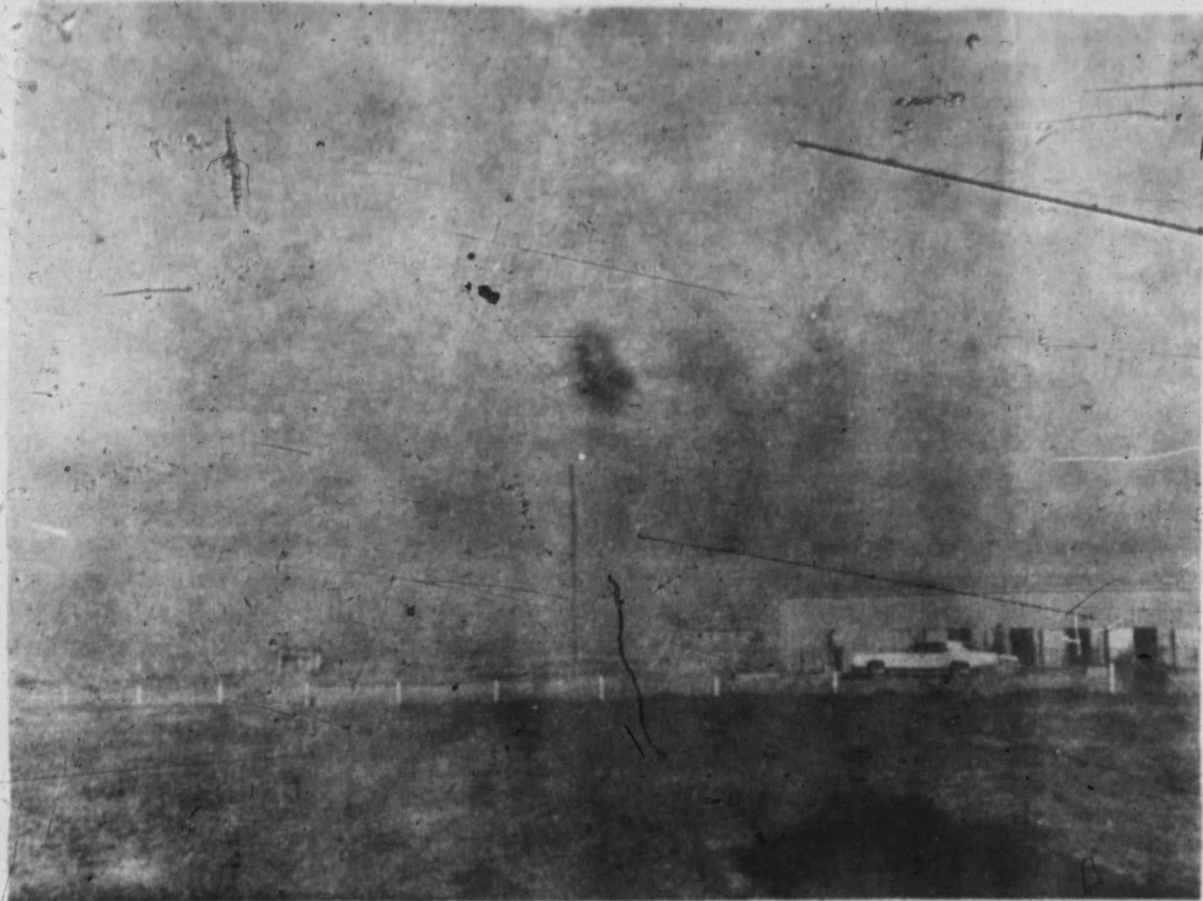

Winter Ballet Classes Begin

Tutu's School of Ballet is now beginning winter classes. The instructor, Tutu King, has been on tour with the Lubbock Civic Ballet, presenting "Old King Cole" in Lubbock, Snyder, Plainview, Canyon and Amarillo.

She reports that ballet classes offer poise, rhythm, balance and stage presence; modern jazz is rhythmic movements to music. She will be offering classes in pre-ballet, for six- and seven-year olds, which offers form and technique without French terms, ballet I for eight to 10 year olds and ballet for 11 year olds and over, offering the same techniques with the French terminology.

Dancerize classes, featuring general exercising and basic modern jazz movements will be offered for teenagers and adults. Modern jazz classes are designed for children who have had or are presently taking ballet.

All classes are limited to six to eight children per class for more personal attention, according to Tutu. All ballet classes are 45 minutes long, with dancerize and jazz classes lasting an hour. There will be three five-week terms in the winter session, which is now beginning.

Stock Show Slated

Plans have been completed for the annual Lamb County Junior Livestock show to be held Jan. 13 through Jan. 15 at the show barns in Littlefield.

Entries must be at the County Agent's office by Monday, Jan. 10, along with entry fees of \$3 per steer and \$1.75 per lamb or barrow.

A boy or girl belonging to 4-H, FFA or FHA and residing or attending school in Lamb County will be eligible to participate. They must have owned their steers since Sept. 15, 1971 and had the lambs and barrows at least 60 days preceding the show.

Each exhibitor will show his own animal and be responsible for their care and cleanliness of stall and pens.

Animals are to be in the show barns by 11 a.m. Friday and will not be allowed to leave until 30 minutes after the completion of the steer show on Saturday. Barns will be open Thursday night to admit the animals.

Judging for the lambs will begin Friday at 5:30 p.m. with Crosby County Agent, Joe Wise as judge. Swine judging will begin at 9 a.m. Saturday with Jim Allison of Lubbock as judge. Judging the steer show will be Floyd County Agent Doyle Warren with action to begin at 1 p.m. Saturday.

Approximately 40 animals are expected to be shown from Sudan.

so the Lubbock Cotton Exchange lowered their harvest estimate by another 241,000 bales for the South Plains area. Locally, the

Central Cotton Exchange estimated some 37,411 with the harvest almost complete. A spokesman reported that the local harvest will be complete in less than two weeks if the clear weather holds.

The Sudan High School basketball teams started the new year out by winning two out of three games. The varsity girls downed the Happy feds 53-43 after taking a first quarter lead of 17-8. The Hornets lengthened their lead to a halftime score of 33-12. Happy scored 19 points in the final period of play. The Sudan guards drew 18 fouls, Tanya Chester and Georgia Ray scored 18 and 17 points respectively. Becky Via (30) scored 30 points for Happy for game high point honors.

The junior varsity boys went into overtime but came out winners 60-57.

The varsity boys got off to a slow start and trailed by eight points, 25-33 at the half Tuesday night at Happy. Happy won the game 76-61 following the fouling-off of four starters for Sudan. Both teams had 29 fouls each. All Sudan team members scored with Bo Lance leading the pack with 20 points.

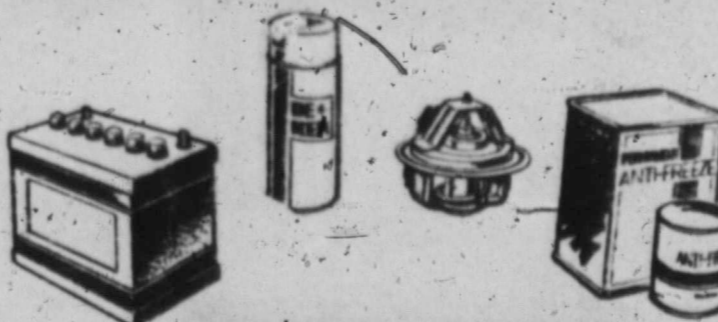
