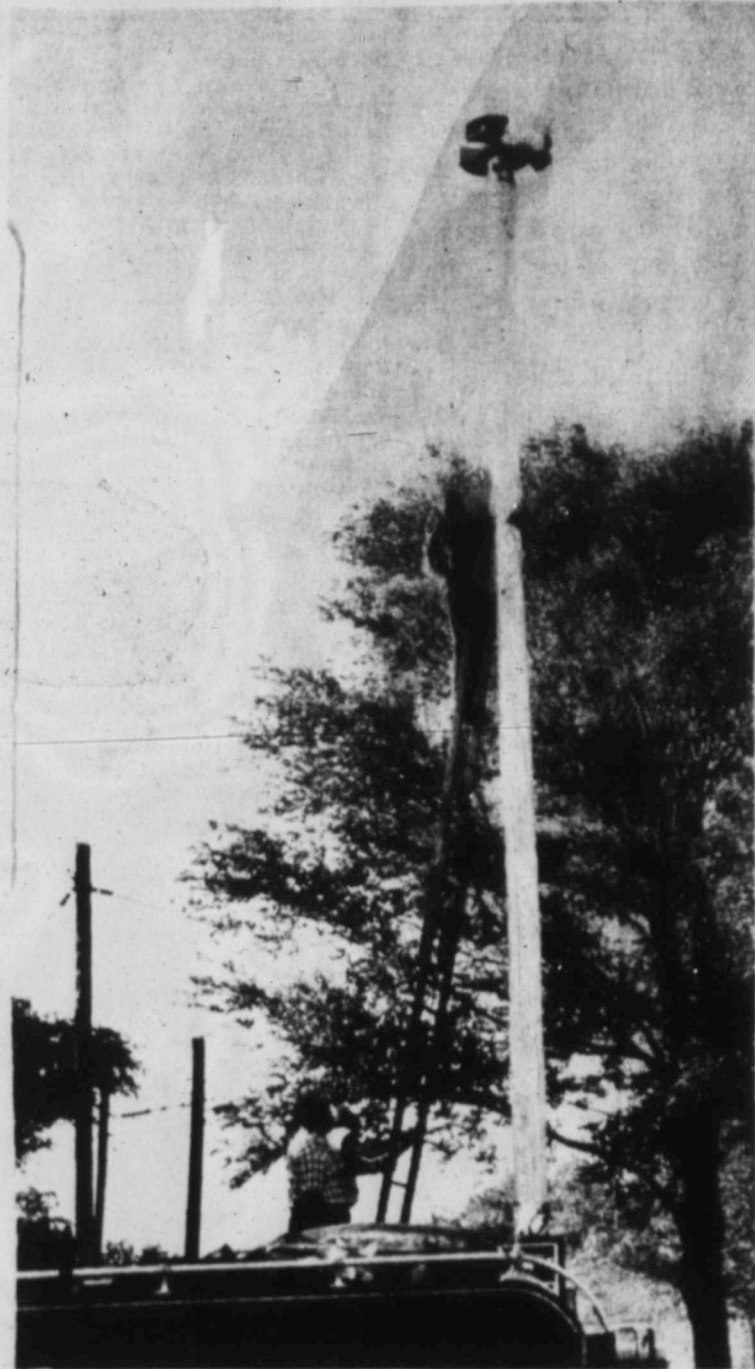

## CENSUS TO BE TAKEN THIS MONTH

Local representatives of the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, will visit a number of households in this area the week of August 16 to obtain information on employment here. Walter A. Freeman, Jr., Director of the Census Bureau office in Denver, in making the announcement, said the households are among the 50,000 across the country that have been scientifically selected to represent a cross section of the American people.

The survey, which the Bureau conducts each month for the U. S. Department of Labor, provides a continuing measure of employment and unemployment for the Nation. For example, on

a seasonally adjusted basis, the overall unemployment rate dropped from 6.2 percent in May to 5.6 percent in June. Total employment fell one-half million to 78.4 million, the same level as in March.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is confidential by law and results are used only to compile statistical totals in which no individual or household can be identified.

## BRIGHT IDEAS

**Reading in Bed (aahh . . .)**

One of the really luxurious Small Pleasures in life is reading in bed. Armed with an exciting novel, an interesting magazine, a thought-provoking political tract, (even the day's newspaper) there's hardly anyone who doesn't enjoy that totally relaxing respite from the day's occupation.

