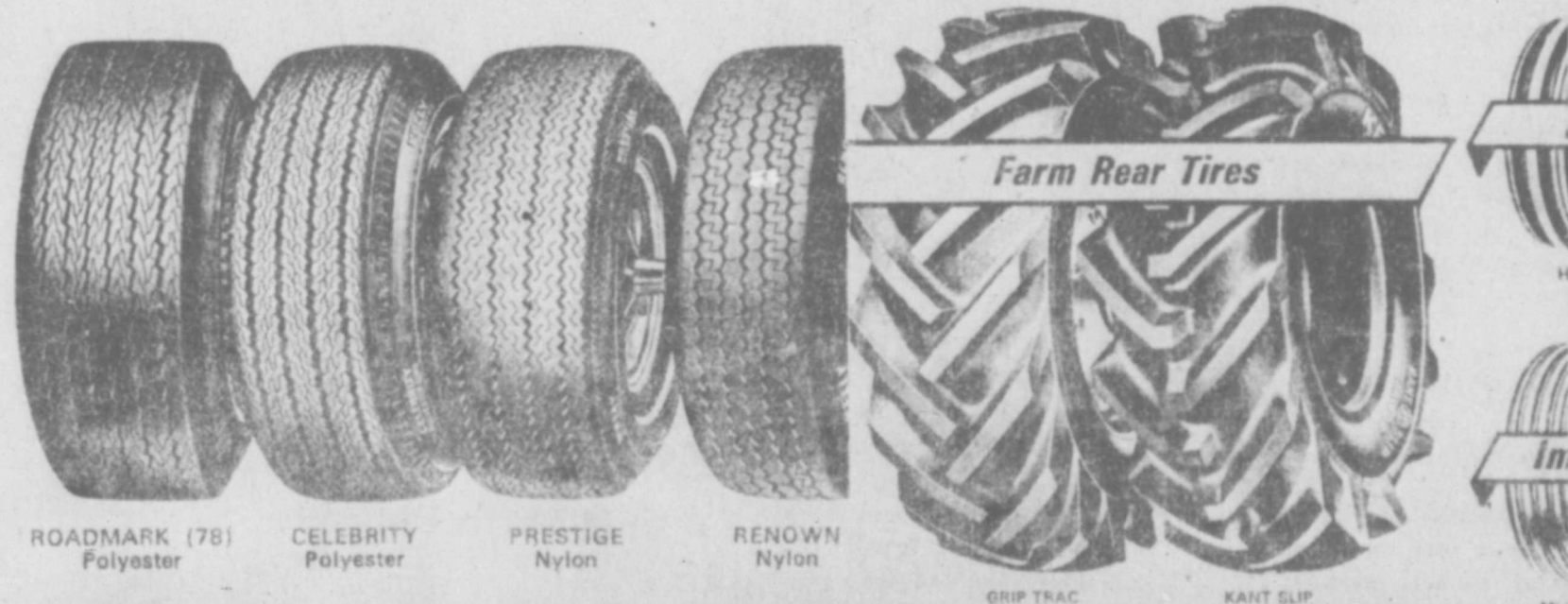

Tips on golfing

Next time you make it round the dog leg to the frog's hair—choose your iron, press your shot, and you'll chip right on the green. Sounds like gibberish? Well, it's golfers' language, and if you're one of the 12 million in this country who consider it your game, you know the terms.

But even the most experienced are looking for tips with the hot summer golf days just ahead. Here are some that will make even a duffer look, feel and act like a pro.

• Wear loose and light colored clothes. Bermudas and a cotton or rayon shirt is just the outfit for fashion and comfort on most courses. Don a golfing hat, cap or peak. It's more than just an accessory. If it's made with an absorbent band that helps keep perspiration off eyeglasses. And bring that umbrella. When the rain's unexpected, your opponent will wish he had one, too.

• Take along towels to wipe perspiration off forearms, face, forehead, and especially hands. Another hint—if you wear a golf glove, carry one or two spares to change when one gets wet.

• Conserve your energy by reducing warm-up to a minimum. Why not limber up with this no-effort exercise? Swing a wedge or 9-iron lazily but smoothly back and forth. Start with a half swing and gradually lengthen it to loosen the wrists and get the rhythm of the club.

• Take buffered salt tablets like Thermo-tabs. They're made to minimize fatigue and to prevent heat exhaustion that comes from excessive perspiration. Two tablets before teeing off, and two again after nine holes will help keep you fresh on the most sweltering days. And Thermo-tabs come in a plastic bottle or handy strip pack dispenser that fits in your golf bag.

By the way, if you didn't quite catch the jargon in the beginning, it simply means that if you make it down a curved fairway to the area bordering the green, select the proper iron, concentrate on your shot, and you'll lift the ball onto the green.
