WOODWORK Homecoming Set For Exes

THERE IS this psychologist who, by the time you read this, is bound to be in a lot of trouble, all because of some things he told newspapers last weekend. He may even be assassinated by the time you read this, since this is being written last weekend.

Dr. Paul Cameron of the University of Louisville said most people think about religion twice as many times a day as they think about sex.

Now this isn't so bad, and it's not the statement which is going to get him in hot water, either, but it leads up to it.

Dr. Cameron said he questioned 3,416 persons in five cities and asked what each was thinking about in the previous five minutes. He reported these findings, according to the Associated Press:

-Young adults, those 18 to 25, think about sex at least once in any 10-minute period; middle-aged groups about once every 15 minutes; and people over 65 once an hour.

-Young adults think about religion once every 25 minutes; middle-aged groups about once every 15 minutes; and people over 65 once every 10 minutes.

Cameron said the study failed to substantiate a popular notion that "young people nowadays are thinking more about world and social problems than their parents are or ever did."

He said housewives apparently spend 30 per cent of the time thinking about housework, while working women devote 10 per cent of their office time to the same subject.

And then he put his foot in his mouth with this remark: "Perhaps this explains why women are so much duller than men."

Boy, what nerve. What courage. What stupidity. I'll bet the wires on his telephone have melted by now. No person in his right mind would ever issue such a statement publicly, unless, of course, he is trying to attract attention.

If attention is what he wants, I'll bet he's a howling success at Louisville U.

Demos Win Election

Texas has a new state senator by the name of Lloyd Bentsen as the Democratic party members put all the candidates in office during the general election held Tuesday.

Another highly controversial item was liquor-by-the-drink amendment which seems to have carried state-wide by a straight margin although it was opposed by a large majority in the South Plains area.

Lamb County voters cast the ballots in the following way: U. S. Senator, Bentsen 2319; Bush 1774; Governor, Smith 2023; Eggers 1488; Lt. Governor, Barnes 2874; Fullerton 1015; with all other democratic candidates winning by large majorities.

On the constitutional amendments, only numbers one and six carried in the county with amendment two receiving the greatest opposition, 1122 for and 2503 against.

Sudan had a record turn-out for an off year election with some 332 voters casting their ballots. The candidates of their choice were:

SUDAN TRIUMPHS OVER BOVINA, 39-26

The Hornets won another conference battle last Friday night as they downed the Bovina Mustangs 39 to 26, in spite of a numerous penalties and fumbles. This gives the Hornets a 6-2 record and a 4-1 conference record.

Early in the first quarter Lopez recovered a fumble for the Hornets on the 43 yard line. The Hornets moved to the 47 yard line where they also fumbled with the Mustangs recoveries. However, on the next play, the Mustangs fumbled on the 45 yard line and King recovered for the Hornets. QB Bo Lance went to the air for the Hornets as he connected with Ed Dennis West on a 45 yard play to the Mustang 10 yard line. HB McNabb ran 2 yards for the Hornets. Late in the first quarter the Hornets had a kick blocked on the 25 yard line and the Mustangs moved to the 15 yard line where they fumbled and Reeves recovered. The Hornets moved to the 40 yard line where they fumbled, with the Mustangs recovering and that ended the fumbling quarter.

Starting the second period, the Mustangs had the ball on the Hornet 29 yard line. A few plays later HB Mike Beauchamp ran 12 yards for the first Mustang TD. The kick was off to the right so we had a 6 to 6 ballgame. Mid the second quarter Edwards recovered a fumble on the Mustang 30 yard line. QB Lance tossed a screen pass to HB McNabb who went 70 yards for another Hornet TD. Engram kicked the extra point to give the Hornets a 13 to 6 lead. The Mustangs came back late in the second quarter to score again as FB Pearson ran 13 yards for the TD. The kick was off to the left, so as the half ended the Hornets led 13 to 12.

Gerald Chisholm recovered a fumble early in the third quarter for the Hornets on the 46 yard line. The Hornets were not able to move the ball so were forced to punt on fourth down. The Hornets took over on their own 28 yard line and scored again as FB Edwards carried over from the 17 yard line. Edwards ran for the two extra points to give the

Hornets a 21 to 12 lead over the Mustangs as the third quarter ended.