But it's extremely important that the reading lights should be adequate. Underwattled little night table lamps make reading a strain and the overhead lights that many people have in their bedrooms don't give that curling-up-with-a-good-book coziness. A good table light should be about 22 inches from the book position and the bottom of the lamp shade should be eye level and approximately 20 inches above the top of the mattress. Wall lamps are ideal when they are 30 inches above the mattress.

Recessed units are an ideal solution for the bed reader. And they should be located far enough in from the wall to cast light directly over the lap of the reader. Incandescent units with regressed Fresnel lenses provide a good spread of light. For a room occupied by two people, one a reader, the other a sleeper, an adjustable shutter pin spot keeps "spill" light out of the sleeper's eyes by confining light beam to a small area. However, according to lighting experts at Sylvania this is a compromise solution and not recommended for prolonged reading. If you are a habitual night reader, give yourself every light advantage. Then if you fall asleep in mid-page, you'll know it's the book that's dull, not the light!

**Laugh at Puritans?**



It is fashionable, in these days, to sneer at the "Puritan ethic," to make fun of those hardy souls who established a demanding set of rules for life — rules which required honesty, truthfulness, morality, hard work, devotion to duty, and devotion to God. They were called Puritans because they believed in purity of character and insisted on purity of conduct, in accordance with their understanding.

Maybe they were a little too strict. But maybe we are a lot too permissive.

Maybe our nation would be in better shape now if we had a little more Puritan influence and a little less permissiveness — a little more sternness and a little less softness. Maybe the pendulum has swung too far.

**Their Methods Worked**

Could you imagine a continuing crime wave, such as we have experienced for many years, under the rule of the Puritans? Of course not. Our crime wave was stimulated, in its early stages, by a permissive attitude on the part of the public and by too great leniency in the courts. Under the Puritan rule, criminals were quickly caught and sternly punished.

Could you imagine a welfare burden that threatens to bankrupt our large cities — the kind of intolerable situation which we now have — occurring under the Puritans? Of course not. Everybody who could work was expected to work, and there was no provision for the lazy and indolent to enjoy the fruits of the labors of the industrious.

Could you imagine, under Puritan rule, the current trend toward abandonment of moral standards, which has caused the incidence of venereal disease to skyrocket and which is ruining

hundreds of thousands of young lives every year?

Could you imagine that the drug abuse problem would ever have reached its present proportions under Puritan rule? I couldn't, either.

Nobody is suggesting that we should adopt the Puritans' methods of punishment. Burning at the stake was really not a Puritan invention, anyhow, but a method of execution which was in use at that time, which the Puritans simply carried over from their former life in England. Putting people in the stocks, making them objects of ridicule to those who passed by, may not suit our present concept of proper punishment, but it apparently had a salutary effect — and may have served as a deterrent to future misdeeds more effectively than many of our present methods.

**Time to Quit Laughing**  
Yes, maybe the Puritans were too strict, and maybe we wouldn't want to copy their methods exactly, but wouldn't you like to live in a country with no serious crime problem, no staggering welfare problem, no drug problem, and no venereal disease problem?

No, I'm not really advocating that we all become Puritans. But I do believe that, until we bring under control some of the problems that wouldn't have existed if our standards had been stricter, we had better quit laughing at the "Puritan ethic." Perhaps, if the Puritans are able to observe us from their places in heaven, they are laughing at us.

Or maybe they're weeping. Maybe it's time for us to pick up again the Book that was so popular in the early days of our country—the Book that says, "Happy is the nation whose God is the Lord."

**How to Raise Your Kids**

Here are three simple rules on how to raise your children successfully.

**Suspicious?** You ought to be. No "simple" way to raise kids exists, and you know it! Nevertheless, something worthwhile may still be learned, and it won't work any better just because it's complicated. Take these three rules, for example. Simple they are, but also family-tested and practical.

You have, no doubt, heard the first before, and maybe the second. If you don't think the first one, will work, remember it depends upon the second. The third will probably be new and may sound peculiar. The success of the first two hangs on the third, though, so don't skip it. Now, here we go —

**Obey Your Parents**  
1. "Children, obey your parents." If they only would, that would solve everything! But they don't, so what good is that advice? How are you going to tell a five-year-old mini-terror he ought to study the sixth chapter of Ephesians in the Bible and live by it? Of course, that isn't possible, but all this discussion misses the point anyhow. Just do what it says—obey your parents.

