Are You Doing Your Part In Helping The Red Cross?

The number of volunteer workers in the Red Cross surgical dressing room is decreasing at an alarming rate as shown by the list of workers the past week (which is published below).

Mrs. Blackburn, chairman tells us that they are one quota behind in their work—there being 9000 sponges of the third quota to be made and fourth quota of 25,200 sponges was received last week and the workers should by all means be at work on this quota—but the third quota is still unfinished. This is inexcusable. There are quite a few ladies who work regularly but there are many who are just as able to work and have no more home duties and who could and should help in this work.

Could YOU FACE A WOUNDED SOLDIER with a clear conscience? Some of our boys have died on the battle fields of North Africa and other war zones—and for all we know they may be some of our boys lying in hospitals now and in need of these dressings.

We know many of our women are busy with their house work and perhaps raising chickens, a Victory Garden, but still we could find time for a few hours work in the surgical dressing rooms if we wanted to.

It might not be a bad idea if once in a while we all take a good look at ourselves and our attitude and see if we would be ashamed to have a soldier on a fighting front to pass judgment on us.

There isn't anyone who has more right to judge what we civilians are doing with our spare time, our money, our energy and our influence than the man who has given up everything to fight this war, not just his spare time and his spare money—but himself.

All women of Baird and Callahan County are offered the opportunity and the privilege of the American Red Cross to give their spare time by assisting others in folding bandages to be used by those men in uniform.

George Morgan Wins Prize In Purina Feed Contest

George Morgan of the Morgan Food Store was awarded a \$25.00 War Bond in a nation-wide Food For Freedom Contest, sponsored by the Purina Mills. Approximately 3000 Purina merchants participated in the contest which covered a period of four months; each merchant being given an average of 400 sacks of Purina Chicken Feed to be sold per month but Mr. Morgan beat the quota—selling an average of 600 sacks per month for three months.

The object of the contest was to impress dealers with their present opportunity and responsibility of serving their country by helping farm customers "stretch" their feed to produce the greatest possible amount of meat, milk and eggs.

C. S. Boyles Traps Gunman

C. S. Boyles, former Baird business man, now living in Sweetwater, where he is engaged in the loan and insurance business relived the Texas frontier days a few days ago when at the point of a pistol he was hijacked by a Mexican youth while setting at his desk in his upstairs office in plain view of a busy thoroughfare, says the Sweetwater Press:

Boyles outwitted the Mexican while looking straight into the loaded pistol, and had the situation in hand, his \$1.15 back in his pocket and Toribio Alguin, who gave his age as 16, in city jail. He is charged with staging a series of recent hijackings in the outskirts of town.

Hearing someone enter his outer office Boyles turned to see a tall Mexican, standing only a few feet away, leveling the loaded pistol at his. Trying to think fast, Boyles asked, "What do you want?" "Money" was the terse reply. The Mexican told Boyles "I want all the money you've got, and keep your hands up."

The agent holding up one, hand, reached into his pocket and threw his wallet into his outer office realizing that doing this he might have a chance to close the door and summon help.

As the hi-jacker stooped down to pick up the purse, Boyles sprang for the door, slammed it, and ran to the window. He called to B. C. McCall, a realtor, who was standing on the sidewalk, for help. McCall summoned officers.

Police reached the office building quietly ascended the stairs, and had the Mexican under arrest while he still stood with gun in hand, pounding on Boyles' office door.

He is alleged to be the same hi-jacker who recently held up Mrs. Bert Kimbrough's grocery on Bowie street and the W. G. Lieb grocery on West Broadway, forcing each of the owners by aid of a pistol to hand over their earnings.

County H. D. News

4-H CLUB GIRLS ARE BUSY

4-H Club girls of Callahan County are doing their best in growing food for ictory. The 167 club members have 235 food-production projects in progress now, according to Marjorie Brown, county home demonstration agent. 80 girls have poultry projects, 78 of these being with chickens. They are raising a total of 5427 chickens 2 girls are working with 40 turkeys. 131 girls are working with gardens and the average girl has 6 varieties of vegetables in her share of the garden. Club girls are feeding, caring for and milking 59 cows, 14 beef calves are being fed and 32 pigs grow for market and home use. Two 4-H girl shave 4 lambs which they are raising in addition to doing garden work. In addition to the food-growing projects, the girls are working on equipping sewing boxes, and planning and making their clothes. 43 girls have already completed 67 garments.

