LAST FRIDAY, I received in the mail a blurb from the public relations department of an insurance company regarding what they called "the grim statistics on home accidents. These suggestions just might prevent a death or serious injury among your readership," said the release.

Saturday I stepped on a nail in a board in the back yard, driving home the point of a nail and also the point of the story I had put aside with a hazy notion of using it somewhere if I had room.

When you put all your weight down on the point of a nail and you are wearing thin-soled shoes, and an inch of the nail goes into your foot, it gets your attention immediately. You sit down and say, "Hmmm. I must have stepped on a nail." Then you remove the nail. Then you try to decide whether you should get a tetanus shot. Later you decide a bowl of ice cream is better, so you forget about the tetanus shot, even though the doctor you call tells you to get one. (After all, I only called the doctor so he'd tell me I didn't need one, but he didn't seem to understand.)

Then you have the problem of deciding if your injury is bad enough to keep you from helping to finish the back yard fence. You decide that maybe it's best to finish, but be sure to remember to limp when the rest of the family is watching. It isn't every day you get the chance to play the role of Wounded Hero.

Anyway, despite all these minor calamities, the fence finally is finished, except for a gate we haven't figured out how to hang yet. But if nothing else was accomplished, the whole thing at least underlined the importance of the home accident story.

Each year, said the story, 26,500 people die and another four million are injured in accidents in the home. Falls are the largest single cause of accidental death in the home (9,600 in the United States last year).

Loose rugs, stair landings and bathtubs are potential danger spots for falls. The medicine cabinet is a threat, especially with children likely to take the wrong things. Other menaces include old cans of paint and thinner, electrical appliances and devices not properly insulated, loaded guns and loaded people.

WATER TOWER RECEIVES ANNUAL REPAIRS

The American Tank and Tower Company of Joplin, Missouri, completed their annual inspection and repair work on the Sudan Water Tower last week. The company scraped the inside of the tower, welded weak places, repaired spots and completely re-coated the inside. They also did some repair work on the bottom outside bowl and tightened the sway rods for the tower.

Representatives of the company worked for 3 1/2 days on the tower during which time water was pumped directly to Sudan residents from the city wells.

Pete Phillips, city water commissioner, reported that this will be done annually by the company at the city's expense to maintain water specifications for the state and preserve the life of the tower.

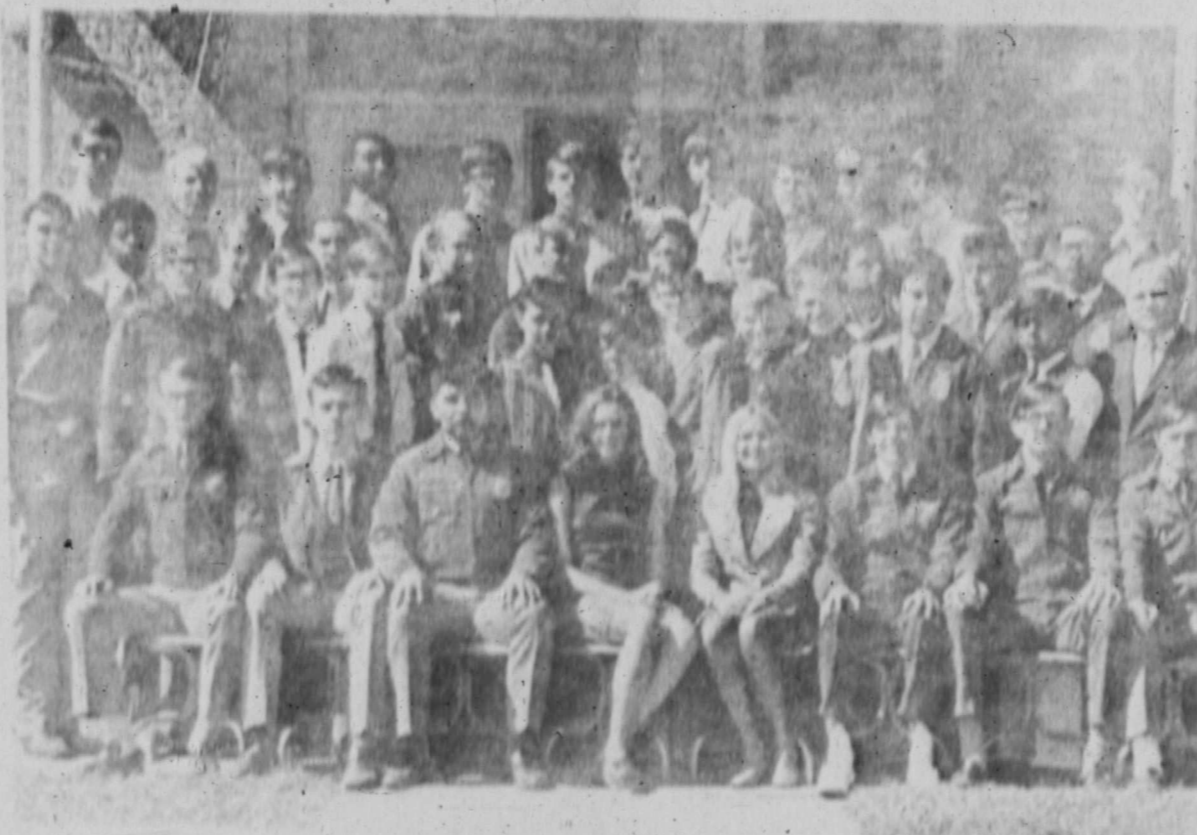
In addition to the games tonight, there will be three games Friday night beginning at 5:40 p. m. with the playoffs to begin at 1 p. m. Saturday afternoon.

DPS REPORT

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of January, according to Sergeant Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for January, 1972 shows a total of 500 accidents resulting in nine persons killed and 217 persons injured as compared to January, 1971 with 467 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 235 persons injured.

Also during 1971, Lubbock County's 511 traffic accidents was the highest number recorded by any county of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region. Parker County ranked second with 429 ac-

The Sudan Junior Varsity Tournament brought basketball season to a close last week as four Hornet teams participated in the competition.

In the boys' division, Abernathy dominated their opponents to take home the championship crown. The high scoring Antelopes defeated Farwell 116-63, Dimmitt 72-71, and New Deal in the championship game 102-54. New Deal placed second in the tourney, Dimmitt third, and Sudan "Gold" team won the consolation berth.

Sudan "Black" lost their first round game to New Deal 44-45 as they were unable to capitalize on opportunities to score in the last minute of play. Richard Tamplin, Roby Lynn, and Pat Hedges did all of the scoring with 24, 11, and 8 points respectively.
