I like the Delta Queen so much that I even painted a watercolor picture of it once and gave it to my mother (nobody else wanted it). It must not have been too good, though. She thought it was the Mayflower.

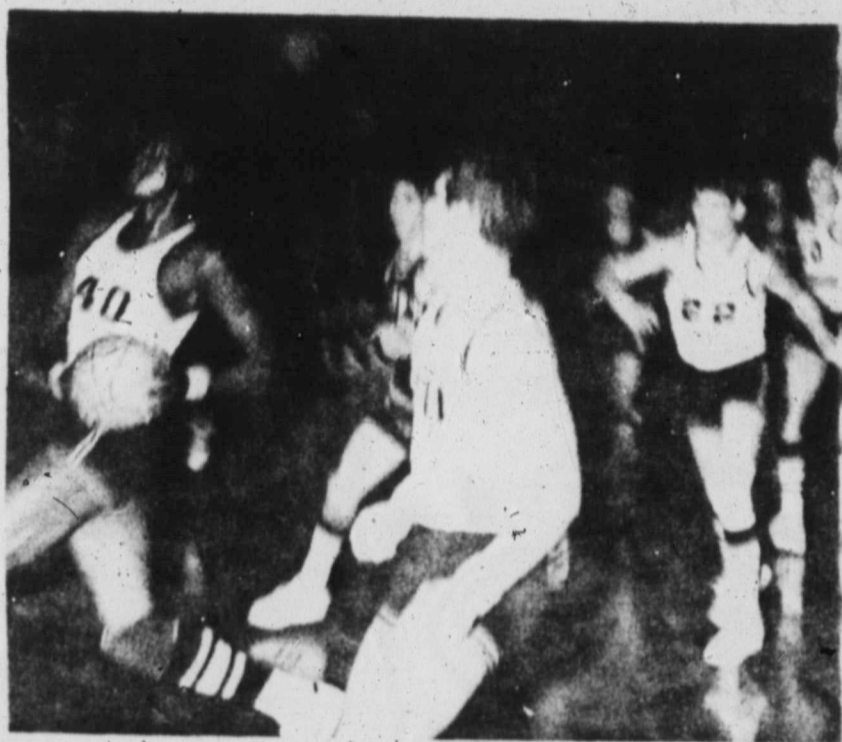
I believe it was Confucius who said: "Railroad magnates who like girls have no loco motive."

Arctic Weather Clings To Area

Fair and warm weather ushered in the new year but didn't stay around long as freezing temperatures hit the Sudan-Amherst area full-force Saturday night.

Residents were greeted with blizzard conditions Sunday morning. The temperature reached a record low for the date Tuesday morning as the mercury fell to some 7 degrees below zero although a gradual warm-up is forecast. It may even reach the freezing mark later this week. However, a report of a cold high pressure area hanging over Texas will hamper any real warm-up.

Weather advisors are predicting a very cold month for the

area with some precipitation due later in the month.

1970 was one of the driest years recorded for the area with only five years reporting less moisture than the 10 inches received last year. Only 7.75 inches were received in 1954. 1941 is recorded as the wettest year with 43.5 inches. The average rainfall for the area is 17.5 inches.

The heaviest snowfalls are usually received in January or February. The snow received the past weekend added little moisture to the powder-dry area so moisture of either type will be most welcome.

MID-TERM EXAM SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED

High school principal, Dale Read, announced this week that classes at the Sudan schools will be dismissed at 2:30 p. m. next Thursday and Friday, Jan. 14-15, due to midterm exams.

The exams for the fifth through 12 grades will begin at 2 p. m. Wednesday when the seventh period test will be given. Classes will be dismissed at 3:30 p. m. Thursday, Jan. 14, the second period test will begin at 9 a. m.;

the fourth period at 10:35 a. m.; and the sixth period at 1 p. m.

Friday, Jan. 15, the first period will be given at 9 a. m.; followed by the third period at 10:35 a. m. and the fifth period at 1 p. m.

There will be exemptions for the high school students but each student is required to take at least one test. Usually the subject in which he or she receives the lowest grade average and it must be a regular curriculum subject.

All students must report for roll call at 8:45 a. m. and 1 p. m. although high school students will not be required to attend if they are exempt from the test scheduled.

Students will receive an extra holiday Monday, Jan. 18, when all classes will be dismissed for a faculty in-service workday.

Report cards will be issued Jan. 20.

The Hornets also defeated the Hart boys 58-56 on Dec. 22 to further their district wins. It was a close game with Sudan leading by two points at the half. The same night, the Hornets lost to the Hart fells, 47-43 in a hard fought game. The three starting guards for Sudan fouled out with Hart getting 21 points from free shots. Angela Pickett began her high scoring streak by putting 17 points on the board.

In the Farwell tournament which began Dec. 31, the Hornets lost three games. First to the host, Farwell, 55-47; then to Olton, 74-73, a very high scoring game in which Boyles, Weaver and Glover all scored in the double figures; and last to Dora, 61-49. 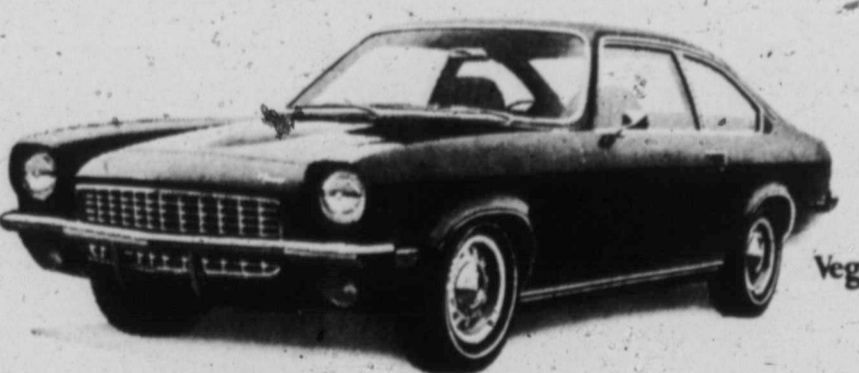

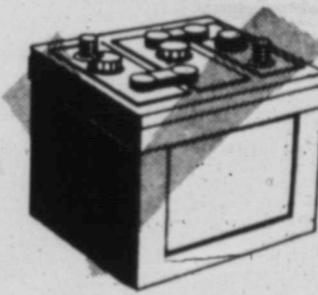
