TOO MUCH rainfall at the wrong time of year is causing some misfortune in this area, and all over the South Plains, but even in their misery, farmers and others whose livelihood depends on the success of the crops are able to remain calm and many even can joke about it (since there's little else they can do).

The whole thing brought to mind a comment by Bruce Newman of near Sudan a few years ago that "the fish are eating up my cotton." One fellow at Plainview claimed he spotted a Russian submarine in Running Water Draw, and another said he was going fishing in "Lake Gibson," a construction site in town that really caught the water.

But the most inspirational comment we heard was that of a man who farms between Plainview and Olton, who not only had the rain and cold that everyone else did, but also received considerable hail damage. The Hornets buzzed around in the mud Friday night against the Eagles but seemed to be spinning their wheels when it came to crossing the goal line.

The first period was a battle

of the defenses as they became unidentifiable mud men. Seagraves broke the game open when Larry Gibson galloped 81 yards for a second-quarter touchdown. The Eagles ran across for the two points and led the scoring 8-0.

Sudan penetrated deep in Eagle territory several times, only to lose the ball on downs or an unfortunate fumble.

The Hornet defense held the Eagle offense in the scoring department until the third period when they scored on a quarter-

back sneak from the two yard line, giving them a score of 14-0.

The only Hornet score came in the final period as Kevin May slushed across the goal line from 18 yards out.

According to statistics, it was an even game except for the Hornet fumbles. Sudan lost six out of nine fumbles. Seagraves, however, also lost two fumbles to the Hornets. Seagraves had 276 total yards gain while Sudan gained 220. Sudan led in the number of first downs achieved with 11 compared to 10 for Seagraves.

Don Noles punted six times for 240 yards, averaging 40 yards to each punt from a very wet field.

Eugene Lopez led the defense with 22 assisted tackles with Brad West helping out in 20 tackles and Mike Hedges coming to the Hornets aid with 17 assists.

Quarterback Bo Lance connected on four passes for some 45 yards. May captured the longest one for 23 yards. May was also the leading ground gainer with 83 yards.

Coach Bill Adams said, in commenting on the game, "It was just that we made more mistakes than Seagraves did." He added that whoever makes the fewer mistakes in tomorrow's game with Springlake-Earth will be the winner. He said that Springlake is big and tough and will be able to capitalize on our mistakes, as we intend to do on their's.

Both Sudan and Springlake are 2-1 in play this week as Dimmitt downed the Wolverines 8-7 last week. Game time will be 8 p. m. in the Wolverine stadium.

The Sudan B-team also played a game of waterball Thursday as they journeyed to Muleshoe and returned home the losers of an 18-6 battle.

The Mules scored first early in the game on a two yard push. The remainder of the first half was a defensive battle until the Mules intercepted a Hornet pass on the last play of the half and went in to score. Thereby, the Mules led 12-0 at the half.

The fired-up Hornets came back in the third quarter and went in for pay-dirt as Pat Hedges broke over right guard Rory Manning for a 64 yard run.

The Mules again scored late in the final period on a quarterback keeper from six yards out, giving Muleshoe the victory, 18-6.

Muleshoe earned 12 first downs to 4 for Sudan while gaining 226 yards compared to 156 for the Hornets.

Hedges was the leading ground gainer for Sudan with 150 yards in 23 carries. He also assisted in 21 tackles on defense. Tampion was the punter and put the ball in the air four times for a total of 124 yards, averaging 31 yards per punt.

The B-team will meet the Springlake-Earth Wolverines here today, Thursday, following the seventh and eighth grade games which begin at 5 p. m.