Get it? The command is not aimed only at your pre-schoolers—or even your teenagers. You are to obey your parents. That's right—obey your kids' grandparents. Why? To give them proper honor. The point is this: Your kids will honor and obey you about like you honor(ed) and obey(ed) your parents. Even a toddler can understand that sort of an example.

Now, if you are a grandparent, you especially need to read this second advice.

**Do Not Provoke**  
2. "Fathers, do not provoke your children to wrath." That is, parents, don't irritate your

kids until they are furious at you! Children, after all, are people. They deserve proper respect, the same as you. Outlandish requirements that elevate the parents to tyrannical supremacy and reduce the children to virtual slavery make it impossible for them to render proper honor or obedience. Just as destructive is the refusal of parents to accept their proper responsibility and authority by being over-permissive. The third rule will explain how to hit a reasonable balance.

But, first, a note to grandparents. This Biblical advice of obedience alters radically when your children marry. Children are never exempt from honoring their parents, but married children are commanded to sever their submission to their parents in order to be free to enter unreservedly into the spiritual unity of marriage. This is explained in Genesis 2 and Ephesians 5. So be careful when advising your married children.

**Chastening of the Lord**  
3. "Nurture your children in the chastening and admonition of the Lord." This is revolutionary advice, so let's get it into modern English: "Nourish and strengthen your children while they are growing up by letting the Lord punish them and correct them and tell them how to live!" Here is help for children and parents who fear the rather arbitrary authority of the first and second rules. Parents who have learned to submit themselves to God should teach their children also to submit to God. Then parents can let God guide and correct their children directly, just as He does with the parents, and every other believer. Hypocritical authority and rebellion can be replaced by sharing in personal and family growth under God.

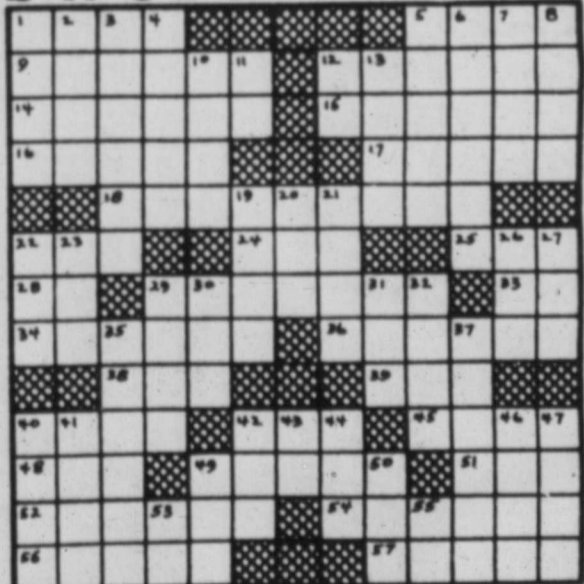

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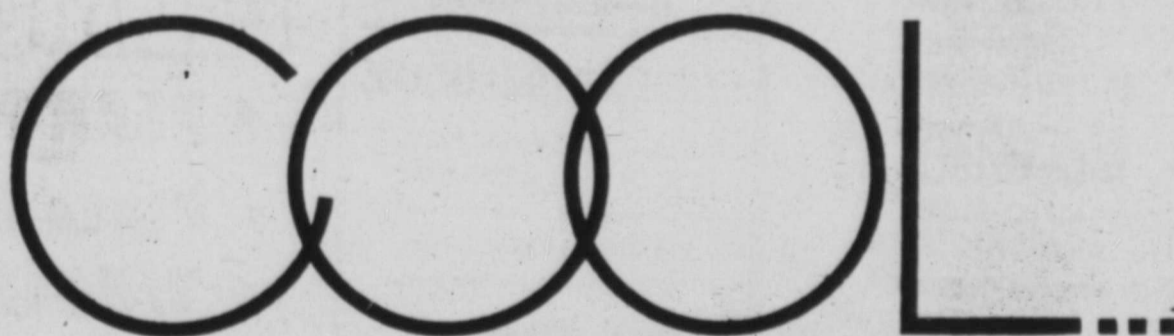
