(Editors note: The column this week is a reprint from the March 15, 1962 Sudan Beacon News. We thought it might be of interest to the readers that the sandstorms of the past several weeks are nothing new, just seems that way. It is a known fact that it will rain, sometime.)

Although this March has been extremely dry, this area usually receives most of their snow during this month. We have had a couple of 'dry' falls with very little moisture content. And, still the wind blows

LAST WEEKEND'S West Texas rainfall of dirt was about as prolonged and as bad as any in several years. Living was pretty miserable for most people. A friend from downstate once remarked to me that he new why the folks in West Texas were so hardy, rough and rugged. "They've got a lot of sand in their craw," he explained.

The way the wind blew is a good reminder that the tornado season is about to begin. A tornado is a sandstorm doing the twist. The Weather Bureau and Red Cross again have listed the things a person should do when a tornado is coming down your street. I've read the same list a number of times, but can't seem to remember it when the funnel clouds actually appear, except the part about the cellar.

Here it is again, though:

1. The safest place is a storm cellar, cave, or under ground excavation with an air outlet.
2. In open country, move at right angles to the tornado's path. Twisters usually ahead about 25 to 40 miles per hour.
3. In town, stay off streets preferably in a steel or otherwise reinforced building, but stay away from windows.
4. In homes, the southwest corner of the basement usually offers greater safety (of course, practically nobody has a basement). Open north and east windows to equalize pressure, cut off power and fuel lines if you have time. If no basement, lie down in the nearest ditch or depression.

Might be a good idea to paste this list up somewhere in the house. Of course, you may be blown away while you're reading it.

BARABBAS

The Scripture and Christian history tells us that it was the custom at the Passover feast that a prisoner was freed. He was set loose and given his freedom regardless of the crime for which he had been imprisoned.

Pilate felt that through exercising this custom perhaps he could save the life of an innocent man, Jesus Christ. However, this was not to be for when Pilate asked the crowd who they desire to be released, they chose this man, Barabbas, instead of the innocent Son of God.

At this point Barabbas enters the scope of Christian history. He had never been important to the Christian before. Now he is, and the logical question then becomes, "Who is this Barabbas?" When we put the information to be found in the gospels together, we find that Barabbas was a notable prisoner. He was a brigand, which is a bandit, a member of a gang of robbers. He had taken part in a certain insurrection in the city and also he had committed murder.

It seems that he could have possibly been the son of a Rabbi or a member of some noble family who had gone wrong. It may be that this fact glamorized his life as a criminal and made him popular with the people.

The Bible says that the crowd chose Barabbas without hesitation. Let us analyze the full meaning and significance of this tragic choice. In choosing Barabbas instead of Jesus Christ they chose lawlessness instead of law. This is the choice of many men. It seems

that within man there is a longing to be free of the discipline of the law. Barabbas was a known law-breaker. Jesus had said, "I bring unto you a new commandment." The crowd also chose war instead of peace. Jesus was the man of peace but down through the ages of the history of mankind men have chosen war as a method of settling their problems. In actuality, war settles nothing. Nevertheless, they chose the man of blood. As Barabbas was selected to be released, the choice was made between hatred and violence and love. Barabbas and Jesus stood for two different ways. Barabbas stood for the way of hatred and violence. Jesus stood for the way of love. And so they chose the violent criminal and rejected the gentle Saviour. They preferred the man of violence to the man of love.

We do not know what became of Barabbas. If he chose to go out to Calvary and see the crucifixion of Jesus, the realization must come into his mind that He should have been carrying that cross and not Jesus. Jesus had saved him. He must have thought, "I should be hanging there, not He. He saved me." Whether Barabbas went to Calvary and thought these thoughts or not, one thing is certain, Barabbas was one of the sinners whom Jesus died to save.

In a very real sense each individual can place himself in the place of Barabbas. It is you and I who have sinned. It is you and I who have time and time again disappointed God. And yet, it is Jesus who was chosen to pay the penalty. He went to the cross for us.

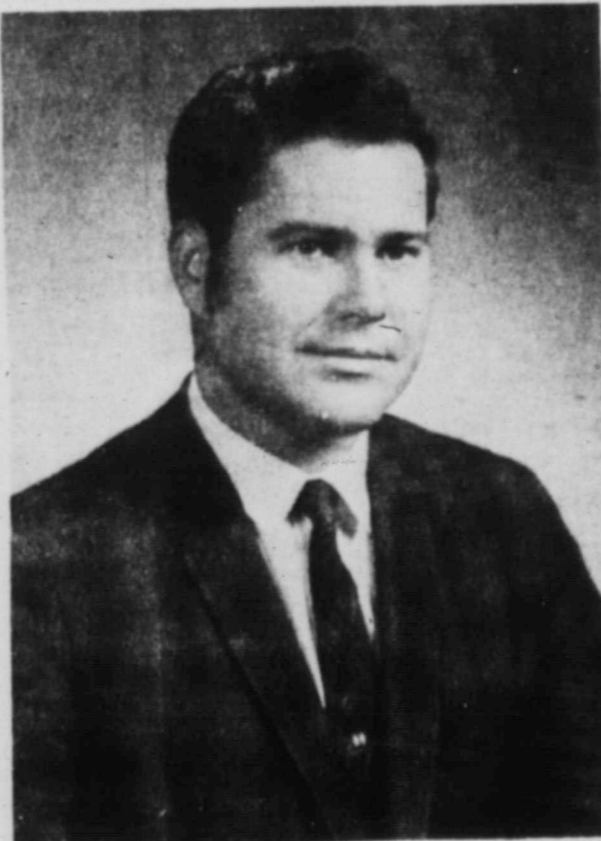

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5)
Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services to or on behalf of:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;

"(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

"(3) Needy blind persons;

"(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation

in these programs as it deems appropriate.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year.

"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the
