NEARLY all of us have been victims of computers at one time or another. It seems that use of computers is a coming thing in all kinds of businesses these days, because they have found they can get so much more done in a short time, and they don't take coffee breaks.

Mostly, I suppose, this is true, but use of computers certainly is a mixed blessing. A computer has no heart, and it makes mistakes. Lots of mistakes, because computers still are programmed by humans, and besides these electronic monsters apparently have their own fiendish ways of lousing up.

A good example of computerism was reported from Dallas the other day, where a much-heralded system of computers was put into operation to "help" people get onto the busy expressway safely.

Traffic stacked up for miles, angry motorists waited for hours in mid-morning heat, and drivers who usually take Central Expressway to work retreated to alternate routes.

Police were running around everywhere trying to get the jam-ups straightened out. They reported "excessive congestion" all along the expressway, with some backups stretching for blocks at entrance ramps.

The ramps were controlled by what appear to be standard traffic lights, with the computer, figuring the speed of approaching vehicles, falsing the motorist a green light when it is safe to enter the expressway from an entrance ramp.

In its second day of operation, it reportedly worked a little better. So if they keep on trying, someday soon it may get almost as good as it was before they put the computer system into operation.

Parents Warned Of Immunization Law

A recently-enacted state law requires immunization for red measles, German measles, polio, diphtheria, tetanus and smallpox before entering school next term, principal Dale Read, recently announced.

In view of this law, parents are strongly advised to take their children to their family doctor for these immunizations. Doctors recommend that smallpox immunizations be obtained immediately--before hot weather.

According to the new law signed by Governor Preston Smith, all students will be allowed to enter their respective school

systems during the Summer and Fall 1971 terms, with the provision that their immunizations against at least one of the aforementioned diseases will have been started by January 1, 1972, and all completed as soon as medically feasible.

THP Investigates Wrecks

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of May, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and no persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1971 shows a total of 30 accidents resulting in two persons killed and 23 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for May, 1971 shows a total of 543 accidents resulting in 23 persons killed and 354 persons injured. This was 89 more accidents, six more fatalities, and 78 more injured than during April.

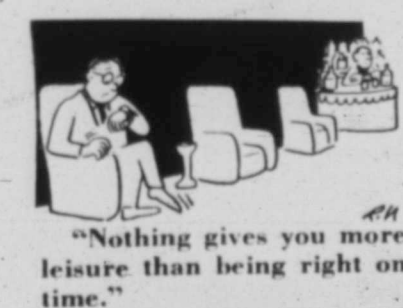

AG DEPT. TO SPONSOR COURSE

The Farm Electrification Short Course for adult farmers sponsored by the Sudan High School Vocational Agriculture Department will begin June 21 and will continue through June 24, according to Kenneth Noles, Superintendent, and Don Ham, Vocational Agriculture advisor.

Instructor for the course will be Cleve Walkup, Farm Electrification Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering of Texas A&M University.

Walkup states that the Short Course can be adjusted to wishes and interests of the farmers enrolled, but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety, how to properly choose wire sizes and install motor circuits, how to choose, protect, and ground

electric motors, and how to calculate the cost of operating electrical equipment. Demonstrations will be given and class enrollees will have the opportunity to perform the skills demonstrated.

An entry fee of \$3.00 will be charged with certificates to be presented to each farmer who attends all training sessions.

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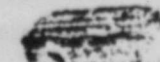
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
