FUMBLE, FUMBLE--Who recovered? The Sudan Hornets and Seagraves Eagles took turns fumbling the football Friday night at Seagraves during a cold windstorm. The Eagles won over the Hornets, 48-8.

The Sudan Hornets lost their game Friday night to the Seagraves Eagles, 48-8. The fans, in spite of the 40 to 50 mile cold north wind, were there to the end, backing the Hornet football team. It was a game of fumbles, kicks blocked, and

and the Eagles recovered. They drove 70 yards for their first touchdown, HB Crutcher carrying over from the one, and also making the two extra points. The Hornets took the ball on the 20, and were forced to punt on 4th, and the kick was blocked. The Eagles had the ball on the Hornet 14, and Crutcher scored again, with HB Morgan going in for two, giving the Eagles a 16-0 lead over the Hornets at the end of the first quarter.

The Eagles scored early in the second quarter, via Crutcher and Morgan again. But the Hornets still were fighting, and scored when FB Steve Edwards, who made a great effort in the game for the Hornets, carried over from 4 yards out, with QB Bo Lance going in for two points. Later, Guard Gary Edwards re-

covered an Eagle fumble on the 30, but a 15-yard penalty moved them back to the 15 yard line. When they were forced to punt, again the Eagles blocked the kick and covered the ball on the Hornet 19. The Hornet defense got tough, and held the Eagles, so the Hornets took over on their 18. Then came a fumble on the 16 yard line and the Eagles recovered. It was Seagraves time to fumble, and HB Gregory McNabb covered the ball for Hornets. The play started again when Sudan fumbled on the 4 yard line, and the Eagles' Morgan ran the ball over for another Eagle score, with HB Wendell Wood adding two extra points. At the half, Seagraves was leading Sudan, 32-8.

The Hornets punted against the wind on 4th down as the second frame got underway, and the punt only covered 12 yards. The Eagles took over on the 40, fumbled on the Hornet 45, and Edwards recovered for Sudan, and the Hornets moved on down to the Eagles 39 before they fumbled, with the Eagles recovering. Crutcher made the TD, and QB Shaver made the two extra points. The Hornets fumbled again, and the Eagles had the ball on the 30, scoring early in the last quarter, with Crutcher going in from the 4, and Wood made two more points. When the game finally ended, the Eagles had won 48-8.

FB Steve Edwards was top ball carrier for Sudan, with 138 yards on 29 carries.

The first Conference Game for the Hornets is Friday night in Hornet Stadium, with their opponent being the Springlake-Earth Wolverines.

The minister said Wednesday that "We are certainly happy to be here and are looking forward to getting acquainted with everyone."

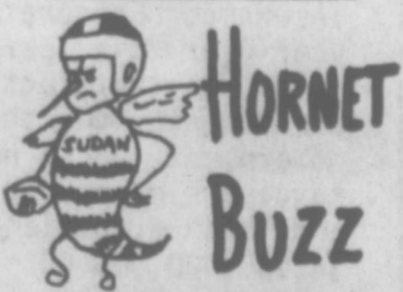

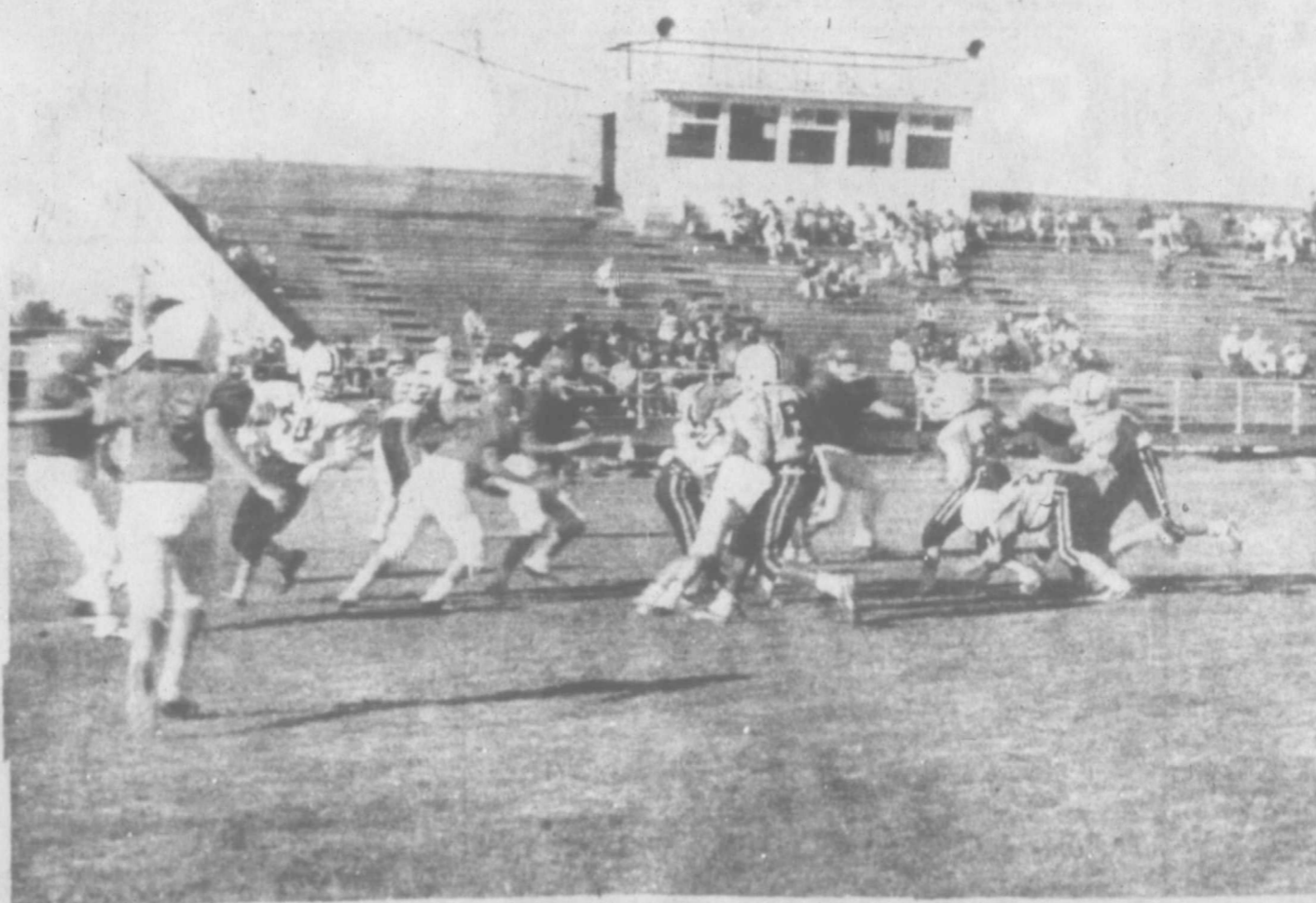
