## WOODWORK

A WORKER doing some hazardous digging in Cairo, Egypt, has unearthed what is described as the oldest Pharaonic mummy in recorded history.

This occurred less than a month after Mummy's Day.

Well, anyway, this worker mistakenly dug into the right-hand side of an old tomb and discovered a mummy 45 centuries old, according to people who study such stuff. The mummy escaped pillage by ancient Egyptian tomb robbers because it was buried in the "unsacred" right-hand section of the tomb. The sun god Ra had forbidden Egyptians to bury their embalmed bodies in the right-hand places, according to an Egyptian belief.

According to the writings, this mummy of a handsome musician named Nofre was so placed because he had asked his wife to disregard the writs of Ra and put him in a right-side spot, apparently to mislead robbers. Egyptologists regard the find as important because of previous belief that no mummy was likely to remain intact for 4,500 years.

STATE SEN. Mike McKool of Dallas predicted the other day that the automobile insurance industry will ask another rate increase at a June 30 public hearing before the State Board of Insurance in Austin. He added: "It is utterly ridiculous for the industry to think of a raise at this time when the rates are already too high and out of reach of most people, particularly our senior citizens and those in middle and lower income groups."

## RUTH CLASS TO HAVE SALAD SUPPER

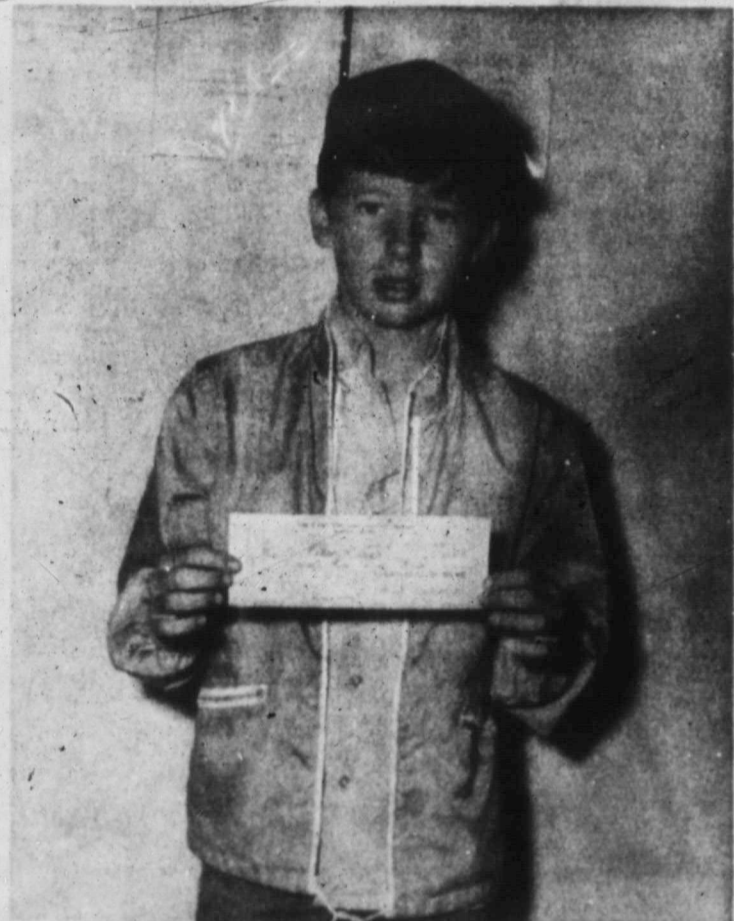

## AREA CITIZENS TO Girls-In-Action HOLD MEETING

On Monday, June 28, at 7 p. m. there will be a meeting of Sudan citizens at the Sudan Fire Department to discuss the possibility of beginning the operation of an emergency ambulance service here. All interested persons, organizations, school and church officials and businessmen are invited to attend.

Robert A. Koonce, a field consultant with the Texas State Department of Public Welfare, will be present to present information on this matter and to encourage community awareness and concern toward the life-death importance of well co-ordinated local emergency medical services. A film will be shown to dramatically illustrate how a small town saw the need for better emergency care and worked to fulfill that need.

Statistics released after a national study show that 20,000 accident victims die unnecessarily each year as a direct result of inadequate emergency care and at least another 25,000 are permanently disabled from the same cause. Koonce states that many communities can and are doing something about the situation.

**BENEFITS AVAILABLE TO VETERANS**

Veterans planning to travel overseas this summer were warned today of certain limitations in their rights and benefits.

The Veterans Administration said that only veterans with service-connected disabilities are eligible for hospitalization and related assistance. And all were warned if under medication to

take enough with them to last throughout their overseas tours.