GARDEN PESTS

Gardeners should be on the lookout for the following bugs this month: Cucumber beetles, squash bugs, harlequin cabbage bug, stink bugs, tomato fruit worm or corn ear worm, tomato suck flies, cabbage worms, potato beetles. Control should begin as soon as the first bug is found. The 12-spotted or striped cucumber beetles are general feeders, feeding on the blooms an foliage of nearly all the vegetables. The best way to protect the crop is to keep the plants thoroughly dusted with calcium arsenate 1 part and hydrate dlime 19 parts, or 1 part cryolite and 3 parts sulphur. Lead arsenate may also be used like calcium arsenate, but it is not as cheap. Dust often enough to keep the new growth covered, which would be about once a week as long as the beetles are present. The squash bug, halequin cabbage bug, and stink bug are all sap sucking bugs and are very hard to control, because it is mpossible to get any poison in their stomachs. So the poison that is shot at them must come in contact wit htheit body and only thast that are hit with the poison will be killed. Nicotine sulphate (Black Leaf 40) used as a spray or dust is very effective as a control for the immature or young bugs, but not for the adults. Pyrethroid dust is the best thing to shoot at the adults. Hand picking of the adults is recommended in small home gardens. The neotne spray to use is made by mixing 1 1-2 teaspoonfuls Black Leaf 40, 1 cubic inch of soap dissolved in 1 gallon water. The dust is made by mixing 2 tablespoons Black Leaf 40 with 1 quart hydrated lime. Soon after tomatoes set fruit, or about the time that the tomatoes are the size of a marble, they should be dusted with calcium or lead arsenate 1 part and hydrated lime 1 part, or with cryolite 1 part and sulphur 2 parts, to prevent damage by tomatoe fruit worms. Dusting should be continued at 5 to 7 days intervals until about three weeks before the tomatoes ripen. Sprays are also satisfactory who lead or calcium arsenate is used at the rate of 4 tablespoons per gallon of water, or 1 1-2 lbs. per 50 gals. water. Cabbage warm can be controlled by dusting the plants with lead arsenate or with cryolite 1 part and talc or flour 2 parts. Potato beetles are easily controlled by dusting the plants with lead or calcium arsenate or spraying with 4 tablespoons lead or calcium arsenate per gallon of water or 1 1-2 lbs. per 50 gals. water.

SHEEP AND GOATS MUST BE DIPPED TO KILL LICE-TICKS

Sheep and Goat men in Callahan County are having good success in controlling lice an dticks by dipping with wettable sulphur. A dip of sufficient strength to kill lice and ticks can be made by adding 10 lbs. of wettable sulphur to each 100 gallons of water. The first dipping was done two weeks after shearing, and using the same material left in the vat, dipping was repeated in two weeks to insure the killing of all lice that were not hatched at the time of the first dipping. Sheep and Goat men point out for satisfactory control, it is essential that each animal be thoroughly wet before he is released from the vat. Instructions for making vats for dipping sheep and goats will be supplied upon request from your local County Agent, W. M. Meador.

NOTICE FARMERS

Incentive payments of 50 per acre for vegetables for fresh market and on Irish potatoes 50 cents per bushel times the normal yield established for the farm times the acreage planted in excess of 90 percent of the farm goal and up to 110 per cent of the farm goal, according to Sam A. Billingsley, Administrative Officer, Calahan County AAA.

The farm goal can still be established by the farm operator provided he reports to the AAA office that he intends to plant or has already planted as much as 2.7 acres to either of these crops, Billingsley said. Any operator desiring to earn incentive payments must sign an "Intention to Participate" before July 1. According to Billingsley, this form is to be mailed to all persons who indicated their intentions to plant these crops on their 1943 Farm Plan Sheets, but some persons may be eligible for the payments who did not so indicate. Any persons who has 2.7 acres of either Irish potatoes or vegetables for fresh market should notify the AAA office in Baird if he does not receive the form for his sibiature by June 5, Billingsley said.

