IT MAY COME as a shock to most of you, but some people will lie to you just to sell something.

Carlton Smith of Newspaper Enterprise Assn. recently reported that American consumers were taken for an estimated \$11 million by a network of camera and film dealers using the "you have won a prize" gimmick.

He noted that thousands of persons awhile back got post cards or phone calls telling them they had won free home movie cameras. After that came the follow-up by a salesman who told them they could have the prize with this kind of deal:

The prize was a free home-movie kit with camera said to have a retail value of \$150, expensive projector, movie screen and lightbar, a package purportedly worth \$500 to \$600. All required of the winner was to sign a contract to buy 600 rolls of film for \$600 and have them processed by the corporation. Film for \$1 a roll--why not?

The Postal Inspection Service, says Smith, found that the camera could be bought in regular shops for \$50, the projector for less than \$100.

The report said that "while purchasers were led to believe they were paying \$600 for 600 rolls of film, with the movie kit free, they actually received only \$280 value." In addition, things worked out nicely in respect to the film, since its cost "was cleverly concealed in inflated processing charges."

The corporation which dreamed up this plan, with the idea of selling large quantities of over-stocked, obsolete home-movie equipment and perpetuating its film-processing business, was indicted for multimillion fraud violations. Officers of the firm entered a no-contest plea and a fine of \$10,000 was imposed.

They still apparently made a pretty good profit.

One point the story brings up is this: it's still good-business to trade with people you know, at home, if possible, and i just can't help mentioning that advertisements in this newspaper are almost all from hometown folks who wouldn't cheat you if they could.

A surprise lullaby shower was given to JoAnne Bray by members of the club. Dorothy Hill served refreshments of cake, coffee, and tea.

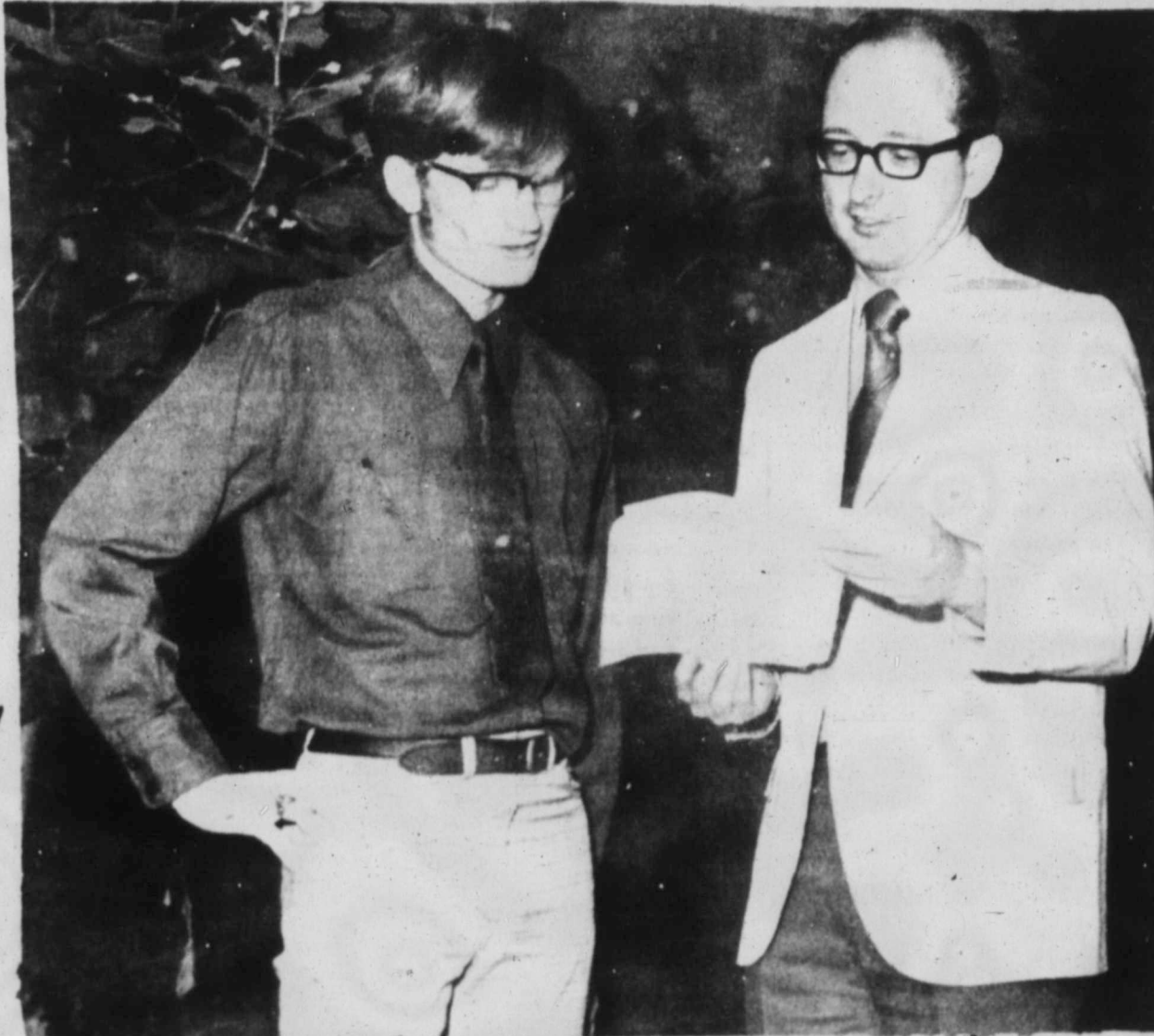

**Census Bureau Slates Survey**

A sample of households in this area will be included in a nationwide survey of employment and unemployment to be conducted the week of June 14 by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, according to Walter A. Freeman, Jr., Director of the Bureau's regional office in Denver.

The monthly survey is conducted by the Bureau of the Census for the U. S. Department

of Labor, and the information is used to calculate the number of persons with jobs, the number looking for jobs, and the monthly percentage of unemployment, which is regarded as one of the most important measures of the Nation's economic health. In April, for example, the survey indicated that 78.2 million persons were employed and 4.7 million unemployed. The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 6.1 percent as compared with 6.0 percent in March.

The June survey will include, also, queries on marital status, the number of children in families and the number families expect to have. Answers to these questions are used to guide demographers in making projections of birth rates and family composition.

Individual family information is kept strictly confidential and is used for statistical purposes only.

**KNOW WHERE THAT SMOKE GOES?**

If you're still smoking, think about the next drag you take. Know where that hot smoke goes? Into your mouth, down your windpipe, into your bronchial tubes. **KEEP IT CLEAN**

**DEAR MRS. WHITE:** Due to a faulty washer on our kitchen faucet we have rust stains in our sink because of the faucet leaking. Is there anything short of refinishing the porcelain that will remove the rust stains?
