Representatives of both the Farmers and Ranchers Association for Natural Weather and the Plains Weather Improvement Association attended a hearing last week on application for weather modification permit by Atmospherics, Inc., the California-based firm which carried out the hail suppression program last year.

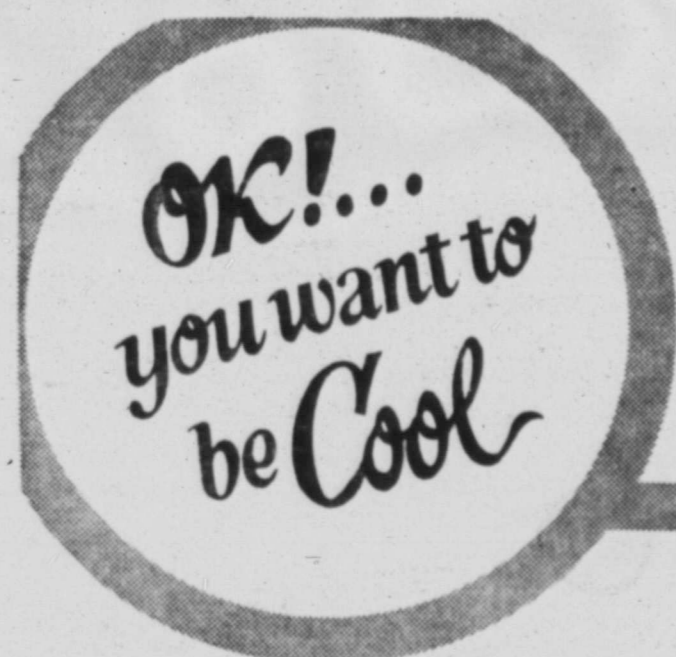

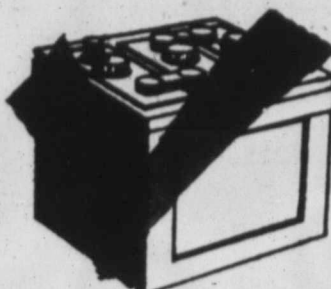