FARM FAMILIES WORKING TO PRODUCE AND SAVE FOOD

While Farm Security Administration families in Callahan County are working hard to produce more food than ever before, they also are driving to cut waste of food, according to County Supervisor Nathan A. Waldrop who has some late figures on food waste in the Nation. "Thirty to 40 percent of the food produced in the United States goes to waste," Mr. Waldrop reveals. "At least 15 percent of this is in American homes. A study of garbage collected in 48 representative cities howed that food thrown away averaged two-fifths a pound for each person every day. Over a year this amounts to 235 pounds of food waste per person." With need for U. S. food greater than ever before, the FSA official emphasized that we must not only grow all the food we can grow but we must eliminate wates of food. He points out that "with half the world going hungry, Americans cannot have a clear conscience until they "lick the platter clean."

"This waste is even greater than shown by what goes into the garbage can," says Mr. Waldrop. "Also wasted is the labor that went into growing, harvesting and processing the food; the transportation and ware housing facilities that got the food to market; the clerks who packed, displayed and sold the food, and the housewife who cooked it. Biggest waste is in bread, accounting for 15 percent of total food waste."

YOUR JOB AT HOME

EVERY housewife has so much on her mind these days, that it's a little difficult to keep everything in mind. We can't trust our memories to hold all the isolated bits of information that are necessary for doing a good job at home. We've got to write things down! Get system into your remembering. Buy a bulletin board in your local five-and-ten. Or get your husband to square off a piece of soft wood into which you can stick thumb tacks. Get that board up in your kitchen as soon as possible. It will help save gas, energy, needless steps—and your disposition!

Have one pad on the board for listing things to buy on your next shopping trip. As items come to mind, write them down immediately. If errands in town are listed, you'll be less apt to forget something!

Reserve another section on the bulletin board for rationing information. Have a pocket for the family's ration books. Post in this section the dates when coffee and sugar coupons are valid; when your meat coupons are currently usable. Make a note to remind yourself that under coffee rationing regulations each stamp entitles you to a specific amount of coffee. This applies whether you buy 100% coffee or mixtures which are only part coffee and part something else. Remind yourself to read the label on the coffee you buy to be sure you're getting all coffee. And don't waste your coupon by neglecting to claim the pound that's your rightful due. The boys in camp get their coffee first, you know, and doing without coffee entirely is not only unnecessary, but unfair to yourself and family. Also tack up a point value chart on your bulletin board. And keep a general memo pad. Things you should remember to do may be overlooked in the rush of a busy day, if you don't write them down.

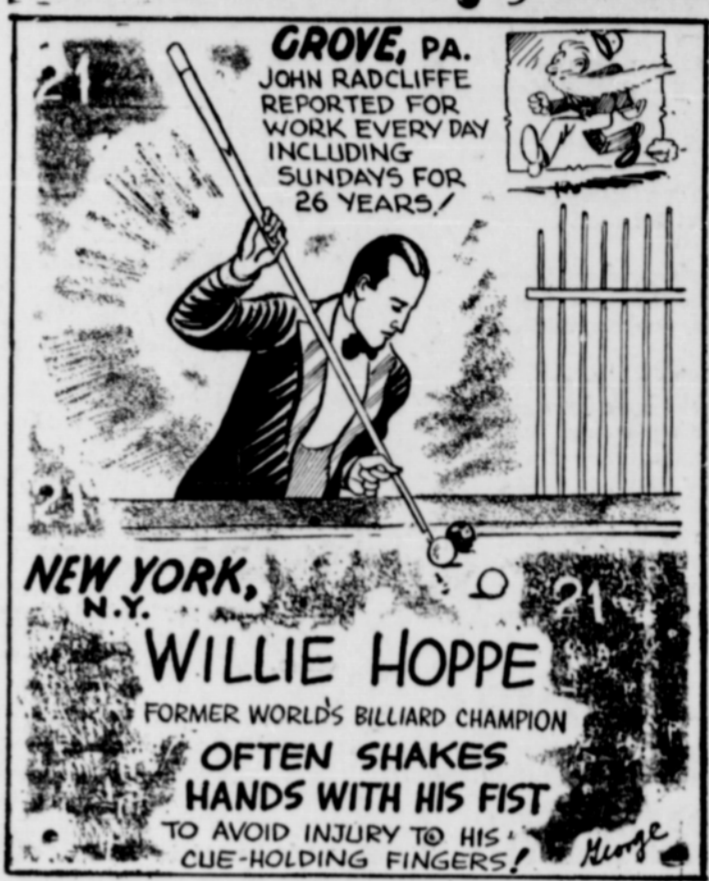