After the ball had changed hands two or three times early in the fourth quarter QB Lance passed to HB Boyles into the endzone for a 14 yard Hornet touchdown. The kick was off to the left so the Hornets led 27 to 12. The Hornet defense again held the Mustangs forcing them to punt on a fourth down and the Hornets had the ball on their own 43 yard line. On the first play HB Weaver ran 57 yards for another Hornet TD. The Hornets tried for the two point conversion, but failed so they led 33 to 12 with only 1:53 left on the clock.

But, the ballgame wasn't any where close to being over. Two long pass interference plays were called against the Hornets to move the ball to the two yard line. HB Roy Ramerier ran two yards for the Mustang TD. The extra points failed but the Hornet lead was cut 33 to 18. With only 53 seconds left in the game the Mustangs intercepted a pass on the 14 yard line, and the Hornets received a penalty on the play which put the ball on the 7 yard line. FB Pearson ran 7 yards for the Mustang score. Pearson also ran for the two extra points which narrowed to gap to 33 to 26. The Hornets shot out of range as FB Edwards ran 43 yards for another Hornet TD with 17 seconds left on the clock. The kick was blocked but the Hornets led 39 to 26. After the Hornets TD the Hornets got 3-15 yard penalties putting the Mustangs on the Hornet 11 yard line as time ran out.

All the Hornets did an outstanding job in the game. Chisholm, King and Edwards led the defense. Weaver was top ball carrier with 159 yards on 13 carries. Edwards was next with 122 yards on 23 carries. Lance had a good night passing with 5 comp. on 11 tries for 170 yards.

Back the Hornets this week as the Hornets hosts Farwell. Game time is 7:30 p. m. and it will be homecoming game for Sudan. Farwell now stands 4-1 conference record after Kress defeated them last week 64 to 22.

JUNIOR HIGH

The Seventh and Eighth grade football teams played host to the young Bovina teams Thursday night when Bovina was victorious in both games.

The Seventh grade team lost 8-0. However, on the opening play of the game, Rust Gore intercepted a pass and ran to the 4-yard line before he was downed. Sudan lost the ball a couple of plays later by fumbling. Ronnie Myers, Donald Johnson and Monte Glover were outstanding on defense.

Mitch Chester, Craig Harper, Jimmy Fields, Carol Legg played a fine game during the eighth grade contest although they were defeated 16-0. Sudan came close to scoring several times but were plagued by fumbles and interceptions.

Coach David Ray reported that both teams played inter-ferentive games but were just unable to cross the goal line for scores. The teams will go to Farwell today, Thursday, when the seventh grade plays at 5 p. m. to be followed by the eighth grade game

Cotton Harvest Prospects Good

What seems to be the beginning of a good, quick harvest is underway throughout the South Plains, especially in the Sudan-Amherst area. Area gins and compresses are reporting to be far above the receiving figures of last season. In fact, some gins have reported ginning more cotton already this year than they ginned the entire season last year.

Central Compress has received some 10,000 bales with cotton to be reported to classing in the fair and good

qualities. The price of this grade remains at 17¢ to 22¢. The compress expects to receive in the excess of 80,000 bales this year.

Locally, Ellison Gin has baled some 200 bales as of noon Tuesday with Farmers Co-op ginning approximately 900. Both gins report that at this time last year they had not ginned any cotton.

Area gins reporting bales ginned, as of Wednesday morning included Beck Gin, 905; Claumch, 720; Young Bros., 716; Gage Gin of Needmore, 827; Fairview Gin, 300; Gage Gin at Amherst, 515; Producers Co-op, 885; Farmers Co-op of Amherst, 585.

A spokesman reported that if the good weather holds, the harvest should be completed by mid-December.

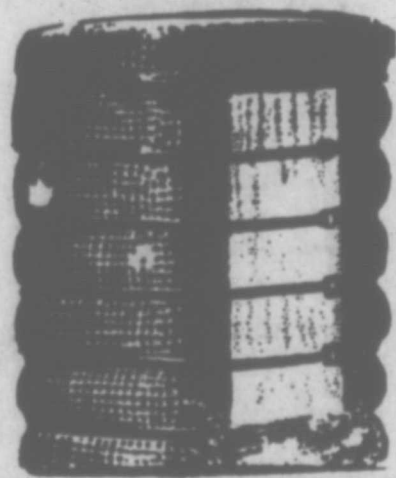

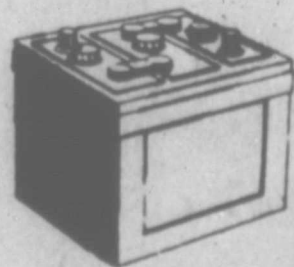
