there. This was the case Sunday when we went down, and back in July we made a trip during a rainstorm so hard we finally had to pull off to the side of the road and wait until the heaviest rain was over.

What we're getting at is: the way they are depending more and more on rain in and around Lubbock County, what with the irrigation water getting weaker and weaker, maybe we could tell them about our record and the farmers would want to pay us to schedule our visits at THEIR convenience.

We remember back in the fall of 1964 -- it hadn't rained very much that year. However, when we and 42,000 other people converged upon Lubbock to see Texas Tech play the University of Texas, we were greeted with an almost-flood that sent us to the car early.

Later that fall, the Raiders were taking on SMU. Surely, we thought, as we made our way to Lubbock and the game, this won't happen again. This time, however, the hard rain was mixed with hailstones, and for the first time in Southwest Conference history, a game had to be called for a time because of weather conditions.

In light of this experience, the farmers probably wouldn't want to take a chance on our "rain-bringing", since we can't always guarantee a nice, gentle rain. Sometimes it's a flood. We'll have to work a little more on the details; then maybe we'll be in business.

The trip afforded us a check on the four - lane progress of U.S. Highway 84, which will be a big help for Friona -- Lubbock traffic, and is one of the biggest road programs in our area at present.

A new two-lane portion of the road has been opened going from this end of the present fourlane portion into Sudan, while the old highway is being torn up in order to re-construct it for the other half of the divided

highway. The Highway Department has built up the road considerably this "lake" side of Sudan, where the road has at times gotten uder water when the area received a big rain. In light of good that the new lanes are BY A-C open,

Presently about half of the road's length in Lamb County are four-laned. Approximately 33 miles of the highway cross Lamb County, as the road goes practically corner to corner of the square-shaped county, similar to the way Highway 60 crosses Parmer County.

When the road is four-laned of the 67 miles from Muleshoe to Lubbock in the divided highway class, with the 12 remaining miles of two-lane road all in Lamb County, -- between Sudan and Littlefield,

If Sudan is not by-passed, it would leave Sudan as the city between Muleshoe and Lubbock which is not by-passed. It also appears that Muleshoe will not be by-passed if-and-whenever the portion of the highway northwest of the Bailey County seat toward Lariat is fourlaned.

Meanwhile the other segment of the Friona-Lubbock route --State Highway 214, has no progress to report in its muchneeded widening proposal.

The State Highway Department has officially designated Highway 214 as a state road, which opens the way for the state's participation in construction on the road from a cost-share standpoint.

Less than a year ago, a petition was circularted which collected 297 names, asking that the Highway Department construct an over pass at the railroad crossing.

The state has expressed an interest in both widening Highway 214 and possibly constructing an overpass, but there has been no official action on the project. A group of local officials hopes to meet with District Highway Engineer O.L. Crain in the immediate future to discuss the possibilities of imporving the road, and finding out what action needs to be taken.

1. The farm will not be in a position to enter into the 1967 Feed Grain Program on the same basis as in the past few years because the substitution of barley for grain sorghum or corn is not permitted under the 1967 program.

2. There will be no limitation on the acreage planted to barley for harvest in 1967. Anyone may plant all the barley they wish. It will not interfere with any other program provisions. Except, of course, the normal conserving base requirements on farms particiwheat or cotton programs.

4. There will be NO price support payment or diversion payment made for barley under the 1967 program.

5. A farm operator (on a farm with a 1966 barley base) CAN request (in writing to the ASCS office) that the barley base (or any part of it) be reestablished for the purpose of planting this acreage to wheat. This provision could possibly

keep a farm from having some sidered by such farm operators unalloted or "ead" acreage. Of course, it is possible that the increases in wheat allotment on some farms will offset the loss of the barley base thereon.

"We want to urge all farmers (with farms having a 1966 barley base) to visit the ASCS office and discuss this matter personally with one of our employees and make sure that they understand the options available to them under the 1967 programs," Mills concludes.