If eligible, all a veteran needs to do overseas, if ill, is to apply to an American embassy or consul and arrangements will be made for hospitalization. In an emergency, a veteran is eligible for VA-paid hospitalization and medicine if he notifies the embassy or consular office within 15 days after hospitalization, assuming he has a rated service-connected disability.

Retired servicemen are eligible for medical benefits from military hospitals and clinics, VA said.

In addition, VA pointed out that there are no loan guarantee benefits available overseas for veterans, except in Puerto Rico, and that veterans receiving compensation or pension checks should, if at all possible, keep state-side mailing addresses.

Veterans are permitted to attend foreign schools, if otherwise eligible, if the institutions are VA approved, and the courses lead to degrees.

Q. Can we "have our cake and eat it, too" and keep phosphates in detergents, water conditioners and other cleaning products and still prevent them from getting into our lakes and rivers?

A. Very definitely yes, and that is by attacking the controllable sources of phosphates. The most easily controlled source is the sewage discharged from our homes to treatment plants. We can apply chemical treatment methods which have been tested and proved in different regions of the United States.

Inorganic chemicals such as lime and compounds of aluminum and iron in conjunction with water-soluble chemicals called polymers can remove upwards of 80% of phosphates from sewage at costs averaging about a penny per person per day.

At the Water Pollution Control Plant in Painesville, Ohio, phosphate removal averaged 83% in a recently concluded demonstration project conducted by plant personnel, pollution control specialists from Calgon Corporation and the Water Quality Office of the Environmental Protection Agency. A Calgon polymer and an iron compound produced the best results according to Plant Superintendent, Walter W. White.

White said the city is realizing a bonus benefit in addition to phosphate removal. A higher percent of suspended solids and oxygen consuming organic pollutants (human wastes, for instance) also are being removed by the chemical treatment.

#### SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS ANNOUNCED

Monthly social security checks for beneficiaries 65 and over who have signed up for Medicare's doctor bill insurance will be increased by 30 cents in July, John G. Hutton, social security manager in Lubbock, said today.

The checks scheduled for delivery on July 3 will have \$5.60 deducted for each beneficiary to pay the increased monthly voluntary medical insurance premium. The rate for the past year was \$5.30 for each beneficiary, Hutton said.

The increase was announced by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare in December in accordance with a requirement in the Medicare law that makes an annual review of the costs of the medical insurance program mandatory. The law

requires that the monthly premium rate be set at a point estimated to be sufficient to cover all expenses incurred during each premium period, with an allowance for contingencies.

The 30 cent premium increase for each beneficiary is the net result of three items that are estimated to increase costs by 50 cents in the fiscal year beginning July 1, and then a decrease of 20 cents arising primarily because of a reduced margin for contingencies, Hutton continued.

The items that make up the overall 50 cent increase include: 31 cents to cover an estimated increase of 6.7 percent in the level of physicians' fees recognized by the program in the fiscal year beginning in July; 10 cents to cover an estimated increase of 2 percent in the use of physicians' service; 9 cents to cover the estimated increase of 15 percent in cost and utilization of institutional services covered by the program (for example, for hospital outpatient and independent clinic services).

June 18, July 16 and August 6 are the dates of the three summer Freshman Orientation sessions for the 1971 fall semester at Baylor University. Students planning to attend the Baptist university for the first time this fall are invited to attend one of the orientation sessions.

Each orientation session will begin at 9 a. m. Friday with registration and coffee in the Drawing Room of the Student Union Building. During the coffee time, faculty members will be available to talk with the students.

Actual registration will be deferred until August when the fall semester begins.

Special meetings are planned for parents with university officials in which there can be free and easy discussion of university policies, requirements, regulations and offerings.

Participation in the orientation program is not mandatory.

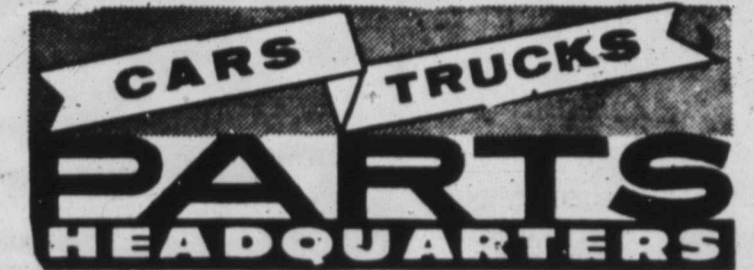

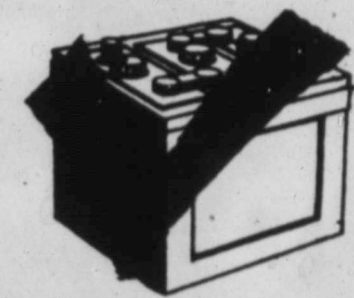