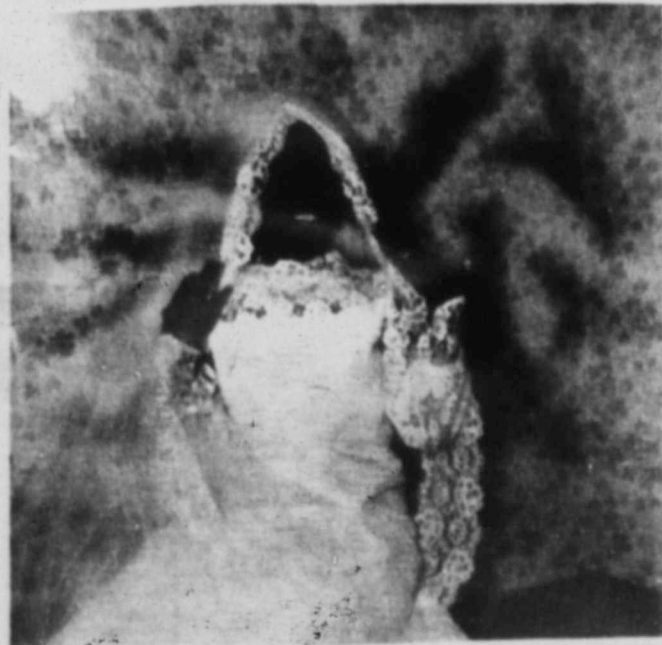

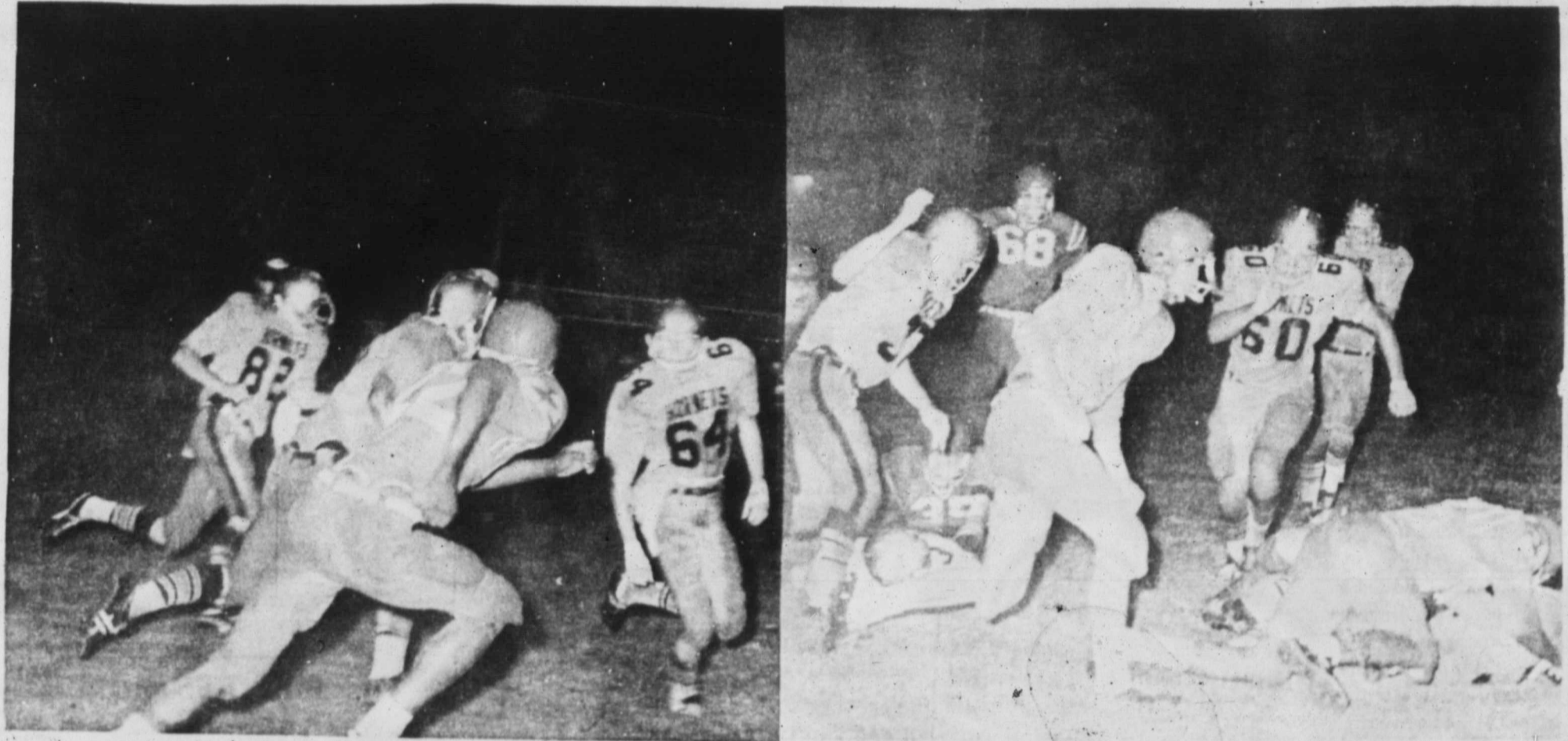
