SUDAN, COOPER DOMINATE SOUTH PLAINS TEAMS

The Sudan Hornets placed high on the all-district teams by placing three men on offense and five on the defensive team. They were only slightly out-ranked by Vega who placed six on the offense and three on defense. Kress had seven all-district players.

David Weaver was the only player to be named all-district

unanimously by the coaches and this was to a running back position.

This would supposedly give Vega the best offensive team in the district and Sudan defeated Vega 28-14 in regular season play. Sudan undoubtedly ruled the defensive team selections.

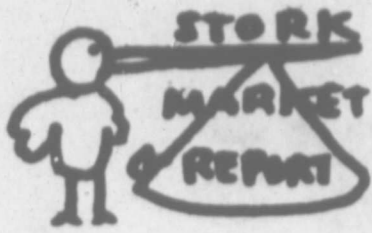

- 4 or 5 cups cooked quail or dove (cut in cubes)



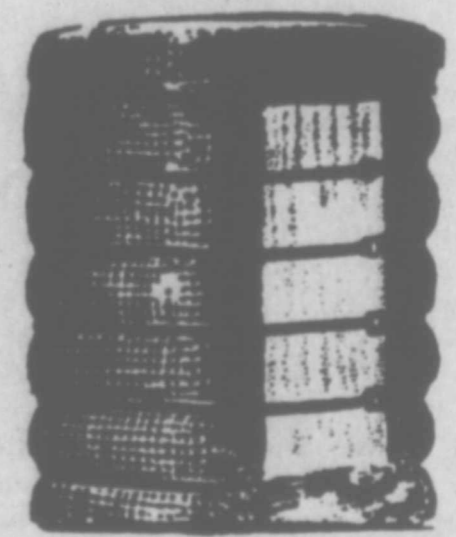
Place 6 or 7 birds in a baking pan. Cover with water, add 2 sticks of butter, salt, pepper, 1 bay leaf, a sprinkle of rosemary. Cover. Place in oven and bake at 350 degrees for about an hour and a half or until tender. Cool and cube. Place in buttered casserole—rice, quail, pepper, onion, and pimento. Pour two cans of undiluted mushroom soup over mixture. Top with grated cheese. Cook in uncovered dish for about 45 minutes at 300 degrees. Serves 12 people. (chicken or turkey may be used)

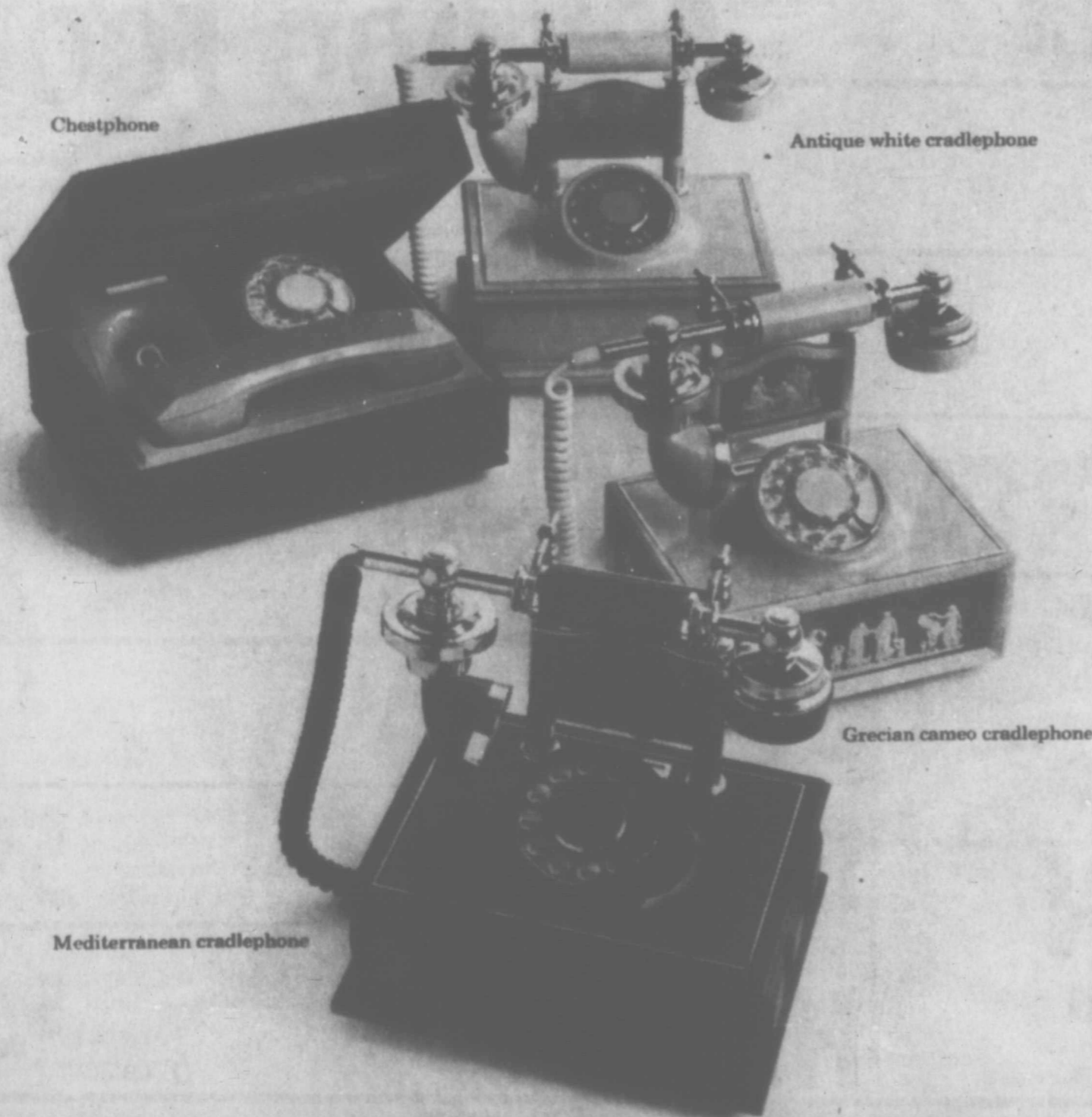

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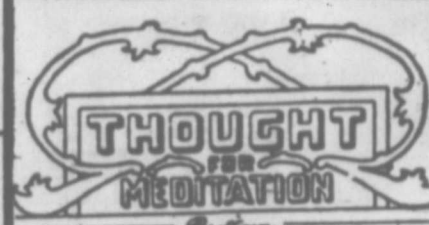
