JUST ABOUT everyone is aware that all the kids are going back in the classrooms in a few days. This move back to the school routine has great bearing on the daily operations of nearly all citizens, because so many of us are either students, parents, merchants, police, teachers, grandparents, employers, or in some other vocation which will be affected.

Many moms who have had kids underfoot all summer will be glad for the respite. The kids themselves, though, seem to have changed their attitudes since I was a youngster (by cracky).

I remember that I was also joyful when school was out for the summer, but that by the time it started again, I was eager to go back. Nowadays, it seems that most youngsters are not at all anxious to go back to school. This mild reluctance is best exemplified by this comment from one of my own kids, when asked about going back to school:

"I hate it."

It perhaps doesn't speak too well for the school and teachers (or parents, either) for a youngster to have this attitude, but then, as most parents know, the kids are prone to exaggerate their feelings. This expressed "hate" probably is no more than a moderate reluctance to return to responsibility.

In all fairness to the students, it must be noted that school is a lot tougher than it was when we went. They take more subjects, learn more, have more activities--too many, in fact. The pressures on our youngsters are too great and are the cause of many emotional problems. We demand too much from them in taking part in too many different activities.

A kid who has to spend all his time with books and homework, then do a lot of outside work for sports, band, PTA, DE, FTA, FFA, ROTC and LSD has little time to be a normal boy or girl. No wonder some of them are not anxious to go back to school.

Pioneer Gas To Increase Service Rate

Pioneer Natural Gas Company Wednesday made application to the city officials of the cities on its West Texas system for an adjustment in the company's general service rate charged for gas delivered to domestic and commercial customers in those cities. The application stated that, if the cities acted affirmatively within the sixty-day period provided by law, the company would accept a rate increase of 16.2 per cent rather than the 19.4 per cent requested.

In announcing the rate request, K. B. Watson, Executive Vice President of Pioneer said, "With the rising costs the company has sustained, it is in immediate need of additional revenue. To avoid any further delay and expense, an increase of 16.2 per cent would be acceptable although a rate increase of 19.4 per cent would yield less than a 7-3/8 per cent return on the fair value of the company's investment. As an indication of the problem, "Watson continued, "the company was forced to pay an interest rate of 9-1/2 per cent on its recent borrowing of \$20 million.

It was further pointed out that the Texas Railroad Commission

had determined the proper charge for gas at the edge of the cities to be 32¢ effective July 1, 1970, up from 28¢.

Either of the proposed rates would keep the consumer cost of gas on its West Texas system considerably below the State average for domestic and commercial use. The general service rate is applicable to this type service.

In the letter transmitting the application, the company referred to the current national publicity concerning the imminent nation-wide gas supply shortage and assured the city officials that Pioneer has maintained an excellent gas supply and is capable of supplying new customers and increased request for service.

Company officials have recently met with the committee that represented the cities in the rate proceedings before the Railroad Commission and with some of the city officials to advise them of the rate request. "We are inviting, and anticipate, immediate studies of our records and other information supporting this application," Watson said.

The application for change in the general service rate was

MAN DIES AT SERVICE STATION

Ben DeLafuente, about 45, who lived in Littlefield and was an employe of Central Compress and Warehouse in Sudan since 1967, died suddenly at the Baker's Deep Rock Station Sunday, 6:30 p. m.

Funeral services are scheduled

Thursday (today), 2:00 p. m. in Littlefield under the direction of Hammoms Funeral Home, Littlefield.

DeLafuente was manager of a Sudan Spanish baseball team. He is reported to have become ill during the game, and after the last inning he said, "I will never play baseball again". Charlie Martinez of Sudan was to drive him home and stopped at the Deep Rock station to buy gas. Lafuente went into the men's rest room, and when he did not return to the car, Martinez asked Lafuente's 14-year-old son to go and check on him. The boy came out to tell Martinez to come see about his father, as he would not move. Martinez did so, and found the unconscious man.

Deputy Sheriff Homer McLaury was contacted. He called Justice of the Peace W. T. (Tobe) Veeren, who pronounced DeLafuente dead at the scene. A Hammom's ambulance picked up the body.

Survivors include his wife and 13 children.

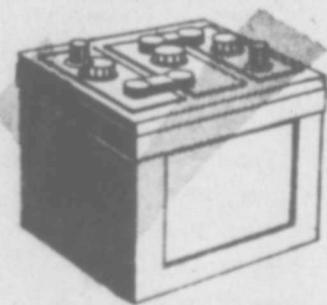


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Flower Talk

Persons will be eligible to become a member of the Lamb County Pioneers organization if they came to Lamb County in 1945 or before.

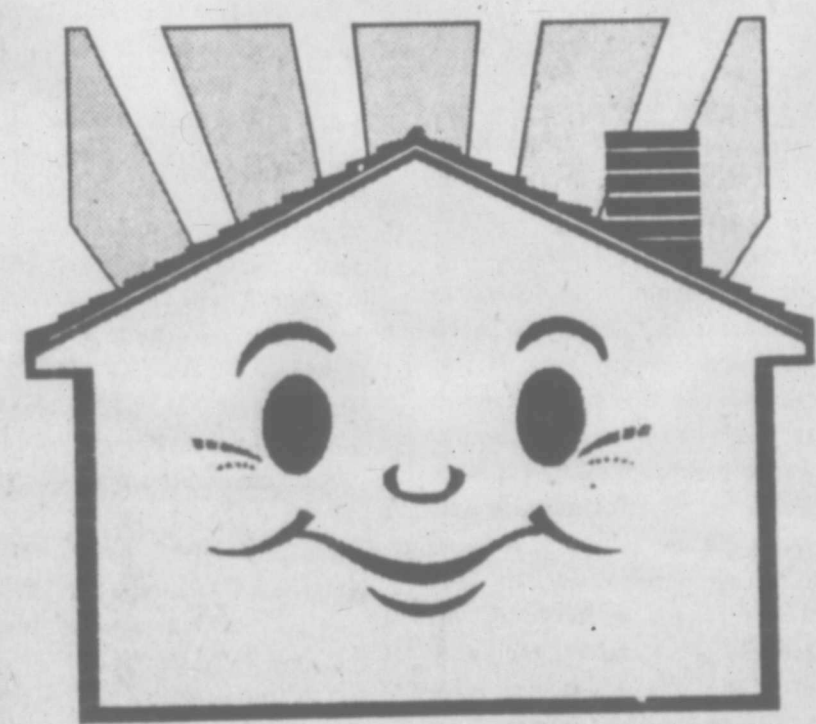

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
General Election Nov. 3, 1970
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR15)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-b, Subsection (a), Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "(a) The State Building Commission is created and succeeds to the powers and duties heretofore vested in the agency of the same name by this Constitution and to the powers and duties the Legislature has vested or may vest in the Commission. Its membership shall consist of three Texas citizens appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The term of each member shall be six years except in the first appointments to the Commission the Governor shall appoint one member for two

years, one for four years, one for six years, and thereafter one member biennially. The Governor shall biennially designate one member as Chairman. Vacancies in the Commission shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the unexpired term. The provisions of this paragraph shall be self-enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment reconstituting the State Building Commission as a three-member appointive commission."
