The Sudan Hornets almost pulled off an upset in the last game of the season against the Kress Kangaroos. Sudan thrilled the homecoming crowd by going for two touchdowns in the first quarter. Roger Boyles went across from the 12 yard line and minutes later Gary Edwards sneaked in for the 6-pointer from the one yard line. Try for extra points failed, giving Sudan a 12-0 lead.

Kress managed to get in for a score late in the second period with the 2-point conversion narrowing the Hornet lead 12-8 at halftime.

Sudan played a good defensive game during the third quarter and the early part of the fourth until they fumbled with Kress recovering as the scoreboard clock showed nine minutes re-

Kress capitalized on the Hornet mistake and controlled the ball until they scored plays later, taking the lead 14-12.

At this point Sudan seemed to wilt as fumbles and interceptions plagued them. Two 7-yard TD runs by Roy Jackson assured the victory for Kress, 30-12. The victory gave Kress a district record of 6-1 tieing that of Vega as Farwell held the Longhorns to a 36-36 tie, winning on penetrations. 



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
