Dr. Siffre is a French scientist who says he will spend six months alone in a cave near Del Rio to study the effects of human isolation. His wife made the announcements to the Associated Press last week.

Mrs. Siffre described her husband as a "human biologist" (it's about time we had one of those) and said he will enter Midnight Cave early in November not to emerge until next spring.

She said he will use himself as a test subject to study the effects of isolation on his time awareness, his sleep patterns and his working ability. Equipment to monitor his brain waves and heart action will be used during the experiment, she said.

For most of the experiment Dr. Siffre will be 300 feet underground. Mrs. Siffre says her husband has performed 10 isolation experiments in French caves. And she hasn't caught on yet.

Now if Dr. Siffre wanted to study the effects of human isolation without all the bother of going underground, perhaps he should try to get waited on at a couple of retail outlets we know in Plainview.

One last note: If I were Mrs. Siffre, I'd set up camp outside the cave entrance just to make sure there was no hanky-panky going on.

SCHOOL REALIGNMENT ANNOUNCED

The Texas UIL met Monday when realignment was announced for several Texas schools. Sudan remained in District 3-A with Bovina, Springlake, Farwell, Hart, Kress and Vega.

Area schools that were changed include the promotion of Anton to Class A which will be in District 5-A with O'Donnell and Plains, Seagraves, Ropesville (also from Class B), Shallowater and Whiteface.

Happy, which was deleted from 3-A, will be in District 2-B which will also include Amherst and Sundown.

The new alignments will be for two years, starting next fall. The UIL altered only the enrollment figures in Class AAAA with an increase from 1100 to 1120. Other enrollment lines are 500-1119 in AAA, 230-499 in AA, 120-229 in A, below 119 in B. The first games next fall will be Sept. 7 and teams will have 11 weeks to get in their ten-game schedules.

HART OVERCOMES HORNETS, 26-23

Friday was the upset night for District 3-A teams as Farwell went down to Bovina, Springlake to Vega and Sudan to Hart, leaving Vega the only undefeated team in the district and put Sudan in the cellar as the team who has not won a conference game this season. Happy was defeated by Kress last week.

Sudan took a first quarter lead, 8-6, and added points during the second period until they went to the dressing room during the half with a 23-6 lead. Hart came bouncing back after the half to add three touchdowns and a victory of 26-23.

The Hart Longhorns turned on the scoreboard first early in the opening period but Sudan came right back with Gary Edwards going over from the three with Bo Lance adding the two points in the conversion.

Edwards scored again in the second period from the three-yard line and a pass from Lance to Roger Bellar added the extra points.

The Hornets were really alive

as Roger Boyles took his turn in crossing the goal on a 10-yard sprint and Lance kicked the extra point with only seconds left in the first half.

Whatever was said in the Hart dressing room during the half must have worked as the Longhorns came stampeding out and ready for fighting. They scored two touchdowns in quick succession edging the Hornet lead to 23-18.

The Hornets started buzzing but couldn't seem to get started as Hart recovered a fumble or two and also intercepted two passes. Sudan got a break when Hart was called for pass interference late in the game but could not capitalize.

Edwards and Boyles carried for almost identical records. Boyles gained 143 yards on 21 carries and Edwards had 144 yards on 20 carries. Lance passed to Roger Bellar three times for 67 yards.

Fumbles and pass interceptions again hurt Sudan as they lost four of five fumbles and recovered three Hart fumbles. Hart intercepted three of Lance's passes.

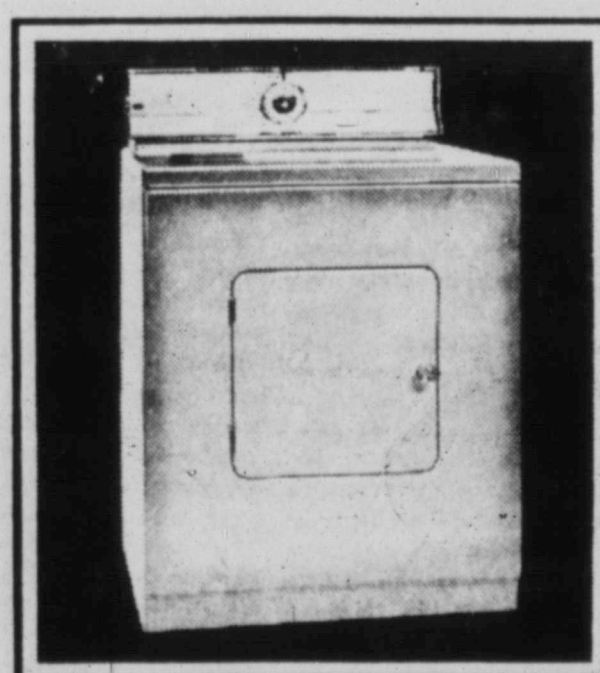

The Sudan P. T. O. met Tuesday, Oct. 12, in the school cafeteria. Mrs. Frankie Wiseman, president, introduced the speaker, Captain Bill Cox from the Lubbock Police Department.

He spoke on narcotics—the use of drugs. He stressed the lack of knowledge concerning the effects of drugs and the expense incurred to the user. This habit cost one user \$700.00 per day at the time of his death.

Captain Cox discussed numerous cases of youngsters who experimented with "Orange Sunshine", (pep pills) and "Downers" (depressants) and stressed the harm and damage of drugs both to the mind and body.

He emphasized the fact that glue sniffing, gas sniffing, solvents in paint thinners and such damaged the liver and the brain to a great extent.

A point that should be well taken by parents is that drugs is no respecter of persons or families.

Captain Cox emphasized that alcohol is the most misused and abused drug in the world, that marijuana causes hallucinations, poor judgment in judging distances and, develops a "no care" attitude.

The most dangerous drug is L. S. D., which has no medical value, no formula, and is illegally made.

A trip on L. S. D. can last eight to ten hours, and the brain has been put through such turmoil that a person should not make decisions for three months. There can be a re-occurring trip as much as five years later.

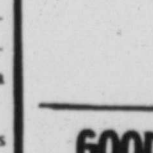
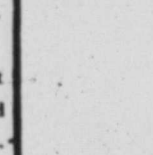
Such facts should alert all of us to the dangers which confront our communities and our children.

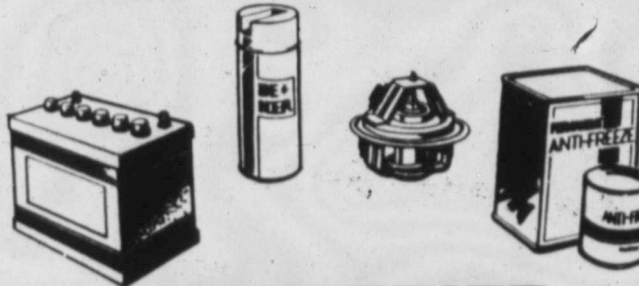
