COTTON TALKS

Farmers in the nation took two giant steps toward the 1971 year November 19 with (1) Senate passage of new three-year programs for cotton, wheat and feed grains and (2) referral of the Agricultural Appropriations Bill to a House-Senate conference committee without House conferees being instructed to accept the Senate-attached \$20,000 limitation of payments per individual.

But before plans for 1971 operations can be completed, Agriculture Secretary Hardin must announce a number of momentous decisions with regard to administration of the program. Among these are loan levels, set-aside requirements and permissible uses of set-aside acres, guidelines for sale and lease of allotments, regulations concerning cross compliance between crops and between farms, and a few others.

One of the most important to cotton people will be the level of the loan on 1971-crop cotton. And there is more than a little controversy over this point. Producers are making a case for maintaining the present or a

slightly higher loan with some members of the cotton trade stumping for a lower loan.

The new law states that the loan shall be 90 percent of the average world market price for Middling one-inch cotton, minimum 3.5 to 4.9, for the two-year period ending July 31 of the year in which the loan level is announced.

Calculations presented to the U. S. Department of Agriculture by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. in which other producer groups, and some exporters concurred, show that 90 percent of the average world market price for Middling one-inch cotton over the past two years is around 20.86 cents, basis net weight trading.

Middling one-inch cotton as a quality is not traded anywhere in the world in sufficient quantity to constitute a fair base for figuring the world price of cotton, PCG contends. So the producer organization has taken a widely traded quality, Strict Middling 1-1/16 inch, and converted its price on the Liverpool Index to U. S. Middling one-inch. In so doing, PCG asserts it is necessary to consider that the "green card" classifications of U. S. bales shipped to export markets average approximately one grade and one staple below the grade and staple specified in the buyer's order.

The PCG official notes also that export sales records of a reputable cotton exporter, now in the possession of USDA, show

an average quality adjustment claim of less than 14 points per pound. "And these records bear out as well the quality differences we have been talking about."

Johnson says to date USDA officials have agreed with the legitimacy of the adjustment used in PCG figuring, and adds "We might suggest to those who would change USDA thinking that they open their export sales records for inspection by Department officials."

Present law, under which the loan for the past five years has been set at 20.25 cents per pound, states that the loan shall be at 90 percent of the average estimated world market price for Middling one-inch cotton for the marketing year in which the loan is announced. And one of the points made by PCG in favor of maintaining a loan at least as high as the present loan is that "Unless USDA has badly missed their 'estimated' world market price for the last few years there can be no legitimate case for lowering the loan under the language of the law that pertains to 1971."

AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF SUDAN, TEXAS, ON THE QUESTION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PERCENT (1%) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE CITY; DESIGNATING THE DAY OF THE ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACE; APPOINTING ELECTION OFFICIALS THEREFOR; PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS SHALL BE QUALIFIED TO VOTE; PRESCRIBING FORM OF BALLOT; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF ELECTION; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO SAID ELECTION.

WHEREAS, Article 1066C, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now Therefore,

BET ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SUDAN, TEXAS:

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Sudan, Texas, on the 15th day of December, 1970, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said city for their action thereupon, the following proposition:
"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city"

Section 2. That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said City of Sudan, Texas, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit:

Polling Place
Community Center
Presiding Officers
Joe D. West
Presiding Judge
D. C. Terrell

Alternate Presiding Judge
The presiding Judge at such election shall appoint three clerks.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Sudan, Texas, shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1066C, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT
INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5. That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with article 6, 06, Elec-

tion Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452 Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said city, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in each of the election precincts of the City not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election.

It is hereby found and determined that THE SUDAN BEACON NEWS is a newspaper published within the City of Sudan, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said city.

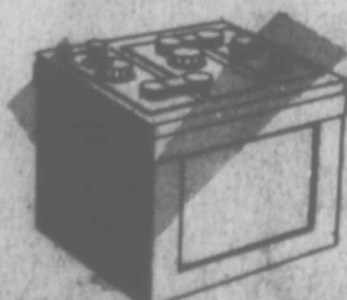

THANKSGIVING DAY GAME DEDICATED TO SOLDIERS

Two arch football rivals, the University of Texas and Texas A&M University, have united in dedicating their traditional Thanksgiving Day gridiron clash in Austin Thursday to Americans who are prisoners of war or missing in action in Southeast Asia.

At least 25 graduates and former students of the two universities are among the 1,500-plus American servicemen who are missing in action. Some 430 of the 1,500 are known to be prisoners.

A dedication statement prior to the game will call the crowd's attention to the fact that some of the men have been in prison longer than six years, and that North Vietnam is ignoring her Geneva Convention agreements regarding humane treatment of war prisoners.

The Memorial Stadium ceremony will include a "Missing Man" flyover by four Air Force RF-4 Phantom jets from Bergstrom AFB, Tex. One aircraft will peel away from the formation in honor of Americans from all the armed services who are missing or imprisoned.

Reserve Officer Training Corps cadets from the University of Texas will be at the gates after the game collecting spectators' signatures on petitions to North Vietnam requesting humane treatment for the prisoners.

Specifically, North Vietnam has never disclosed a full list of the prisoners; has not released the seriously ill and wounded, has not allowed impartial inspection of her prisons, and has not allowed a free exchange of mail between the prisoners and their families.
