

The funds are to be used to finance 22 miles of distribution. line and other system improvements including tie lines, and conversion of some existing lines in Bailey, Castro, Lamb, and Parmer counties.

ceived word Monday, Jan. 10, from the Department of Agricolture that Bailey, Castro, Lamb, and Parmer counties will. participate in a \$364,000 Ioan awarded to the Balley County Electric Cooperative Association by the Rural Electrification Ad ministration.

Few Know — **Fewer Act**

A student knows what he has been taught; a disciple lives by it. A student's knowledge answers his questions; a disciple's understanding disciplines his whole manner of living. A student criticizes his teacher's ideas; a disciple commits himself to his Master's teachings.

Most students of our century have accepted the highest form of knowledge to be well-informed agnosticism. This generation of people who cannot make up their minds to believe anything has been anxious to expose and destroy failures, but apathetic toward constructive improvements. They doubt there is a successful approach to resolving life's difficulties. Disciples know

Discipleship is not synonymous with rigor. Disciples of Hugh Hefner love pleasure. Disciples of Mao love unqualified power. Disciples of Timothy Leary love drug fantasies. Disciples of Herbert Marcuse love revolution. Disciples of soap operas love indulgent sentimentalism/Disciples of Jesus love Jesus

Jesus told potential disciples, "No one putting his hand to the plow and looking back is fit for the kingdom of God" (Luke 9:62). This requires resolute commitment. If you expect to get anywhere you have to look where you are going - in a car or in life.

The best disciples, I think, begin as students. They begin as inquisitive and critical; they do not commit themselves in ignorance or under pressure. Indeed, how could a disciple adequately imitate his teacher if he did not comprehend something of the breadth and detail of his character?

Though the commitment to discipleship is genuine, imperfect people make imperfect disciples, and all occasionally falter. Most New Testaments mistakenly translate Jesus' requirement with this emphasis: "No one after (emphasis added) putting his hand to the plow and looking back is fit for the kingdom of God." By these terms all of Jesus' followers failed Him at His crucifixion, yet He did not reject them. Jesus requires the decision to discipleship commitment to be unconditional, but He responds to subsequent failures with grace. In addition, Jesus empowers all His disciples to become capable of following His example, despite set-backs. Discipleship to Jesus represents an obligation not pri-

marily of strength but of will. "How to live" remains life's only real question. Most people seem to ignore it, some study it, a few decide about it and commit themselves to their decision.

Whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever forfeits his life for My sake," Jesus taught, "he is the one who will save it. For how is a man benefited if he gains the whole world at the cost of his life?"


